## **Before George Strait, there were the Texas Playboys...**

(Editor's note: Our thanks to the Bud Kennedy and the Fort Worth Star-Telegram for excerpts from the following article, remembering Leon Rausch, who died on Tuesday, May 14, in Fort Worth, Texas)

Before George Strait was filling arenas for fiddle music, way back when Fort Worth went out dancing in an old bowling alley named Panther Hall, there were the Texas Playboys. Back then, Fort Worth's favorite Leon was not named Bridges. For 60 years since the 1950s, first on tour and then four times on TV's "Austin City Limits," the spirit of Milton Brown and Bob Wills' Western swing bands has lived on in the voice of Leon Rausch.

When Fort Worth friends said goodbye Wednesday to Rausch, gone at 91, Asleep at the Wheel front man Ray Benson was among those paying tribute to the man with the silky, honky-tonk voice performing the most familiar versions of songs such as "Faded Love" and "[A] Big Ball's in Cowtown."

When Strait and his band open Dickies Arena in Fort Worth Nov. 22-23 and play "Milk Cow Blues" or "Right or Wrong," somebody undoubtedly will remember how Rausch sang the same songs years ago as the last lead singer for the original Bob Wills and His Texas Playboys. "Losing Leon is a heartbreak for all of us in the country music world," Strait wrote in a text message read at Rausch's funeral in a southwest Fort Worth church.

Western swing music was born in Fort Worth 85 years ago. So it only makes sense that Fort Worth is where the last original vocalist would leave us. In the late 1920s, fiddle bandleader Milton Brown — not long out of Arlington Heights High School was first to add jazz piano to a cowboy band and give it a red-hot, Western version of a jazz and blues sound.

That's how Western swing was born, at the old Crystal Springs Pavilion. 5653 White Settlement Road. When Brown connected with West Texas fiddler Bob Wills, they formed a radio band that became the Light Crust Doughboys, and Wills eventually broke away to Hollywood stardom.





His Texas Playboys," Leon Rausch has passed away at the age of 91. He died Tuesday morning (5-14) in

Western Swing for some 60

years and known

as "The Voice of

Bob Wills and

Ft. Worth according to the Texas Playboys.

Born in Billings, Missouri, on October 27th, 1927, Leon Rausch was raised in the Show Me State and started singing and playing guitar at local dances with his father as a small child. Rausch performed throughout high school until he joined the military like many of his generation. After leaving the service, he played with multiple local bands in the Missouri area until eventually moving to Tulsa in 1955 to pursue his Western Swing career. It was a 1956 appearance on The Louisiana Hayride that is given credit for launching Leon Rausch's career in earnest, and on St. Patrick's Day 1958, he officially joined Bob Wills and His Texas Playboys as the lead vocalist, replacing Glynn Duncan, who had replaced his brother Tommy Duncan.

Leon Rausch played in the Texas Playboys throughout the 60's until briefly joining the band of Johnnie Lee Wills, and then forming his own group called the New Texas Playboys based out of Ft. Worth. Rausch would later reunite with Bob Wills in 1973 after the ailing country legend contacted him about making a final record called *For The Last Time*. When Bob Wills died in 1975, Leon Rausch took over as the leader of the legendary Texas Playboys.

Under the leadership of Leon Rausch, the Texas Playboys helped keep the legacy of Western Swing alive, continuing to record albums and perform, including a famous appearance on Austin City Limits. As styles changed, attention to the legendary outfit waned, but Rausch was there to play the official last show of the band at the Will Rogers Auditorium in Ft. Worth, Texas, on November 16th, 1986. The torch he carried for Western Swing—which the Texas Legislature designated the official "State Music of Texas" in 2011—continues to light the way for newer generations of musicians, including Asleep at the Wheel, Dale Watson, and George Strait's Ace in the Hole Band.

# **Cherishing the Memories**

## Mayme Lou Bischoff

Mayme Lou Bischoff was born on January 25, 1930 in Renton, WA and passed away on May 29, 2019.

Born in Renton, WA, and raised at Pine Lake, WA, Lou began playing piano at the age of nine. Classical music wasn't her thing so she changed teachers and began learning big band music at the age of 12. She learned every song available at that time and joined a small group of musicians who performed at NorthWest Western Swing school functions. They formed a teen

-age club and found themselves playing at various club gettogethers.

After Lou married and had a family, the most she did was to play the radio for a few years. She went into the nursing profession in the 60s and found herself joining a group of friends from work who would club hop. That is where she met Bill Garner, Dick Heil, Rusty Draper and many others who were entertaining locally. They got her hooked on

The very first camera she received as a child sparked a passion for photography that persisted until the end of her life. When it became difficult to take the photos herself, she enlisted the aid of her team of photographers to help. (Two of her favorite photogs were the late Rus Davis and Dennis Ford). Her visual histories of special events will be treasured.

Western Swing. In the 70s Bobby MacAvoy, Bill Garner and Bill Brooker entertained in the lounge where Lou was employed. had the Swing beat and it didn't take long for that to impact her life. They soon became Lou's mentors.

When the Western Swing Society was formed in 1983, Lou was working weekends and unable to attend their functions. But, she kept touch through friendship a n d After her newsletters. first visit to a showcase in Kirkland, she knew the Western Swing Society organization was where she found a place in music.

At Lou's first POWS (Pioneers of Western Swing Festival) in 1993, she was asked to be a There she met hostess. Truitt Cunningham, Dean McKinney Moore, Bobby Koefer and Smokey Rogers, the "Idols" she had heard so much about. The following year, Lou was elected Secretary of the Seattle Western Swing Music Society. She held that office or that of board member until she was elected President in 2001. She held the office of President through 2008. After a brief absence, Lou joined the Board again in 2012, retiring in 2018.

Lou has been honored with many awards over the years, including the NWWSMS' Steve Vaughn Founder's Award in 1998. In 2005, Lou was honored to be inducted into the Kansas Western Swing Music Society Hall of Fame as well as Seattle's Western Swing Music Society (now the NWWSMS) and the Western Swing Music Society of Sacramento.

She and her husband, Ed. have traveled many thousands of miles to promote and support the Western Swing style of music. On one of their trips to Oklahoma, she helped provide the inspiration and support for the formation of the largest western swing music society of them all, the Western Swing Music Society of the Southwest.

Lou is survived by her devoted husband, Ed, and an

incredible community of family and friends. A Celebration of Life will be held on June 29th from 2 PM – Midnight, at the Pine Lake Community Club, 21333 SE 20th St, Sammamish, WA 98075. Friends are welcome to bring a desert for the table. Finger foods will be available.

Musicians, after the scheduled program and visitation, the hall will be ready for music and sharing the memories that will keep Lou alive forever in our hearts. It's our hope we will find peace and healing by continuing to play and perform the music Lou helped weave into the fabric of the American experience.

# HAIL THE HALLS

# TEXAS DANCE HALLS STAND AS MONUMENTS TO HISTORY AND COMMUNITY

Imagine this scene in a Texas dance hall: A band belts out a tune while couples of all ages spin one another around a hardwood floor. Some steal kisses or show off fancy twirls. A little girl, balanced atop her granddaddy's boots, sways in time. Kids knee-high to a grasshopper race around the floor, and no one fusses. At rustic tables, friends and families chat, sip drinks and wave at dancers gliding past. A short reach away, babies and toddlers snooze on blankets spread across the floor.

The folksy scene could describe a dance hosted last month at Anhalt Hall in Spring Branch or one held in the 1890s at Braun Hall in northwest San Antonio.


"Dance halls are magical because their culture hasn't changed since the 1870s, when the first ones were built," says Patrick Sparks, a structural engineer and historic preservationist based in San Antonio. "Dancing's as fundamental to Texas as the Alamo, cowboys, longhorns and oil."

More than 1,000 dance halls built by German, Czech, Polish and a few Swiss immigrants once dotted parts of Texas. In the mid-19th century, the weary newcomers stepped off ships in Texas ports, most often Galveston or Indianola, on their way to settle as far west as the Hill Country.

Living conditions were harsh, and yet these isolated settlers worked hard to establish their unique way of life. To provide their friends and neighbors a place to meet, discuss business, share barbecue dinners and dance, they constructed spacious halls. Each building incorporated the skills of its artisan community, reflecting its customs and musical tastes.

Architecture varied from simple, metal-sided barns with window flaps, such as those of <u>Kendalia Halle</u>, to round halls with a center support column, such as <u>Bellville Turnverein Pavilion</u>.

As meeting places, the buildings served the primary interests of their founders. Progress (fortschritt) and shooting club (schützen verein) members built the whitewashed Nordheim Shooting Club Dance Hall. German businessmen built an ornate dancing pavilion called the Garten Verein (garden club) for Galveston's German community. Near Burton, one of many German gymnastic clubs (turn vereins) built the La Bahia Turn Verein Hall. A German singing society (gesangverein) founded the Millheim Harmonic Harmonie Verein Hall in Sealy.

In Czech communities, polka dancers kept floors hopping at halls built by two fraternal orders: the SPJST (Fayetteville's SPJST Hall No. 1) and KJT (Ammannsville's KJT Hall). Most of the other halls were built by religious or agricultural organizations, and individuals built a few. One example is <a href="Sefcik Hall">Sefcik Hall</a> in Seaton, a two-story clapboard building built in 1923 by Tom Sefcik. His daughter Alice Sefcik Sulak, now in her 80s, still oversees Sunday night dances on the second floor.

Each distinct, the buildings had one common feature: an expansive wooden floor that welcomed families. "Then and now, that's what makes a true Texas dance hall," says Deb Fleming, executive director of Texas Dance Hall Preservation in Austin. "Its largest architectural feature must be the dance floor, and it must also allow children, unlike a saloon or honky tonk."





Fleming, a San Antonio native who did not grow up around Texas dance halls, discovered her ancestral roots because of one. In 2007, she visited Panna Maria, considered the nation's oldest Polish settlement, established in 1854, to research the community's historic hall. At the visitors center, a local woman with a laptop offered to print out Fleming's genealogy. Her family tree traced back to Johann Rzeppa, Flemings' great-grandfather and one of Panna Maria's original settlers.

"I had no idea about our family's connection to Panna Maria," says Fleming, a Guadalupe Valley Electric Cooperative member. "Neither did my father. The experience made me wonder how many other Texans have their own family connection to a Texas dance hall and don't even know it."

Thanks to dance halls, Texas music is known worldwide. Without them, those early brass, string and accordion bands wouldn't have birthed such genres as western swing, country or conjunto. Eventually, several bands made a good living, traveling from one dance hall to the next. Bob Wills, Willie Nelson, Hank Williams and Ray Benson are among those who got their starts in dance halls.



Fewer than 400 halls survive in Texas. Of those, about 25 percent stand abandoned, such as Gillespie County's Cherry Springs Dance Hall, where Elvis Presley, Nat King Cole and Patsy Cline performed. Or they're used for storage.

In 2008, Preservation Texas collectively identified all Texas dance halls as endangered places worthy of protection as architectural, historical and cultural landmarks. The nonprofit advocacy group cited neglect, suburban development, highway

projects, shrinking grassroots support and lack of public awareness as threats to dance hall survival.

The designation came a year after Sparks, along with historic preservationist Stephanie McDougal and the late Texas music historian Steve Dean, founded the nonprofit Texas Dance Hall Preservation. Since its start, the volunteer group has worked to inventory existing halls, spread the word about their historical importance and partner with owners to keep them afloat.

Dean's advocacy for dance halls ran deep. In 2014, he asked via social media whether someone could make a documentary about them. Filmmaker Erik McCowan of Rosanky responded.


"First we visited the <u>Round Top Schützen Verein</u>'s annual shooting competition that's been held every year since 1873,"

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recalls McCowan, a Bluebonnet Electric Cooperative member. "That's when I realized the history of these places runs much deeper than I thought. After Steve and I saw what was left of New Bern Helvetia Hall near Taylor, I knew I had to make a film."

More than three years t h e i n Dance Hall making, Days shares the downhome stories of 56 classic halls. Some stand forgotten, such Cistern Hall in Cistern a n d Kreutzberg Shooting Club Hall near

Boerne. Fire destroyed several, including the Fredericksburg Social Turn Verein Hall in 2016 (members voted to rebuild). Siblings restored their family's Park Hall (now called <u>Hruska's at Park</u>) near Fayetteville, and <u>Renck Hall</u> in Warrenton hosts antique sales. But dancing still ranks No. 1 at many others, including the <u>Albert Dance Hall</u> in Albert and <u>Schroeder Hall</u> in Goliad.

Throughout the 82-minute film, Dean steps in and out of halls, sharing his hopes and wisdom. Sadly, he died April 28, 2018, the day after *Dance Hall Days* won Best Texas Film at the Hill Country Film Festival in Fredericksburg.

Rich stories captured by McCowan's film abound within the walls of Texas dance halls. "These places live and breathe the stories of Texas," Fleming says. "They're melting pots of our state's culture. Every time we lose one, we lose a piece of Texas history."

Note: In an effort to save halls, Austin singer Ray Benson and his band, Asleep at the Wheel, stage monthly tours with stops at Twin Sisters and a handful of others. Erik McCowan, a dance hall aficionado, hosts day-long "Dance Hall Road Trip" tours and last year released "Dance Hall Days," a documentary about the halls.

One Saturday, his tour stopped at what German settlers dubbed Katzenquelle, or Wildcat Spring. The local Turn Verein Hall — which doubled as a gym - closed in the 1940s, but the community renovated another nearby venue, the Cat Spring Agricultural Society Hall.

James Herring recently walked through the 12-sided building, explaining how he helped restore the 14-foot pine beams supporting the massive cupola built in 1902. Herring, 81, director of the agricultural society, grew up speaking German until he started school. A hand-painted wooden sign warns visitors in German,

# The wearing of the hat & the spurs, the smoking & the chewing is in this hall forbidden.

"The ladies had these big hoop dresses and the spurs would catch on them," said Herbert Kollatschny, 82, who grew up dancing at the hall. "And the hat — they used to carry six-shooters under them," Herring added.
