## MINUTES FROM THE BOARD DECEMBER 9, 2018

President Jeanne Yearian called the meeting to order at 10:45 am.

**President's Report:** Nominations for Showcase Band of the Year are being received, \$5.00 for 5 votes! This fundraiser will continue through the end of January. The winner will be announced at the February Showcase.

Nominations are open for Inductees into the 2018 Hall of Fame.

The 2019 festival will take place from Thursday, August 8 through Sunday, August 11. Music workshops will begin on Wednesday and carry through the weekend. Jeanne paid half of the amount due on the Field House in Enumclaw. Our \$600 deposit carried over from last year.

Budgets for the year need to be submitted by the January meeting of the Board for approval. The four budgets of concern are: Newsletter Expenses, Festival Expenses, Music Workshops, and Administrative Costs (stamps, ink, cd materials, etc.)

We are truly going to miss the two members of the Board who are stepping down this year: Dave DuChane (Oppelt) and Shelley McNaughton. But, we do look forward to their continued involvement and contributions.

**Treasurer's Report:** Sharon Smith reporting. Printing Control is adjusting their original invoice. As soon as we receive word it is ready, it will be paid.

#### **Committee Reports:**

Sunshine: Jeanne Yearian reported.

Newsletter/Website/Facebook: Highlights from the 2019 Hall of Fame have been uploaded to YouTube. A Facebook post announcing the opening of nominations for the 2019 Inductees into the Hall of Fame was placed on our page (NWWSMS) as well as on the Western Swing Music group. Links to last year's ceremony highlights were included.

Showcase: The December Showcase Band will be JC McCormick and Cherokee. Butch Gibson will host the jam. In January we will hold the third Grand Jam, inviting up to 3 local bands to perform for 45 minutes, then have jammers join them for the last 15 minutes. Sharyn Lee and the Sundowners will be with us in February.

**Scholarship/Workshop:** Jeanne Yearian reporting. Discussions have continued.

Jeanne Yearian contacted Dan Wilson regarding Tacoma's Fight Against Crime music program. They are not set up to do more than collect money and/or instruments for the program at this time.

There has been no further contact with Washington Middle School.

Jeanne wrote a check to cover half of the cost of the venue. The last half will be due 30 days before the festival.

We do need a festival committee this year. Many of the issues/opportunities facing us this year take too much of the board's time to discuss at the monthly meeting. Sharon Smith, Sharon Capps, Tony Bachler and Jeanne Yearian volunteered. More are welcome!



#### **Cherishing the Memories**



**Bobby Wynne** 

Bobby Wynne was born in Lubbock, Texas, on November 13, 1937. As a small child, his number one desire was to play the violin; but, since he did not have that opportunity, the trumpet became his favorite instrument.

All of his young life

his favorite music was the sound of the big bands, Tommy Dorsey and Bob Wills were his favorites.

As Bobby was growing up, the sounds and type of music continued to change but western swing music was what he wanted to play. In the mid-1950s, at age 16, he performed with the Hank Thompson band. Later he became a regular in the Merl Lindsay band.

In the early 1960s, Bobby played with Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys for a short period. In 1964, Bobby had his own weekly television show in Clovis, New Mexico, where he recorded his very first record in 1963. Bobby Wynne was also playing western swing over in nearby Floydada, in the early sixties. In fact he started a band called Kings of Western Swing while working at the Ford house there and began playing weekends at the VFW in Plainview. Bobby sang & played trumpet well enough to travel with Hank Thompson.

While playing with the Hank Thompson band, he met his idol, steel guitarist Curley Chalker. In 1969, Bobby had his pedal steel made. For many years Bobby Wynne had his own band, playing big band and western swing music. When progressive music became the sound most demanded by night clubs, he gave up his band – but never his desire to play and promote his kind of music – western Swing.

Bobby was a member of the Khiva Shrine Temple in Amarillo, TX and served on its Board of Directors. In 1988, with the help of other Shrine members, Bobby organized the only chartered Shrine Western Swing Band in the United States. He led the band for over 10 years. Bobby also played with a local Amarillo band, Texas Pride, as he continued his lifelong dedication to Western Swing.

Among his many honors, Bobby was inducted into the Western Swing Society Hall of Fame in 1995. He was inducted into the Western Swing Society of Seattle (aka NWWSMS) in 1997. In 1998, Bobby went on to found the Western Swing Music Society of the Southwest along with Bob Cobb, Harry L. Coffman, Bill Gilbert and Jerry Emery.

#### MEET THE BOARD: DAVE ENSLOW, PART 2

LIFE BEFORE AND AFTER UW...

During World War II, when Dave was four, he and his family moved to Kirkland. His father was a hardworking man who built the family's house, worked at the shipyard and raised a vegetable garden. Dave's mom was a treasure and made their house a home. He has one older sister and a younger brother. Dave grew up loving cowboy music. Dave

especially loved the Sons of the Pioneers . . . and still does, but also enjoys artists like Marty Robbins and Bob Wills or any Western Swing groups.

When Dave was ten he was struck with a mild form of polio which slowed him down for some time. By High School, Dave was strong enough to participate in sports and played football throughout high school. Dave was recruited and chosen to go to University of Washington. During that time, the Huskies (Dave being a member of the team) won two Rose Bowls in 60 & 61 - see Dave Enslow, Part 1, in the December 2018 NWWSMS newsletter for all the details. Dave extended his time at the University of Washington (UW) as a graduate assistant football coach and head wrestling coach for two years.

After UW, Dave continued teaching and coaching at East High School in Bremerton for four years and then Mercer Island High School for ten years. During this time Dave had become involved in real estate and was doing well until the failure of the Boeing SST.

In 1974 Dave met his future wife, Maryanne, at St. Patrick's Catholic Church. They were married the same year and immediately started raising their family: David, John, Mary & Bob. Dave eventually took a job teaching and coaching at O'Dea High Then, while Dave was School. painting Holy Rosary Church in Edmonds, he fell off a ladder and sustained a severe head injury. It took some time to recover. During this time, Dave started playing his autoharp. Over a 20-year period Dave has played country music and sung at many various venues. When his wife, Maryanne, retired she became more and more involved with country music also.

## BEHIND EVERY GREAT VISION THERE IS A VISIONARY. MEET RAY REED.

(Editor's Note: Our thanks to Texas Playboy, Bobby Koefer, for alerting us to this article published by the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium. Be sure to watch the video at the end of this story to watch Bobby on stage performing at the first Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium!)

In 1990, the first Lincoln County Symposium Cowboy was held in Glencoe, New Mexico, at the Glencoe Rural Events Center. This "festival preserve and promote the cowboy way of life" was a vision that musician Ray Reed had been formulating in his mind for some time. Ray, a guitar picker, composer, bandleader, poet, promoter, singer a n d storyteller extraordinaire, was above all else a cowboy.

Ray was proud of the fact that his family moved west to New

He had spent some years in California, and his polished style reflects the influence of the 1930s Los Angeles music scene, where he was friendly with some of the Texas Playboys—the group backing legendary Texas Swing singer Bob Wills.

Mexico in the early 1900s. Traveling in a covered wagon, the Reed family settled outside of Clovis, New Mexico, and cowboyin' became a way of life for Ray. He had musical talent both as a singer and a guitar player. Hitching a ride in a boxcar in the 1930s he headed to California where he became part of the music scene in Los Angeles. He also met western swing legend Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys band. He became friends with many of the Playboy band members. When the drug scene took its toll on several of Ray's California musician friends, he headed back to New Mexico.

"I've been an entertainer dang near all my life. I do all the old cowboy songs from years back. I was raised a cowboy and that's what I've been."

But it soon seemed to Ray that his beloved culture was disappearing. A man of vision, he wanted a week-long festival highlighting his cowboy culture in the best light possible. Such a festival, he felt, would encourage others and promote and preserve that culture.

In 1989 Ray performed at the Inaugural National Cowboy Symposium and Celebration in Lubbock, Texas. The response he saw there was inspiring. It convinced him that good, fresh entertainment was what people were searching for. But he wanted more out of his festival than what he observed at the Lubbock event. Originally he envisioned Lincoln County, New Mexico, home of outlaw Billy the Kid, cattleman John Chisum and the Lincoln County War, as the setting for his cowboy symposium. Lincoln County was geographically situated in the south central mountains of New Mexico and embraced three distinct cultures responsible for the settlement of the west— Native American, Hispanic and the American Cowboy. He would bring these three distinct cultures together by showcasing the American Cowboy, who would share the stage with Mariachi entertainers and Mescalero Apache tribal members performing their original songs and dances.

Western swing music took center stage in his vision and would be accomplished by bringing in Johnny Gimble and reviving the Bob Wills' Texas Playboys. And to top off this festival honoring the American Cowboy was something near and dear to the cowboy's stomach, the chuckwagon.

Ray's dream came to fruition with the financial contributions and backing of current Ruidoso Downs racetrack owner, R. D. Hubbard and Hondo Oil and Gas owner, R. O. Anderson. That, plus the assistance of countless volunteers including R. O.'s cattleman, Sid Goodloe, the first Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium was held at the Glencoe Rural Events Center in 1990.

Since that early beginning, the Symposium has been featured on the Food Channel and outgrew its original site. It was moved to the site of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track & Casino.

Ray Reed passed away in the winter of 1998. He was doing what he loved to do best, promoting the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium on the road in his familiar "winnybagy" (Winnebago).





Larry Reed plays sax, Tony Ramsey - drums and John Jones plays stand-up bass and does vocal harmonies. Wayne Glasson plays piano, Tom Jones standard guitar and clarinet and vocal harmonies by Gil Prather.

This new CD is a wonderful combination of 15 songs where Tommy pays tribute to Western Swing legend Leon Rausch.

The music opens from the Bob Wills songbook with the old pop standard brought back by Wills, Yearning and then from Pee Wee King, Gad About. Also from Bob Wills are Lee Ross' Heart to Heart Talk, O.W. Mayo's Blues for Dixie, Cindy Walker's Goin' Away Party, End of the Line and the standard Sittin' on Top of the World. Then from the Wills library there is Hang Your Head in Shame, I Laugh When I Think How I Cried Over You and Cindy Walker's Baby That Sure Would Go Good. Also brought back are the Wills compositions and hits, My Confession, Goodby Liza Jane, Sooner or Later and Goodnight Little Sweetheart Goodnight.

The album closes with the instrumental from the Wills book and the Andy Razaf pen, Silver Lake Blues.

# HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE DECEMBER 2018 SHOWCASE WITH JC McCormick & The Cherokee Band

Our December showcase was masterfully led by one of our favorite Northwest groups, JC McCormick and The Cherokee Band. This great group of musicians have been entertaining folks in the southern Puget Sound area for many years.

JC's big warm vocals and extensive song list, along with the great instrumental backing from the band are a pleasure to experience. This group really knows how to keep us up and dancing, snapping our fingers, and mostly... keep us feeling oh-so entertained.

The Cherokee Band is: JC McCormick – Bass and Lead Vocalist, Chet Hastings – Lead Guitar, Jeanne Yearian – Electric Fiddle, Wayne Franco – Steel Guitar, and Danny "Tex" Slough – Drums.

The Cherokee Band opened the December showcase with a wonderful instrumental piece of Americana "The Wildwood Flower." From there on out, we were treated to song after song of great music. The dance floor filled up and stayed full for the entire Cherokee Band Set!

JC, as the lead singer of this band, showed his musical versatility in the many different styles he presented. Of course, we could see some of his favorite musical influences from his selection of several Hank Thompsons favorites, "6-Pack to Go," "She's Just a Whole Lot Like You" "Green Light" & "Tomorrow Night (You'll Have Another Sweetheart)," as well as from few of Ray Prices greatest tunes, "Invitation to the Blues," and "The Other Woman," and "A Way to Survive."

Whether performing one of the great selections mentioned above, or bringing us something completely different, such as Ned Miller's "From a Jack to a King" and Al Martino's Blue Spanish Eyes, or a traditional piece for the season in "White Christmas," JC puts a little of his own style into every song he sings. He's a big, friendly bear of a guy, and we just love to hear him. With the expert musicianship backing him up, every song is unique, fun, and entertaining.

Now let's talk about those terrific instrumental pieces.

Scattered in between the great vocal number were some beautiful gem Instrumentals. Chet Hasting's fine guitar picking took the lead on one gorgeous Western Swing ¾ standard, "The Waltz you Save for Me," and Jeanne Yearian dazzled us with another, taking the fiddle lead on "The Westphalia Waltz." (Here's an Interesting Note: The Westphalia waltz, started as a traditional Polish Folk song titled "Pytala Sie Pani" and was metamorphosed in the 1940's with the help of Cotton Collins and the Waco based Swing band, The Lonestar Playboys, who renamed it after a small town about 30 miles from Waco Texas. They turned it into a staple of Texas swing fiddle waltz tunes. It is also listed as one of Missouri's 100 essential fiddle tunes. Also, if you listen to the lead in TG Shepard's Last Cheaters Waltz, the Lead break in that song is the Westphalia Waltz. Pretty Cool, Huh?)

Wayne Franco was there to shine as he led the group on two of our favorite Pedal Steel Pieces, Bob Wills and the Texas Playboy's "The Panhandle Rag" and Leon McAuliffe's "Steel Guitar Rag." (Did you know that Merle Travis wrote words to this one?)

Of course, holding this group together and keeping impeccable time and beat, regardless of style or genre, was Danny "Tex" Slough.

The time passed so quickly and before we knew it, JC was closing The Cherokee band set with Merle Travis' "Nine Pound Hammer." As always, with this band, we were left wanting more. Thank you again, JC McCormick and The Cherokee Band, for a wonderful showcase!!

While the Cherokee Band was clearing the stage, we drew for door prizes galore, (Thanks to everyone who donated door prizes for our holiday giveaway!) and made a few announcements.

At our western swing jams, novice musicians are mixed with experienced players on stage and perform songs together. The 'jam band leader' will ensure there is an experienced drummer, bass player, rhythm guitar and at least one lead instrument on stage during their set. The leader of the jam band will run the stage and 'direct traffic' (see page 6 of this newsletter for more on directing traffic).

Here are some jam etiquette guidelines I compiled from various sources. Some pertain to the way the NWWSMS conducts jam sessions but most would be valuable no matter whose jam you are joining.

#### Before You Go

- Learning a bit about Western Swing music with a few basic licks helps a great deal.
- Bring your own instrument, tuner, amp, cords, etc. You may be able to plug into someone's amp, but that might not be the case. Drums are usually provided.
- Leave the big amp home—Moderate stage volumes are expected. (More on stage volume to follow)
- Keep it simple—Don't bring a complex rig/pedal board that takes a long time to set up.

#### At the Jam

- **Sign the List** When you arrive, find the sign-up list and get your name on it. The Host will call players for each set. You will not be called up to play unless you sign up.
- Talk to the Host It's a great idea to have a word with whoever is hosting the jam to let him/her know your level of experience and if you would like to play with anyone in particular.
- Tune up before you get on stage -Tuning on stage will only irritate the other players who are waiting their turn.

#### On the Stage

- **Be efficient** Set up time should be kept to a minimum. When your set is finished, get off stage as quickly as possible. Other jammers are waiting their turn.
- Never place your drink on top of an amp, especially if it's not yours.
- Watch the jam band leader as well as the singer for direction Either the singer or the jam band leader makes sure that everyone on stage has a chance to solo. If you don't want to solo, let them know.
- If you are the Singer -Try to call out songs that fall into the core western swing repertoire songs that your fellow jammers will be comfortable with and that don't require a lot of description. Beware the 'jam-busters' that no one has a clue how to play unless the jam is being dedicated to obscure tunes.
- **Listen** Fit your instrument into the song and listen to what other players are doing. Trade fills with others. Only solo when asked.
- **Don't step on people** In other words, don't play over the vocals or over someone else's solo. If you are playing rhythm/comping, keep it tasteful. The time to solo is during your own solo break.

#### Classic Western Guitar Intensive

Self taught, John has been playing guitar since age 11, and focused on Classic Western style for the past 16 years. He is equally accomplished on mandolin and bass. John has performed professionally since 1994, plays rhythm guitar and sings baritone with the Sons Of The Pioneers

This rhythm guitar class will address the principals that make up the driving force behind complex harmony singing in the Classic Western style of the Sons Of The Pioneers.

- ★ Development of right-hand rhythm technique
- ★ The plectrum device
- ★ Tone production, Pulse, Timing, Pacing
- ★ Essential rhythm patterns
- ★ Stylistic matching
- ★ Development of left-hand technique
- ★ Movable closed chord voicing
- \* Navigating the fingerboard
- ★ Damping
- ★ Sliding in/out of chords using leading tones
- ★ Skill-building techniques and exercises
- ★ Tone Production concepts
- ★ Scales (major, relative minor)
- Corresponding harmonized scales in three and four note chords
- ★ Blending stacked instrumentation

Articulating it all together to create a steady, smooth, driving force is the goal.

Handouts will be provided in chord frame form with essential left hand fingering patterns to facilitate the chord voicing. Rhythm patterns will be demonstrated with historical recordings and up close demonstration. Chord progression charts will be provided for several selections of Classic Western music. Some singing may be used as part of the learning process, but not a prerequisite for the class.

Participants should arrive at this class with an open mind, prepared to focus on right hand technique, explore movable chord forms up and down the fingerboard of their guitar and to thoroughly enjoy becoming mesmerized by the beauty of this historic music. They should have working knowledge of major scales as well as harmonized scales and be comfortable using a rather thick flatpick. (Flatpicks will be available)

Upon completion of this class, participants may expect to come away with new and improved rhythm skills, an expanded chord vocabulary with a great appreciation of the

role of a strong rhythm guitar player in a vocal group. They will gain an understanding of the historical significance of Classic Western music and the instrumentalists that have maintained the style for over 85 years.

This class is intended for individuals who are of intermediate to advanced skill levels.

Suze Spencer was born into one of America's most renowned Western Music families - The International Cowboys and the legendary Sons Of The Pioneers. Raised in the fold of working ranch hands, musicians, artists and entrepreneurs, Suze's grandparents and extended family were her vibrant mentors. Suze began learning guitar at age three from her grandfather and Karl Farr who was the original guitarist with Sons Of The Pioneers. She has continued to learn from many members of the group throughout her lifetime. In late 2005 she released her highly acclaimed album "Tall Boots, Rare Gems of America's Western Music Pioneers. In 2006 she along with 'Ranger' Doug Green of Riders In The Sky, published a guitar instructional book through Centerstream Publishing; "Rhythm Guitar, The Ranger Doug Way". She teaches master classes in the Classic Western style and Western Swing style at university level and at music camps all across the USA.

- **Keep it tasteful** When soloing, show off your chops, but play within your means. If you are a novice/intermediate player stay within your comfort zone. Look to the singer or jam band leader for cues to continue or pass the solo on.
- **Don't Play Loudly** Most of us have some degree of hearing loss, so, for example, if the drummer/bass player sets the volume too high, everyone turns up their amps so they can hear themselves and the vicious cycle of rising stage volume begins. It doesn't take much to drown out the vocalist. Also, the lead players should turn down their instrument volume after their lead ride or solo.

#### After Your Set

- Thank the Band Remember to thank the musicians who just shared the stage with you.
- **Thank the Venue** Remember to thank the venue for holding the jam and supporting live music *(buying something to eat or drink is also much appreciated).*
- **Mutual Respect** Most of the etiquette at jam sessions comes down to having a certain amount of respect for the abilities, but more importantly, for the feelings of the other people involved in the session.

Ready to give it a try? After playing 10-20 jam sessions you will have learned more about music, about communication, stagecraft and about yourself than you could have learned by playing solo or practicing for a whole year at home! So come on out and let's kick off the New Year with music! JY

## **Directing Traffic** *Tips for Jammers*

It's easy to get lost on stage but, if you do, it's comforting to know that there's usually someone there directing traffic. This is especially helpful in situations where verbal instructions are not practical - for example, when stage

volume may have crept above the level where you can hear unamplified voices.

At one of our jam sessions, I watched as Paul Anastasio did his best to keep the jam band moving through the correct chord changes.

During a song, if Paul holds up his first finger, he's telling the musicians to go to the 1 *(or root)* chord. If he holds up all fingers, he's directing them to the 5 chord. So, we must all

develop the ability to follow this direction regardless of the key we are playing in.

The number system can go into more depth than this. For instance, if there's confusion about what key we're going to play in, Paul could hold up 1 finger. In this instance, Paul is telling us that the song is in the key of G (the key of G has 1 sharp - the key of D has 2 sharps etc.. See chart to the right).

A bass player who knows the chord progression can also lead a band through the correct changes by choosing bass notes that lead the band to the next chord. In truth all instruments have the ability to lead when there is confusion. It's important that we listen closely


and watch for anyone who can throw out directions using hand signs.

We're hopefully not up there to show off our licks. We're there to play TOGETHER a HAVE FUN.

#### Didn't catch the key of the next song?

Someone could give you the information using their hands. Here is what they would be saying. They would be noting the number of sharps or flats in the song. (The position of the hand would be either straight up for sharps or the key of C- no sharps or flats - OR pointing down towards the ground to indicate the number of flats.)





Remember the primary goal of the jam: Coming together to have fun playing, singing, listening and dancing to Western Swing music!
