Preserving the music that is too country for Jazz and too jazz for Country

(Editor's Note: Our sincere thanks to Ray Miller-Still with the Enumclaw Courier-Herald for the following article on the 2019 NWWSMS festival. It is reprinted below with minor changes to the dates and information for 2022.)

WESTERN SWING FESTIVAL HOSTS EDUCATIONAL MUSIC CAMP FOR ASPIRING

ARTISTS hosted at the Enumclaw Expo Center Field House.

It's never too late to learn a new skill — which is why the 30th annual Western Swing Music Festival is hosting its second Western Swing Music Camp before the festival begins.

The whole event is organized by the Northwest Western Swing Music Society, which has been hootin' and hollerin' in Washington since it formed in 1983.

For those not in the know, Western Swing is a highly improvisational form of country jazz that was born in midwestern states in the early 1920s and '30s. One of its key features is the use of rural string instruments, like steel guitars and twin fiddles, rather than the traditional big band instruments that were also popular during this time period.

But it's not just the music that makes Western Swing so lively, said Jeanne

Yearian, the Northwest Western Music Society president and Maple Valley/Renton resident.

"The dancers and the people listening help make the music," she said in a previous interview. "Their interaction with the people on stage, with the musicians, their feedback, that give-and-take, helps make the music."

The Western Swing Music Festival, from Thursday, Aug. 11 to Saturday, Aug. 13, is filled with dozens of live performances, jam session opportunities, and — of course — an open dance floor, all topped with a Western Swing Hall of Fame induction ceremony on Saturday morning. They have also agreed to a brief tour of the Field House, especially the downstairs, to check on room availability for workshop breakout sessions and jams. Photos to come. Jeanne hopes to have the Summer Camp brochures/applications completed by Tuesday and leave some at the Expo Center office.

Jeanne contacted Mike Markwardt, the producer of the documentary, **The Birth & History of Western Swing,** about arranging a private screening during the festival. He said he will leave the decision as to whether this would be a positive arrangement up to the Society.

Submission of Bills/Vote to Pay: The \$294.00 bill to pay the fee for the NWWSMS PO Box was approved for payment..

Committee Reports:

Newsletter/Website/Facebook - Jeanne Yearian

Newsletter: The March-June newsletter was posted on the website as well as Facebook. Jeanne is planning to print copies at home to send out instead of using outside printing services.

Additions/Changes to newsletter: Once the Hall of Fame Inductees for this year have been chosen, a 4-page news brief will be sent out with the listing of honorees and additional festival information.

Additions/Changes to website/Facebook: Updates to the website were delayed

Membership – Lori Hanson: Lori Hanson presented a membership update to the Board. She is compiling a new membership listing which will eventually include the honorary members of the Hall of Fame as well as paying members with voting privileges.

Showcase – Butch Gibson (Jeanne Yearian reporting for Butch)

Lady Luck Steakhouse, Tacoma: 3 showcases (May, June, July), then a review. No charge, possibly a donation from the Club if we bring in enough business. Same format as Lynnwood but begins at 4PM: 2 hour set by host band followed by short intermission while the stage is reset for the jam session. 50/50 with drawing around 6 PM.

May Showcase Band: Butch Gibson & Pardners

Dancers: Jeanne has contacted both Robert Cottrell
and Ron Bolin, who send out dance calendars to

South Sound (Robert) and North Sound (Ron) dance communities. They will be posting the Showcases and the August Festival on their calendars that go out weekly to their dancers. Robert and the South Sound community used to attend the western swing festivals held at the Auburn Eagles and have very fond memories of the event. They did not know we had moved the festival to Enumclaw and are looking forward to trying out the new dance venue.

Charge for Showcase Dances: At the end of 2019 the Society began asking for a \$2.00 donation from non-members to attend the dance. Members were admitted free of charge. After discussion, it was decided to raise the donation request to \$5.00 for guests. A motion was made and seconded. The motion passed.

Sunshine – Jeanne Yearian & Lori Hanson No report given.

King County Fair Update – Jeanne Yearian: Jeanne will meet with Lynn Kopelke on Tuesday, before meeting with Expo Center staff.

2022 Western Swing Festival – Jeanne Yearian It was decided that the daily entrance fee for this year's festival will be \$10.00/person/day. Since Brown Paper Tickets is no longer available, we may not have an online option this year.

Nominations continue to come in. So far there have been 8 submitted. They will be forwarded on to Morey Sullivan and the Nominating Committee by April 15 for their consideration.

Lori Hanson announced that Tony Arana has offered to run the jam this year. The jam room will open at 1 PM on Friday and again at 1 PM on Saturday (after the Induction Ceremony).

Scholarship/Workshop Committee Report – Jeanne Yearian

Jeanne Yearian, Toby Hanson and Suze Spencer have been meeting to discuss this year's program. The brochure, summer camp application and scholarship application have all been updated and are nearly ready to post and distribute. Members of the Board should have received them along with this agenda. Camp admission fees have been kept low to encourage attendance. Motel costs alone have risen 50%. We did receive a discount from both the Rodeway Inn (next to the venue) and the Econolodge (in Buckley).

Unfinished Business: No report given.

New Business: It was decided special NWWSMS festival musicians will be chosen to help complete bands who couldn't attend with all of their members. These musicians will wear a special tag so they will be easily identified by band leaders.

The next meeting will be held on Saturday, May 7, 2022, at 10 AM PST. Lori Hanson will be sending out the Zoom link.

Let me encourage you to take part in this year's music at the festival. There are so many ways to enjoy it, either by joining one of the jam sessions around the venue, or dancing to the scheduled entertainment in the ballroom. We have a wide variety of performers coming from around the country, spotlighting seasoned professionals as well as those who are content playing weekend gigs. We appreciate every one of them, helping to keep western swing music alive.

Did you ever wonder how the Societies come up with so much variety and talent? The answer to that question is twofold: tradition and love of the music. When the western swing societies first began, over 30 years ago, the musicians agreed that they would gather together just to play western swing music for the pure enjoyment of the musical style.

In the beginning, they would open their gatherings to the public, charging just enough to cover the rental cost of the venue. Most still have a free first night of dancing to make sure everyone can take part and enjoy the music. The musicians never received any money for sharing their talent and time. That is still true today. None of the musicians performing at the annual festival receive compensation outside of the immense appreciation of the audience! Money not reserved for the cost of the venue goes into a scholarship fund. Let's show these musicians just how much sharing their music means to us. Smile, hoot or holler as you dance past the stage or purchase CDs displayed on tables around the hall.

Cherishing the Memories



Dr. Jean A. Boyd

Jean Boyd, 74, passed away Monday, May 9, 2022.

Jean was born in Fort Worth and began playing piano the at age of 5. Music quickly became her lifelong passion, and she graduated from Baylor University in 1970 with Bachelor's degree in

Church Music and again in 1972 with a Master's degree in Music History. She went on to earn a PhD in Musicology from the University of Texas in 1985.

Jean was a beloved Baylor faculty member from 1972 until her retirement in 2020. She was a passionate educator, and nearly every Baylor music major experienced her unique talent for bringing music history to life during those 48 years. She was a devoted teacher and colleague, but her true passion above all was her students. Her office door was always open, and it was her honor to serve as a teacher, mentor, and advisor to her students throughout her tenure at Baylor. She also served as the sponsor of the Phi Xi chapter of Mu Phi Epsilon at the Baylor School of Music and was a member of the faculty senate for many years. She was an American Music Scholar and expert on Western Swing music, publishing three books and numerous periodicals on the subject, as well as presenting at countless events and professional meetings. Jean had begun working on her fourth western-swing book, to document and explain the spread of western swing all over the United States, to Canada, Australia, and parts of Europe.

Jean Boyd was inducted into the NWWSMS in 2018.

A scholarship in Dr. Boyd's memory is being established, and the family welcomes you to contribute in advance. Dee Kenneth "Ken" Jones played and promoted Western Swing m u s i c professionally ever since childhood. Born into a musical family, Ken Jones started learning to play drums when he was

only five years

old. His dad taught him the basic guitar chords and, by age eight, he was playing drums and guitar in his dad's band, **The Oklahoma Playboys.** He later took guitar lessons from world-renowned guitarist Eldon Shamblin, who lived in Tulsa and played with Bob Wills for many years. Ken practiced and took lessons as often as possible, becoming better all the time, loving every minute of it, as music was in his blood. He also practiced and became proficient in playing steel guitar and bass.

While growing up, Ken worked in the family-owned Jones Grocery & Hardware Store in Kiowa that Ken still owns today. At 14 years of age, he drove a 1-ton flatbed truck, delivering everything sold in the family store. In 1954, his dad established and operated a large dance hall in Kiowa, known as The Big Red Dance Barn, which became the center for Western Swing music in that area. When Ken's father met an untimely death in a car crash caused by a drunk driver behind the wheel of the other car, Ken inherited and became manager of both businesses. One of the persons he did business with was Sam Walton, founder of Wal-Mart, who worked out of his car back then and would come and park in front of the Jones' store.

Running The Big Red Dance Barn, Ken had his own 8-piece band but, from time to time, booked in some of the most popular Western Swing bands of that era, including Bob Wills, Johnnie Lee Wills, Miller Brothers, Merle Lindsay, Hank Thompson and others. Willie Nelson and his Trio were booked regularly, every third Wednesday. Ken also held regular jam sessions where numerous youngsters would come and sing, including the then teen-age Reba McEntire.

Over the years, Ken played with many of the most famous Western Swing musicians and bands in the country, such as Johnnie Lee Wills, Hank Thompson, Ray Price, Johnny Gimble, Jody Miller, and Gene Gasaway, just to name a few.

In 2014 Ken was inducted into both the NWWSMS and the WSMSS Halls of Fame.

Ken was a passionate caretaker of animals and made sure homeless animals in the area received food and care. His final wish was to start an endowment fund for homeless animals

When he was only 5 years old, he had already learned to play a standard guitar. When

Stan was 7 years old, he was struck with polio and was bedfast for several months. During this time his dad bought him a single neck steel guitar, and he learned to play it in a short period of time. By the time he was 8 and recovering from polio, he was impressing a lot of musicians, playing steel guitar.

Merle Lindsey had a TV show in Oklahoma City and he invited Stan several times to come and play on his show. Once Lefty Frizzell was a guest on his show at the same time as Stan. Stan still couldn't walk very well, so Lefty carried him out to the stage and set him on the stool so he could play.

In 1971, a farm machinery accident cut off the ends of his fingers on his right hand. He could no longer hold the picks to play the steel guitar, so he got serious with the saxophone. Wes Potts had come off of Ray Price's band and put together a group in Woodward, Oklahoma and Stan worked with that band for several years.

Stan worked several jobs with Eddie McAlvain beginning in the 60's. When Eddie formed The Maverick Western Swing Band. Stan was one of the first musicians Eddie asked to come aboard. Stan remained a Maverick.

Some of the highlights of Stan's musical successes included opening for George Jones and Ray Price and traveling to Bosnia with Eddie McAlvain's Maverick Western Swing Band, where they entertained the American troops. Stan performed at the Senior National Finals Rodeo in Amarillo, Texas, and played every year at Bob Wills Day in Turkey, Texas, with Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys.

Stan was inducted into the Country Music Western Swing Hall of Fame multiple times. His Hall of Fame plaque is displayed alongside other well-known musicians such as Merle Haggard, Bob Wills, Hank Thompson, and Mel Tillis.

Stan was blessed to fulfill his dreams of leading a life of adventure that all began growing up on his grandfather's homestead beside the salt flats of the Cimarron River.

In 1996, Stan Schroeder was inducted into the Sacramento, California Western Swing Hall of fame and in 1999 into the Seattle Pioneers of Western Swing Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the WSMSS Hall of Fame in 2015.

Once again this year, in honor of the late Mayme "Lou" Bischoff, a dedicated member of the Northwest Western Swing Music Society, first responders (active duty police, firefighters, and EMS) are being provided free admission to the festival, plus one complimentary meal and beverage every day.

"In her immediate family were several first responders and veterans," Yearian said. "She took every opportunity to express her admiration and gratefulness for

their contributions to our communities and country. Her expressions carried over into western swing functions, honoring their service during showcases and festivals."

But to get chord fingers stretched and dance feet loose, Suze (pronounced Suzie) Spencer will be leading the Western Swing Camp from Aug. 10 to the 13 in order to teach folks how to jam, play with a western swing band, and move along to the music.

"Music is a wonderful thing," Spencer said. "It gives you something positive to do. It's very good for the brain and the neuron connectors. And it's the same thing with dancing — we all have busy lives, and sometimes stressful lives, and there's just nothing so stimulating in a relaxing way [than]

playing music and dancing."

Spencer hails from a family prominent in the Western Swing scene, with her grandfather having performed with several prominent leaders of the Western Swing movement in the 1930s. She also grew up watching Karl Farr, the original guitarist with the Sons of the Pioneers.

In the late '80s, she managed a music store and for 15 years, taught immersive Western Swing music lessons; Spencer continues to teach individual and group music lessons around southern Washington at festivals, universities, and camps.

This particular camp won't be for people completely unfamiliar with an instrument — you should already know the basics, she said. "We'll work with the people who are a little less accomplished because the whole idea is to get them more accomplished, but it isn't [time to] borrow a guitar and take a class [you've] never done before," Spencer continued. "They might have a hard time."

Nearly any instrument can be incorporated into a Western Swing Band, so feel free to bring your accordion or harmonica. And if you can't play any instrument, you're certainly welcome to come sing.

"It's fun to make music with your friends," Spencer said. "Making music with your friends is emotionally, socially, and intellectually stimulating... [and] it's much more fun to play music with others, because you have to learn to speak the language, and you're speaking the musical language with other people."

She hopes that younger musicians will come to learn the Western Swing style and play along with some of the old timers. "It doesn't matter what your age is — when you're playing music together, it makes no different at all," she said. "There's not a lot of things multiple generations can participate in together on an equal level."

The camp starts off at 1 p.m. on Wednesday, Aug. 10 at the Expo Center Field House with attendee check-in, teacher introductions, and class descriptions. . . Sign up before July 15 to receive a discount on the cost of the workshop/festival bundle.



Driving Directions to the NWWSMS Festival Venue

THE HISTORIC FIELD HOUSE

a.k.a. Pete's Pool 1456 ROOSEVELT AVE. E, ENUMCLAW, WA

From SEATAC/Seattle: Head towards Renton on Hwy 405. Take the Maple Valley Exit. Follow the directions below.

From Hwy 405 heading South: Take Exit #4. Go through first traffic light, moving left. At the second light, Maple Valley Hwy, turn left, going under Hwy 405. Continue on Maple Valley Hwy/ 169 for approximately 20 miles. In Enumclaw, follow the signs for the Expo Center. Turn left onto Hwy 410, heading East. Pass through the traffic light at 284th Ave. SE, continuing on Hwy 410 another 300 feet. Turn right into the Field House parking!

From Auburn: Take Auburn Way Southeast (Hwy 164), past the casinos, into Enumclaw.

For Those Coming North on 15: Take the exit to Puvallup/Hwy 512. Stay in the right lane and exit onto


Hwy 167. Staying in the right lane, take the next exit to Hwy 410. Follow Hwy 410 to Enumclaw, turning right into the Field House parking lot after the light at 284th.

From Eastern WA on Hwy 90: Heading West, go on Hwy 18 to the South. Exit to 231st; make a left turn onto 231st. Make a right turn at the second traffic light onto Hwy 169. Stay in the left lane and follow Hwy 169 to Enumclaw. Turn left onto Hwy 410, heading East. Pass through the traffic light at 284th Ave. SE, continuing on Hwy 410 another 300 feet. Turn right into the Field House parking lot!

From Yakima: Take Hwy 410, watching for the Field House on the left. The entrance will be before the Rodeway Inn, also on the left.

ROAD WORK ALERT: For road construction updates, check the Washington DOT website: www.wsdot.wa.gov OR dial 511.

ATTENTION RV'ers: Turn South on 284th off of Hwy 410. Enter the parking lot behind the Field House, next to the play field. Dry camping is free of charge this year! The RV park is full.

Texas Playgirl,' Opry performer and Oklahoma Music Hall of Famer Ramona Reed dies

Ramona Reed's singing voice took her to the Grand Ole Opry as a teen and won her a gig as a "playgirl" with a legendary Western swing band, Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys. She died Saturday, her family confirmed. She was 91.

In addition to touring and recording with Wills (including the duet "Little Girl, Little Girl"), Reed made appearances on the Opry as Martha White on behalf of a flour company.

Selected for the Oklahoma Music Hall of Fame in 2009, Reed was born in Talihina, Oklahoma. She grew up on a farm and, as a child, sometimes sang to farm animals. "I used to climb aboard our smokehouse and sing so all the neighbors could hear me," Reed wrote in a manuscript she kept in case she wrote a book about her life. "I would pretend that I was on some radio station or singing in a movie. I was quite confident that someday I would be singing on the radio or in a Western movie."

During her early years, Reed auditioned at Tulsa radio stations to try to get her career jump-started. She visited Cain's Ballroom to watch Johnnie Lee Wills do a radio show. "Little did I dream that I would be singing on that stage some day with Bob Wills," Reed said in her manuscript.



Very seldom can I say this about any collection of songs, "These are all musical Cadillacs in this set and should satisfy all Wester Swing and Swing Jazz fans alike." The only bad news is the fact that it's only on download and not on CD or tape. So here is the download:

Good news!! Dix Bruce cleaned out his closet! Better news!!! He found tapes of a 29song jam session with Tiny Moore (fiddle and electric mandolin), Dick Whittington on piano, Bobb Fisher on bass and Vince Laserno on drums! This is genuine 'ear-candy' for folks who like western swing and jazz combined. Mv Blue Heaven starts and Exactly Like You closes the show with tunes like Perdido, A Train, Over the Rainbow, Honeysuckle Rose, and It Had to Be You, in between. Tiny sings the only vocal, Take Me Back to Tulsa. Amazingly there was no rehearsal. Tiny called the tunes and keys, counted off the tempo and the fun began. Every tune was the best and that's amazing in itself. Besides the music for the 'Jumpers and Swingers' we have Over The Rainbow and Georgia On My Mind for the 'relaxers.

Reed tried out for Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys in 1950. "Bob Wills was sitting out in front, and he was smoking that cigar," Reed told the Tulsa World in a 2020 interview. "I could not tell if he liked what I was doing or not. Finally, I had sung just about everything I thought I knew. So I kicked off my shoes and I sang the rest barefoot. He kind of liked that." More importantly, Wills liked what he heard. "You not only sound like I always wanted a girl singer to sing," Wills told Reed following the audition. "You even look like I wanted a girl singer to look." And that's how a barefoot country girl from southeastern Oklahoma became a Texas Playgirl.

When Reed was selected for the Oklahoma Music Hall of Fame, fellow inductees included Rocky Frisco and Carrie Underwood. Underwood told Reed's children she learned to yodel by listening to Reed, according to Reed's daughter Karen Smallwood. Said Smallwood: "She was in awe of meeting mother. It was really pretty cool." Reed's parents told her she was singing and yodeling by the time she was walking. At age 15, she was performing weekly at a radio station in McAlester. In the summer of 1948, when Reed was 17, she felt compelled to go to Nashville. Her mother drove her there. Reed popped into radio station WSM for an audition and was invited to be on the station's "Noontime Neighbor Show" that day. By the following Saturday, she was sharing a Grand Ole Opry stage with Roy Acuff, who introduced her as "not as big as a minute and cute as a bug's ear." WSM program director Jack Stapp urged Reed to return to school (Colorado Women's College) and come back to Nashville the next year. She took his advice.

When Reed returned, Grand Ole Opry sponsor the Martha White flour brand needed someone to embody the character Martha White. The flour company had a Martha, recalled Reed, but she wasn't ideal for the part, so Reed was invited to be the new Martha. She declined, saying she wanted to make a name for herself instead of using Martha's name.

When Reed returned to Oklahoma, however, she had a change of heart. She wrote a letter saying she would like to be Martha after all. Reed didn't get a response right away, giving her reason to be concerned, but when the response arrived, it was, "Can you be here Saturday for the Opry?" Reed was hired to make appearances and perform as "Martha" on the Opry every Friday and Saturday night, in addition to making daily

morning appearances on WSM. She shared a dressing room with Minnie Pearl at the Opry. "There weren't any other girls on the Opry at that time," Reed told the Voices of Oklahoma oral history project. "I mean, there had been some, and there were some later, but there weren't any then." Reed felt fortunate to be around Opry performers she admired, but two years as Martha was enough. She returned home, not knowing what her next step should be.

"Mr. Taylor, our dear old neighbor who lived across the road from us, told Daddy that he was worried about me sitting outside looking sad for long periods of time," Reed wrote in her manuscript. "I guess I was thinking. I knew that somewhere out there had to be something for me. Even Nashville hadn't been exactly what I was searching for."

She found what she was looking for when the Bob Wills Ranch House opened in Dallas. A parade was scheduled in conjunction with the launch. Reed and a girlfriend hopped into her convertible so they could join the parade and get a foot in the door. Her car stalled, which proved to be a lucky break. Reed finished the parade by riding on a stagecoach with the Texas Playboys.

At the Ranch House, she saw the stage and knew she had to get on it. "And I was before long," she said.

The barefoot audition led to two years of touring and performing with the Texas Playboys before she left the road for domestic life. She returned to Oklahoma to see her brother off to the Korean War and, while there, found a husband. Driving through Clayton, Oklahoma, she did a double take when she spotted a handsome soldier in front of a cafe; "When I came back through, someone was flagging me down and said, 'There's a soldier that wants to meet you."

She and Lt. Jim Blair, a decorated returning Korean War officer, were married less than two months later — Sept. 28, 1952. Wills approved, telling her she "found a real man this time."

Reed became a mother to four children who shared her love of music and occasionally reunited with Wills over the years. In her 2020 interview with the Tulsa World, Reed said she cherished making people happy with her singing and yodeling.
