June 5. 2012

Scholarship Committee: Ramon Selby presented two applications for review. Further information on the applicants is needed.

Motion made and approved that Jeanne Yearian will purchase pins that will be given to those attending who make a suggested donation of \$10 or more to NWWSMS.

For The Good Of The Order: Butch Gibson's daughter-in-law is coming home after a lengthy stay in Mexico. Danika Nolton, whom NWWSMS Scholarship Committee sent to a fiddle camp in 2005 when she was 5 years old, has become a "Star," performing on various stages professionally.

Norma-Lee 1954-2012

twice served as honorary mayor of Rio Linda/Elverta, died June 29 of cancer, her family said. She was 58.

With a single name and a penchant for one-

Norma-Lee, a western swing artist who

With a single name and a penchant for oneliners, Norma-Lee was a colorful Canadian who migrated to California in 1980 and settled among free-spirited residents of Rio Linda and Elverta.

Norma-Lee was a community fixture as a longtime volunteer for the Rio Linda/Elverta Chamber of Commerce. Elected honorary mayor of Rio Linda/Elverta in 2003 and 2010, she used her position to speak out against illegal dumping and other

neighborhood concerns.

She served on local improvement committees and was active in the Elkhorn Moose Lodge and the American Legion. She knitted and crocheted hoodies for toddlers as a member of Elder Craftsmen, a volunteer group that makes quilts and clothes for seniors, children and veterans.

Norma-Lee was also a talented songwriter and musician who had sung in public since childhood and played guitar and fiddle. Introduced to western swing in Sacramento, she joined the Western Swing Society in 1983 and served in many positions, including treasurer, secretary and newsletter editor.

"She loved to perform," said Bill Enyeart of the Western Swing Society. "She played a little bit of fiddle, but she really loved to sing. Everybody enjoyed listening to her."


Norma-Lee formed a band, the Maple Sugar Gang, and collaborated as a songwriter with Dayna Wills, a niece of western swing legend Bob Wills. One of their tunes, "Sing Faded Love, Dayna Gayle," won the 2000 Song of the Year Award from the Academy of Western Artists.

The former Norma Louise Weatherbee was born in 1954 in Brantford, Ontario. Her father, Derald "Boots" Weatherbee, was a champion fiddler who played on broadcaster Ted Mack's amateur show.

Norma-Lee, who stopped playing guitar after she was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease 10 years ago, wrote songs that have been recorded by other artists and belonged to the Nashville Songwriters Association. She also published a book of poetry and a musical mystery novel.

She was inducted into the Lincoln Country Music Roundup Hall of Honor and into Western Swing halls of fame in Sacramento, Seattle and the Southwest.

She rescued unwanted cats and dogs and was devoted to her three pet Chihuahuas. She loved all animals, even pests. "She wouldn't let you kill a fly," said her sister, Joyce Hutson. "You had to catch it and take it outside."



Roy Ayres 1929-2012

Roy J. Ayres, 82, of Riverview, FL went to be with his Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, on June 9, 2012. He passed away peacefully at home surrounded by his family.

He was born in Columbus, MS on December 10, 1929. He grew up loving music, and at the age of 8 years he taught himself how to play the Steel Guitar. Shortly after, at 16 years of age, he began his professional musical career joining Pee Wee King and the Golden West Cowboys where they played weekly on the Grand Ole Opry. He was best known as the lead steel guitarist on the original recording of the *Tennessee Waltz*, which was the most

successful record of its era. Over an eight-year period, Roy recorded with and played in all 48 states with Pee Wee King, including to a record crowd at Constitution Hall in Washington, D.C. Roy left the Golden West Cowboys to care for his terminally ill father.

After his father's death, he joined Boyd Bennett and his Rockets. He played steel guitar, lead guitar and trombone. They recorded several songs that made it to the top of the Rock-n-Roll Charts.

He proudly and honorably served his county in the United States Marine Corps during the Korean War, where he received numerous campaign awards and personal recognition. Following his tour of duty in Korea, he obtained his Masters Degree in Physics from the University of Louisville in 1956; after which, he spent 8 years in the Aerospace Industry as a physicist.

Following his time in aerospace, he worked at Fender Music Corporation where he contributed to the design of many of their musical products and obtained several patents. Proceeding his time with Fender, Roy served in City Government in Garland, TX, and Clearwater, FL, as well as Florida County Government in Clay and Bradford county.

Upon his retirement in 2003 he rekindled his love for music and the steel guitar. In 2005, Roy was inducted into the Seattle, WA "Pioneer's of Western Swing" Hall of Fame. Later, in 2006 he was inducted into the Sacramento, CA "Western Swing Music" Hall of Fame; and, in 2007 he achieved the highest honor for Steel Guitar, when he was the 57th inductee into the "International Steel Guitar Hall of Fame" in St. Louis, MO.

He is survived by his loving wife Laurie; daughters: Sondra and her husband Tim; Tammy and her husband Tim; Sons: Dean and his wife Tammy; Ed and his wife Toni; Grandchildren: Jessie, Kenny, Tyler, Kyle, Chloe, Ryan, Ben, Katelyn, and Brian, along with his favorite "Granddog," Sophie.





DRIVING DIRECTIONS TO THE EAGLES CLUB, AUBURN, WA

NOTE: Due to the closure of the M Street/Hwy 18 underpass for road work, many of the GPS' (or other programs') directions given for the City of Auburn will be incorrect.

From EAST via 1-90: Take I-90 WEST to Hwy 18 at Exit 25. Staying in the left lane of the exit, turn left, heading South. Continue on Hwy 18 for approximately 30 miles and exit at Auburn Way S. (The signs also show the exit is for the commuter train station.) Stay in the left lane and turn onto Auburn Way S., staying in the left through lane - not a turn lane. Skip to ** in next column:

From Hwy 167 NORTH or SOUTH: Follow the same instructions as if you were coming via I-5 below.


From Hwy 405: Take the Hwy 167 Exit SOUTH. Then follow the Hwy 167 instructions above.


From the NORTH or SOUTH via 1-5: Take the Hwy 18 exit EAST. Continue eastward and exit to Auburn Way S. Be in the right turn lane onto Auburn Way S. Turn right, heading SOUTH. Skip to ** below:

** 'M' Street DETOUR: Continue SOUTH on Auburn Way in the left lane. When you see a Chevron gas station on your left, turn left at that intersection onto 12th Street SE. (Just before the Chevron Station is an Auburn landmark, "Big Daddy's" Drive-In . . .4-star dining!)

Continue on 12th, about 2 blocks, to 'M' Street. Turn left, on 'M' Street SE, heading North, IGNORING the Road Closed sign. Go approximately 3 blocks and turn right into the Eagles parking lot, either just before or after the building.

If you miss the 12th Street SE turn, you can continue down to where 'M' Street intersects Auburn Way S. Make a sharp left onto 'M' Street SE (possibly not as easy for RVs to maneuver) and continue down to the Eagles, passed the Road Closed sign.





Album: Can't Get Enough of Texas

Artist: River Road Boys **Label:** Buzzard Roost

The world famous River Road Boys lost band charter member Clyde Brewer last year. This CD, dedicated to Clyde, is their first without him. It seemed like an impossible task but even without Clyde, this looks like another number 1 CD.

This new CD, recorded at Houston's historic Sugar Hill Studios, features 16 cuts of

the most enjoyable music by one of Western Swing's all-time greatest bands.

The very talented musicians that make up this band include lead vocalist Jim Johnson, who, as always, is simply awesome. Also in the spotlight is the drummer, Tommy Howser, a charter member of the band. Former Hank Thompson Brazos Valley Boys member, Ralph "Dusty" Stewart, is heard playing Steel Guitar and Bill Dessens plays some wonderful fiddle and standard guitar.

Also playing standard guitar is Shelly Lee Alley, Jr. Shelly Lee is also the featured vocalist on *I Needed You*, the Bob Wills/ Johnny Gimble composition that the late Tagg Lambert originally sang on a Wills Kapp session. Bass player, John Jones is the lead vocalist on the swinging *Mind Your Own Business* from country music's late Hank Williams, Sr. Wayne Glasson is the piano player and is featured in the spotlight on an instrumental that he wrote, *River Road Boogie*.

Jim is featured on vocal on all of the other tunes and he opens the album with Bob Wills' *Can't Get Enough of Texas*. Also from the Bob Wills library are *Corrine*. *Corrina*. Tommy

Duncan's Goodbye Liza Jane, Cindy Walker's Miss Molly and Ed Nelson, Steve Nelson and Fred Rose's Hang Your Head in Shame. Bob Wills' younger brother, Johnnie Lee Wills had a huge hit on Kokomo Arnold's Milk Cow Blues.

Cindy Walker also wrote You Don't Know Me, a title suggested by Eddy Arnold. It earned Eddy half writer's credit and a hit tune. It was also a hit for Jerry Vale and Ray Charles. Floyd Tillman wrote and originally scored with I'll Keep on Loving You and both Jimmie Davis and Gene Autry are remembered for Nobody's Darlin' But Mine. These two are now brought back in this album. Walkin' Mv Baby Back Home. Romberg and Hammerstein's When I Grow Too Old to Dream and Walter Donaldson and George Whiting's My Blue Heaven are borrowed from the world of popular music. The remaining album cut was originally a huge mid 1930s Stuart Hamblen hit, My Mary.
