RECLAIMING OUR PURPOSE - PRESERVING OUR LEGACY

During the lockdowns people experienced varying degrees of suffering. But each of us had no choice but to become more introspective. Even the most extroverted turned inward and began prioritizing what they value and want for themselves and others. Having a purpose is becoming more important, no matter which generation you identify with. Can we see any glimmers of silver linings in the Pandemic clouds still lingering? Or am I one of 'those' people who just have to make lemonade out of any lemons that come my way (don't need to answer that one).



I have found myself more open to new ways of doing things—more adaptable you might say. Perhaps this is why we are holding our first online board meeting, encouraging people out of the local area to take part in helping us rebuild. And, as we look into new ways of living and working together, I am searching for new partnerships.

Last month I received a request from Graham Griffith, an Australian musician/songwriter, requesting information on our Northwest Steel Guitar virtuoso, Jim Webb. Graham, a steel player himself, was concerned Jimmy's musical contributions would be lost as it seemed no one outside of America's Pacific Northwest had heard of him. So Graham contacted Jimmy. Now a collaboration has formed between Graham, Jim and Jim's nephew. They are rummaging through Jim's files to see what treasures can be found and posted.

Graham has undertaken the task of introducing Jim's musical stylings to as many as possible . . . and, isn't that part of the reason the NWWSMS exists? We try to preserve the stories and legacy of the musicians, supporters and promoters who helped create and continue to develop western swing music.

First let me introduce Graham Griffith (page 9) and present the work he has done to this point. The YouTube videos Graham and Jim have posted are audio, accompanied by a slide show. Jim was recording his performance for his own education. So, what we have are Jim's steel parts loud and clear above the vocals and other instruments in the band. The YouTube links to both videos are on page 9 and 11. If they are helpful to you or other steel players you know, please encourage them to listen and 'like' the posting.

Speaking of YouTube, we were deeply saddened to hear of the passing of Bob Richards aka radiobob805. Bob treated us to rare glimpses into western swing's early years. He uploaded over 400 videos, many selections from his own personal library. What happens to all that work, all that history as seen through Bob's eyes, now that he's gone? From what I've been told, as long as people are still playing the videos, YouTube will leave Bob's channel intact. Now I realize YouTube is changing its focus so there aren't any guarantees. I am planning to download my favorites to some external hard drives over the next several months . . . just in case.

- ★ to renew the non-profit corporation license with the State of Washington.


to investigate additional showcase venues and festival opportunities as the Society rebuilds.



Ray Harrison 1942-2021

On August 3, 2021, Ray Harrison passed away after a brief illness.

Ray Harrison was born in San Antonio, Texas, on March 2, Texas Independence Day.

Ray spent 20 years in the U.S. Navy and retired as a Sonar Tech Chief. He was very

proud of his years of service in the military. After retirement, he worked civil service transferring his naval service knowledge to supporting the fleet until his final retirement in 2005.

Ray's passion was playing music. Country music was his favorite, specifically western swing. He was an accomplished bassist and vocalist, being inducted into the Northwest Western Swing Hall of Fame in 2015 (see video below). Some of his greatest joys were opportunities to jam with his fellow musicians, especially at Marty Robbins tributes or Steel Guitar Shows around the country. He loved leading worship at his church. Ray was an active and avid member of the Lion's Club for 33 years in AZ and CA and believed deeply in community service.

During Ray's years in the US Navy (1961 - 1981) he performed all over the world, either with a ship's band or his own band in local night clubs.

Ray considers that he has been blessed with the quality of musicians he has worked with over the years. It was one of the greatest joys of his life.

While in San Diego, CA, off and on from 1964-2005, Ray worked with Sam Necochea, Merv Cook, Ray Poe, Alton Simpson and other members of the Western Swing Society's Hall of Fame. Sam used to take him to Yuma for the Western Swing functions where he got to meet and play with many others. Below is one of our treasured memories, Ray singing at the NWWSMS Festival with the Inductee Band in 2015.





Bob Richards 1934-2021

2019 Hall of Fame Inductee, Bob Richards, passed away on November 2021. after suffering a massive stroke. This music historian and loval friend will be sorely missed by many of us. His close friend. Charles Oliver, put it well. He said when an old person dies, it

as though a library has burned down. Bob's death could be compared to the burning of Egypt's Great Library at Alexandria. Here is just a small part of Bob's western swing connection:

Bob Richards was born in Arkansas, way too many years ago. He and his family came to California in 1942, just in time for the start of World War II with Japan. When he was 12 his mother bought him a windup console phonograph for \$3 from a Goodwill store. At noon, every weekday in 1947, Bob listened to KLX radio in Oakland. The announcer's was named "Cactus Jack" and he played an hour of Bob Wills music from records and transcriptions.

When the Texas Playboys came to San Jose, Bob persuaded his uncle to take him to the dance. He actually met and talked with Bob Wills who was very nice to that 12-year-old. Bob has been a fan ever since. But that was not the last time he would meet Bob Wills and Tommy Duncan.

The YouTube channel Bob developed, radiobob805, was his hobby. He was a Bob Wills fan and has been since 1946 when he first heard him on the radio. He remembers how hard it was to find those 78s to buy. He owned many recordings by Wills unavailable elsewhere. Bob added pictures to the audio to make a slide show and uploaded it to his channel. Below is just one of Bob's radio shows, originally recorded in 1962.





Gene 'Pappy' Merritts 1929-2021

Gene "Pappy" Merritts passed away on December 18, 2022, at the age of 92. Gene was inducted into the 2015 NWWSMS Hall of Fame. After an extensive career as a band leader and playing country/ western swing music, he ended up in Nashville, TN. In 1971, Oprvland U.S.A. came into being. Gene got a job there after the second year it was open, playing fiddle in the Country Music Show at the Theater by the Lake. He played for that same show until Opryland closed, 24 years later. In 1997. Gene joined the band of Jesse Lee Jones, Brazilbilly, playing at Roberts Western World in Nashville for 11 years. Then, around 2003, Gene joined John England & the Western Swingers. Click on the book Gene wrote (pictured below) to watch them performing live at the Loveless Cafe in 2013:

I've done a pretty good amount of research on Bob Wills over the years, and one of the more interesting things I've unearthed was his apparent attitude toward rock 'n' roll music in the late 1950s. Of course, this was when he and brother Johnnie Lee left the Cain's Ballroom with the band, taking up a temporary residency in Las Vegas.

In all the interviews I've seen from this time period, Bob always says that rock 'n' roll is basically what he and the band were doing from the beginning — mixing Black R&B and

blues with white country music, and giving it all a solid dance beat. Sometimes, though, if you read between the lines in those interviews, you can sense his frustration with not being able to appeal to the kids.

A few years ago, I taught a class on Oklahoma movies and music at OSU's Tulsa campus. Of course, we'd get into all of this, and then I'd ask them: Since Western swing embodied so many elements of rock 'n' roll, why weren't Bob and Johnnie Lee able to attract teens with their music?

I got a variety of answers every time I asked the question, and many of 'em were solid and thoughtful, but I think the main one remains obvious: Kids want their own music, and it's not going to be what their parents like. It wasn't Bob's music that turned teens off; it was his age — the fact that he was of their parents' generation. I think this also goes a long way toward explaining why he and Johnnie Lee and the rest of the band went to Vegas. Patrons of the casinos were older, and more likely to be Bob's contemporaries, age-wise.

So Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys never really became a rock 'n' roll act. But it's not because they didn't try. Always amenable to changing with the times, Bob played and recorded at least a few rockers, one of which starts this Saturday's edition (01/29/22) of SWING ON THIS.

JOHN WOOLEY is a writer, novelist, lecturer, filmmaker, and radio and TV host who specializes in the movies, literature, and music of the 1930s and '40s as well as other pop-culture history.

Play It Again!! (Part 2)

I've been lucky enough to play with many of my "idols", who turned out to be good friends. Some of the stars I was lucky enough to become friends with like Jim Reeves (a hamburger and coke in Idaho), Hank Thompson (I booked

him for an appearance in Port Angeles, WA), Conway Twitty (same deal), and Bob Wills (he autographed a 78 RPM of San Antonio Rose for me when I was 16... and, he never forgot me any time I showed up at one of his dances).

The names I was lucky enough to back as a side musician will come later in various stories. While in college at WSC (now WSU) in Pullman, I was playing accordion in a country western band, 'The Chucklers,' led by Chuck Snyder (later the voice of VIC-TROLA, the record machine on Stan Boreson's TV show for kids). We broadcast Monday nights on KWSC (1250) and played dances in Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho. When I turned 21 years old, I took my accordion down to Shadow Lake Ballroom and talked my way into a job with 'Bashful Billy Lee' and his band. Fiddlin' Dick Barrett and Bonnie Guitar joined and we had fun. Don Stark (steel), 'Dud' Durrie (drums) and Van Hamilton (guitar) were already on board.

After graduating I briefly worked a radio job at KGY in Olympia, WA, then joined the Navy. While stationed in Norfolk, VA., I sat in on piano and bass with 'Norman Phelps and The Virginia Rounders' several times. Then it was back to Seattle and The Circle Tavern with Jim Pierce and an afterhours gig with 'Dick Barrett and the Ranch Hands.'

Next was a job at The Flame Tavern with the Jack Rivers Band. This turned into a lifetime friendship and a great learning experience for me. Through Jack, I got to work TV shows in Seattle, WA, and Bakersfield, CA. I became the last bass player in the original 'Western Caravan,' led by Tex Williams and Smokey Rogers at the Bostonia Ballroom in El Cajon, CA.

Guest artists we backed included Patsy Cline, Cowboy Copas, Tommy Duncan and Freddy Hart. After heading back toward Seattle, I sat in with Sheets MacDonald's band and played a Saturday matinee at the Town Hall Party.

Then, it was back North to Lewiston, Idaho, and the famous 'Pair-A-Dice' club for two years, until my phone rang at 4 AM one morning. Stay tuned for details in the next issue!



Hello, from deep in the Heart of Texas! by Paula Jungmann



I ran across my first column in the NWWSMS newsletter from 2016 this morning and thought it might be a good time to update the happenings surrounding our great western swing music. For despite the lockdowns, in the past couple of years we've had some great things come about to bring more recognition to the music.

Through the pandemic we've kept our Facebook pages going. Getting used to digital technology and what it offers, many of us posted videos and events on YouTube, uploading live streams of music by our very talented artists. Studios have been busy during this down time, recording new music being performed by both new and established groups. The dance halls here in Texas are opened to bring live music to the fans although not yet at full capacity but getting closer. Dancers have been finding ways in lockdowns to remain active by dancing in their homes using their favorite artist's recordings.

For the first time in the history of **Bob Wills Day** the 2021 event, although smaller than in years past, was moved to September. This year the Official 50th Anniversary Celebration of the festival will be held again on the last weekend of April 2022.

November 11 to 13, 2021, the first **Cowtown Birthplace of Western Swing Festival** took place in historic Fort Worth - where the music began. The top Western Swing artists were there, gracing the stage at Ft Worth's historic National Hall. Everyone came out in their best western finery, all gussied up for a fine party. Plans are currently in the works for the 2nd Annual CBWS fest in 2022.

Bands are adding western swing music to their repertoire. Check out **The Academy of Western Artists**' directory. It has a worldwide listing of performing Western Swing Bands.

The producers of the **Cowtown Birthplace of Western Swing Festival** are working on a wonderful documentary, *The Birth and History of Western Swing* that will hopefully be out the Spring of 2022....

New CD's are out by Big Cedar Fever, Tumbleweeds, Billy Mata Cowboy, Crooner and Troubadours, Western Swing Authority LIVE In Full Swing. While Covid was raging our artists were working, providing medicine for our souls.

As far as my Facebook page, Western Swing Music of Texas, we added a Group by the same name that is growing by leaps and bounds. Our music fans, artists and radio stations are adding more content and there is more flexibility and room for growth. After just a couple of years the new group has grown to 8,000 fans. And, we still have the larger page with over 17,000 members who have access to the new group.



<u> Album Reviews</u>

Swingitude, under the direction of Grace Clark, has just released their first CD of 4 cuts with the spotlight on their fine musicians. Members of Swingitude include Grace Clark (vocals, rhythm guitar), Lisa Burns (bass fiddle), Dave Rietz (fiddle), Jimmy Spero (lead Guitar), Scott

Clark (drums), Billy Wilson (steel guitar), Joyce Woodson (harmony vocals), and Sylvia Herold (harmony vocals).

The album opens with an original tune, Dancin' with Swingitude - music and Lyrics by Grace Clark. Next is a Charlie Mercer favorite, I'm An Old Cowhand, followed by a Cindy Walker classic, Take Me In Your Arms and Hold Me, first recorded and released by Eddy Arnold, The Tennessee Plowboy and His Guitar in 1949. It has been recorded by Janice Harper, Cindy Walker, Tennessee Ernie Ford, Les Paul and Mary Ford and other artists but Eddy Arnold is credited with making it a hit. Swingitude ends on a lighter note with a well-known Cindy Walker favorite, also from the 1940s, It's All Your

Fault.


When I received the CD, what immediately struck me was the beautiful, richly designed CD cover and enclosed booklet. Once I listened to the selections, I realized the cover suited the arrangements and musical tone well.

Grace is currently playing Western Swing and Jazz music with **Swingitude**; however, Grace's musical beginnings are varied and deep. A multi-instrumentalist with a classical/roots background, Grace formerly co-founded and led the Brushy Peak Bluegrass Band and the Wild Rye Bluegrass Band.

INTRODUCING GRAHAM GRIFFITH



Graham Griffith first took up conventional guitar at 14, studying classical guitar. In his early 20s he played self taught fiddle in a jug band called the Cosmo Hamfat Entertainers. After seeing virtuoso pedal steel guitarist Kenny Kitching in 1976 he bought his first pedal steel guitar (a Sho-Bud double neck 10 string) and began investigating its complexities.

He later spent 3 months at the

end of 1978 with master instrument maker/player **Zane Beck** as well as playing in a local VFW club in Little Rock, Arkansas. He had adopted Zane's single neck 12 string E13th pedal steel tuning the year before. Zane instilled in Graham a love for jazz tunes, taking his playing beyond the usual country music "bag".

Back in Sydney, after 6 months in the States, Graham became further inspired by Sydney's **Jack Richards**, a close friend of famous Australian jazz guitarist George Golla. Jack had played guitar in ABC orchestras, hotels and clubs and taught music until retirement. Jack's brilliant playing of old standards on his own E6th pedal steel tuning further showed the way. Jack also designed the "Kord King" pedal steel guitar, 100 of which were manufactured in 1948 for Palings (a music store in Sydney).

Since that time Graham has played in many different contexts such as "western swing" (The Baylor Brothers), country (various artists, including Reg Lindsay, Anne Kirkpatrick, Ian B. MacLeod and the Rockabilly Express), country rock (the Wright Brothers) original (Mental as Anything, Fifty Million Beers) jazz (Ian Date, George Washingmachine, Roger Janes and Tom Baker), R&B (Donny Hop & the Kings of Bop) and Hawaiian (Hoola). He has also recorded with various bands and artists including The Welcome Matt, Knievel, Alan Caswell, Dave Steel, Jason Walker & Karl Broadie, WA pop band "Little Birdy" and Sydney band Wicked Beat Sound System.

With his wife Jenny, Graham plays in three local Sydney bands - "Out of Nowhere" which plays retro country, western swing and jazz standards, "Hoola" devoted to Hawaiian and island music mixed with old standards and more recently, "The Hokey Carmichaels" which blends the sound of pedal steel guitar with cornet and tenor sax. Graham also arranges parts for these bands. Graham is a founding member of Sydney originals band "50 Million Beers"

Graham played pedal steel with the indigenous group Mission Songs Project for an "Artist in Residence" performance at the Campbelltown Arts Centre in March 2017 and the 2018 Sydney Festival as well as performances in Melbourne, Brisbane and the Darwin Festival in August 2018.

Graham is a 2012 inductee into the Australian Steel Guitar Hall of Fame.

JIM WEBB'S MUSICAL HISTORY AS TOLD BY GRAHAM GRIFFITH

The tape (below) of the Seattle-based pedal steel guitarist Jim Webb (HOF 2002) playing with the **Jeff Young Group** was recorded on a Sony Cassette recorder placed on the bandstand close to Jim's amplifier. The whole band can be heard but the proximity to the steel guitar amplifier resulted in an excellent clarity highlighting Jim's technique. Jim recalls the group as: Jeff Young - bass & vocals Gary Grubb - guitar Ed Grant - drummer Jim Webb - pedal steel guitar **The Jeff Young Group** lasted less than a year.

(Jim continues with the story . . .) "What happened was Jeff Young hooked up with someone and basically fired the whole band and we all went our separate ways. I came back to Washington and went from there to Montana. That was in 1977. I played over there for 3 years and when that band broke up the guitar player (who was also the bandleader) and I went to San Jose in 1980. I had a job waiting with the same house band that was there in 1977. I stayed in San Jose and he wound up working at another club. But he didn't like it so he went back to Montana."

Born 1936, Jim Webb is a retired Seattle-based pedal steel guitarist. He was professionally active from 1956 to 1990. In 1950 at age 14 he took Hawaiian guitar lessons for 6 months with the Oahu School of Music but after 2 lessons he was working out tunes by himself from the radio. He was using a conventional Spanish guitar converted for Hawaiian style playing with a raised nut. During this time and afterwards he was self taught. In 1951 or 1952 he played 1st professional gig with another male student on guitar from the Oahu School at a library - they earned \$5 split 2 ways! Another early gig was the Senior Prom for High School. The trio had bass, guitar and lap Steel - there was enough money and so they hired a drummer. That gig was four hours on lap steel - amongst the repertoire Jim played Hawaiian tunes such as Maui Chimes; Hilo March from the Oahu course as well as popular tunes of the day. To play what he heard on the radio he was playing A6th: C6th before he finished his 6 month course; he was being used as an example of the course to sell the franchise. He guit when they cut him no slack to move him on to other tunings other than the E major tuning they were using (which proved boring



to the young Jim Webb). Through Paul Tutmarc's son Bud, he saw the famous Hawaiian steel guitarist Sol Hoopii play in Seattle. Sol played a song with a title similar to "Life's Railway to Heaven" imitating animal sounds. "Anyway Sol Hoopii was quite a star back in the 40's and 50's. I got to see him in person once and he was right up there with Jerry Byrd. Really good. I saw Sol Hoopii at some kind of religious function. He was still playing the pop and Hawaiian songs of the day but he had given them all Christian titles." A couple of his steel guitarist heroes were Jerry Byrd and Buddy Emmons.

By age 20 (c. 1956) Jim started playing professionally. From 1950 till 1959 he played both lap steel and guitar. He tuned his lap steel to C6th and A6th ("because you only had to change pitch on a couple of strings"). In 1959 he traded in his guitar, a Fender Stratocaster, on a Fender 400 pedal steel. He tuned it to F9th which he used like an E9th with one pedal lowering the top string to E and raising the 5th string to E and giving him C6th. About his move to pedal steel: "I struggled with tuning to figure out how Bud Isaacs was getting his sound and eventually realized he was using a pedal after remembering seeing the Gibson Electraharps as used by Alvino Rey." He also remembered Alvino Rey had a talking guitar well before Pete Drake's did it in 1964 recordings.

Jim got a job playing with the Jack Roberts band in 1961. Jack was a booker and performer - his band backed up major artists on tour. The band was on local TV on Saturdays (the show was taped on Wednesdays). The band usually played two dances a week besides the show for about 3 years. During the day Jim worked as a mailman. His first double neck pedal steel was made by Chuck Wright. He said it was a bad guitar with a long scale which meant you had to tune the E9th to C9th because of string breakages. It used cables like the Fender 400. The pedal stops were when the pedal touched the floor! It also had a solid bridge instead of fingers which affected accuracy. His next twin neck was another home-made instrument - a twin neck 9 stringer which was better than the Wright but not a professional level instrument like the Emmons twin neck he bought in February 1968. The Emmons became his professional instrument till he retired at age 54 in 1990. He still has this instrument.
