

In observance of the continuing State-wide shutdowns, the NWWSMS Board did not meet during the months of July through September 2021; however, e-mails were exchanged on two issues: the invitation to host a stage at the 2022 King County Fair and the break-in and loss of donated NWWSMS festival property at the Yearian's.


The Board Members were notified the NWWSMS has been invited to host a stage during the 2022 King County Fair. The Management is working on a budget and will let us know if there will be any funds available to help bring in entertainers. This year,

funding to help with the costs (offering small gifts of appreciation to the performers to cover gas and meals) was provided through sponsors. In addition, several of our entertainers donated their time and talent. We broke even without using any funds from the Society!

In August, the Yearian family home (thankfully, no one was home) was burgled. Among the property stolen, the thieves made off with over \$2,000 of decorations and equipment that had been lent or donated to the Society for use during the festival weekend. None of the Society's records were stored at that location.

Kessler Theater owner to purchase Longhorn Ballroom, where Willie Nelson, Sex Pistols, Selena played

Edwin Cabaniss (pictured left), owner of the Kessler Theater in Oak Cliff, is working to buy the Longhorn Ballroom. The legendary Dallas music club has hosted the likes of Willie

Nelson, the Sex Pistols and Selena.

What follows is the rest of the story . . . and perhaps an investment opportunity for someone interested in preserving a piece of western swing's rich legacy.

Edwin Cabaniss, the owner of the Kessler Theater in Oak Cliff, revealed Monday in an exclusive interview with *The Dallas Morning News* that he's working to complete the purchase of the Longhorn Ballroom, a legendary music venue that in recent years has fallen into disrepair.

Should Cabaniss succeed, he would save the Longhorn from the threat of demolition and place near downtown Dallas a renovated, state-of-the-art concert venue with a seating capacity as high as 2,000 — not to mention the Longhorn's rich history.

Bob (Wills) once rode a mule 50 miles to see Bessie in person. Look her up. Bessie Smith was a huge star beginning in 1923 with her hit, Downhearted Blues. Bob Wills recorded that twice, but it was not released. Note this is the first take

on Oh, Lady Be Good. Take 2 was the released version.

The following is a session in 1938, Bob was ill that day in Dallas. The band kinda did their own thing. Listen how long the solos are.



I've owned the film, *Take Me Back to Oklahoma* (below), for over twenty years, but this part was always so dark and fuzzy. I was finally able to make it look good and remove the film noise in the audio.

Editor's Note: Dick Heil, NWWSMS Co-Founder, retired and lives in Yuma with his wife, Dee. As we work on a history of the first 35 years of the NWWSMS, Dick has shared some entertaining and thoughtful stories from his musical past. Here is Part 1 of his new column.

# PLAY IT AGAIN!!

Grandma Heil bought me a 17 bass accordion in 1939. I wasn't interested in music until 1940, when I heard, by mistake, 'Bob

Wills Special', which was the flip side of 'New San Antonio Rose.' I just listened until 1942, whey my folks decided to try some lessons for me. That did it; and, I listened on a small radio to every bit of live music I could find.

I realized that the rhythm section was vital for a song to please my ears. I listened faithfully to 'Cherokee Jack and the Rhythm Ridin' Wranglers' and learned many of their songs by ear. My music teachers were astonished when I played my lessons as they discovered I had memorized the songs as they demonstrated them the week before.

My first paid job was in Tacoma, WA, at a fund-raising luncheon for West Coast Airlines. Money and applause hooked me, I admit, but the musicians I have become friends with are priceless and I'll be sharing some fun, strange, warm and educational stories as long as Jeanne needs me to. She has become a person I look up to for her sincere hard work to keep our Society on its feet, even if its legs are a bit wobbly today.

The number of musicians who know how and want to play Western Swing has drastically decreased but all styles of music experience revivals and 'come backs.' I'm sure Western Swing in the Northwest will too.

Hey! Just wait until the youngsters find out how much fun it is to hold a pretty girl or a handsome boy for 3 to 5 minutes during a song as opposed to

jumping up and down like a kangaroo with its tail in flames!

As Bob Wills said, "AH HA!!!" Intermission time, but I'll be back!

The ballroom opened in 1950, as a showcase for Bob Wills and his Texas Playboys. Over the years, it hosted such country superstars as Willie Nelson, Loretta Lynn and Merle Haggard, and such African American musical greats as Nat King Cole, Ray Charles and James Brown.

On a January night in 1978, the ballroom achieved international notoriety by hosting the avatars of British punk, the Sex Pistols, who broke up soon after their Dallas appearance.

Cabaniss is not yet the owner of the Longhorn: He has a contract to buy the building, and the sale is pending. He has the early support of the mayor of Dallas and Preservation Dallas, which had feared that, like so many buildings in the city, the ballroom would fall prey to demolition.





#### **HISTORIC MUSIC VENUE**

Cabaniss, 52, who saved the Kessler and The Heights Theater in Houston from a similar fate, said losing the Longhorn Ballroom is the last thing he would want to see happen. "The Longhorn has always been a Dallas landmark. And a Texas landmark. The Longhorn is widely considered Texas' most historic music venue," he said. "And when you look at the history of how it came about, and what's happened there, it's also been a cutting-edge place, celebrated for going into new territory."

Cabaniss sees it as "a fantastic opportunity that's on brand with Kessler Presents and what we've done for the past decade. We also see it as a historic preservation project. It's a real, authentic opportunity."

Dallas Mayor Eric Johnson agreed, saying in a statement to The News, "Edwin has done a great job with the Kessler Theater, and I am excited to see his plans to restore the historic Longhorn Ballroom — a hidden gem of Dallas. The venue is a living monument to our city's rich music history, and it is clear that it still has tremendous untapped potential."

David Preziosi, the executive director of Preservation Dallas, responded by saying in a statement to The News that the ballroom is "one of Texas' most iconic and unique music venues. Sadly, it is not protected from demolition for new development, making it one of Dallas' most endangered historic places."

"However, it may have found its champion with Edwin and his team. They have a successful track record of restoring and operating multiple historic venues across Texas. It will be a complicated project to return the Longhorn to its former glory, and together with Cabaniss and the full support of the city, as well as the preservation and cultural communities, this icon will surely come back to life."

If you're a student of Texas music history, Cabaniss said, "you know the relevance of the Longhorn Ballroom." And part of that relevance, he contends, has to do "with the untold story of how important that building has been to the African American community."

#### FROM RUBY TO VAUGHAN

Dallas millionaire O.L. Nelms opened the building more than 70 years ago as a showcase for his close friend, Bob Wills. Nelms later transferred operational duties to none other than Jack Ruby, who became infamous in 1963 for murdering Lee Harvey Oswald, the suspected assassin of President John F. Kennedy, in the basement of the Dallas police station. It was Ruby, Cabaniss said, who in the early 1950s chose to turn Sunday and Monday nights at the Longhorn into a showplace for major Black artists of the day, which he continued to do until he left the Longhorn to explore new opportunities. Ruby's ambitions eventually included the Carousel Club, a downtown strip joint, which he owned at the time of the assassination. "Jack Ruby operated the Longhorn for a couple of years in the 1950s," Cabaniss said. "This was a full decade before the civil rights movement. So, you had country and western nights on Friday and Saturday, and soul and blues nights on Sunday and Monday.

"Fast-forward to the mid- to late 1960s, and the guy that broke down both barriers" was crossover artist Charley Pride. As it turns out, the guys that had the most sellouts in the history of the Longhorn were Al Green and Charley Pride.



#### 'IT'S A SHELL'

The News reported in June 2020 that the property was "being sold out of bankruptcy after the previous owners defaulted on loans on the property." "It's a Chapter 7 liquidation sale," Dallas real estate broker Candace Rubin, who was hired by the federal bankruptcy court to sell the property, told The News. Rubin called it "a killer piece of property."

Cabaniss says his opportunity to purchase the property surfaced only in the last few months. He was intrigued, saying he feared the Longhorn "could be torn down and become just another mixed-use property for apartments. But it could also become a hub for the creative community." Should the Longhorn be demolished, "there is no question," he said, "that it would be gone forever." . . .


. . . "There is also a second building that will be mixeduse commercial," said Cabaniss, who prefers to call it "a creative center for entrepreneurs," given its possibilities as an office and retail space. "That's another 20,000 square feet. Another great opportunity will allow us to do outside music there, in a unique place, surrounded by the Trinity River levee. So, it's a unique opportunity to have three things going on."

The ballroom last functioned as a musical venue in 2019. The problem, however, is the property's condition. "We've had people that have squatted in there, who have stolen all the copper. The HVAC system is no longer valid. It's a shell that is in not-great shape. But having reclaimed and restored other historic properties, I would say that the Longhorn is in better shape than how we found the Kessler. Yes, it is going to be a restoration project, but we feel with the history that it has, it's worth the effort." . . .

. . . At the moment, Cabaniss has "an option to purchase. It's another way of saying we have the property under contract. And we are working with the city to talk about our very specific needs, to make this a viable project." Specifically, he said he needs help in four areas: "Drainage, curbs, sidewalk, lighting."

So, if all goes well, when does he hope to reopen? "No later than a year from today. The Longhorn was around a long time before I was. And, if we do it right, it'll be around a long time after I'm gone."
