The Longhorn Ballroom, Dallas' ultimate Country-Western dive, is for sale

Legendary cow palace south of downtown is up for grabs.

Here's your chance to buy the ultimate Dallas honky-tonk. The historic Longhorn Ballroom — a storied music venue south of downtown that's hosted generations of performers — just hit the market.

The 70-year-old performance hall on the banks of the Trinity River is being sold out of bankruptcy after the previous owners defaulted on loans on the property.

"It's a Chapter 7 liquidation sale," said Dallas real estate broker Candace Rubin, who was just hired by the federal bankruptcy court to peddle the property.

"It's a little over 5.5 acres with entertainment zoning," Rubin said. "I think it's a killer piece of property."

Built in 1950, the music hall at Corinth Street and Riverfront Boulevard has hosted performers ranging from the legendary Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys country swing band to the punk rock group the Sex Pistols.




MINUTES FROM THE BOARD APRIL AND MAY, 2020



Jim Sanderson May 2020

Jim Sanderson (1997 HOF) passed away last week at the age of 90. No memorial services are planned. Our sincere condolences to Jim's family, in particular Jim's nephew, Randy, friends and fans.

Jim was a staunch supporter of the NWWSMS and attended every event he could. Jim was born in 1929 in Mabin, West Virginia. He started playing music at the age of six. By the age of 17 Jim was playing over the radio in Blueville, West Va., on stations WWYO and WHIS.

In 1949 Jim joined the army and was stationed in Fort Lawton, WA. While there he met Marty Dahlgren. They played together in the Vick Marten Band. After spending a year in Korea, Jim ended up at Camp Cook, CA., playing weekends in a band with Big Howdy Forrester at the Club Oasis in Long Poke, CA.

Following his discharge in 1952, Jim returned to Seattle to make it his home. Jim's first playing job in the area was with Bonnie Guitar (pictured below: together one last time in 2013). Over the years Jim played with such greats as Ferlin Huskey, Cal Smith, T Texas Tyler, Hank Thompson, Dusty Rhoades, Truitt Cunningham and Red Gillean; as well as locals Bobby MacAvoy, Dick Heil, Bill Brooker and Don Berkshire. In later years, Jim performed around the area with his Jack Daniels Band.

WSMSS 2020 Lawton, OK Showcase (Hall of Fame) Cancelled and Swing Beat Newsletter Temporarily Suspended

WSMSS regrets to announce that our 2020 Hall of Fame Showcase in Lawton, OK, has been cancelled. The Comanche County Fairgrounds is currently closed until at least mid-June and possibly later, and at this time, events such as ours are still highly discouraged if not outright banned in many cities and towns across the country. The primary age group of our members and guests are among the most vulnerable for complications and deaths from COVID-19, and obviously it is not practical to socially distance at a dance. In addition, we usually have people travelling from numerous cities and states, which could lead to transporting more COVID-19 cases both into and away from locations where our showcases are held. We plan to honor our 2020 Hall of Fame Inductees at our 2021 induction ceremony. We will continue to monitor the situation and make decisions about our remaining 3 planned showcases as they grow nearer.

WSMSS is also announcing the suspension of our quarterly newsletter, Swing Beat, until after our showcases resume. The reasons for this decision are twofold: 1) there is significantly less information to disseminate, with several of our showcases already being cancelled and the near-term uncertainty of our remaining 2020 showcases; and, 2) the significant cost of publishing and mailing newsletters cannot be justified in the absence of WSMSS showcase-generated income.

WSMSS is, however, proud to announce that we have been able to fully honor our youth music scholarships for 2020. Hopefully, we can get back to normal quickly and any potential budget shortfalls will take care of themselves.

Please continue to monitor our Facebook page for updated information. We also ask that everyone help get the word out about this cancellation, especially to those who do not have PCs or use Facebook.

The city of Dallas agreed to provide a \$500,000 economic development grant to preserve the building. But the owner ran into financial problems last year, and the Longhorn Ballroom was placed in receivership.

The music hall is in a neighborhood that's getting more attention from property investors. It's in the area where high-speed rail developers are planning to construct the Dallas terminal for a proposed bullet train to Houston.

(Editor's note: But, there is so much more to the story of the 'Longhorn Ballroom,' aka 'The Silver Spur,' aka the 'Bob Wills Ranch House.' Dewey Groom, inducted into the 2019 NWWSMS Hall of Fame, operated the Longhorn from 1958 to 1986. What follows is only a small part of his amazing career - our thanks to Dewey's daughter, Saran Knight, for sharing and preserving her father's story.)



Dewey Groom was born April 30, 1918, in Van Zandt County, Texas. There were seven Groom children and most of the family either sang or preached when they weren't in the cotton fields. It didn't take Dewey long to realize that he didn't want to be a tenant farmer like his family so he learned to play guitar and sing. In 1941 he went into the Army like most men at that time and took his passion for music with him.

When he got out of the

service he had developed into enough of an entertainer to land a spot on the radio with Pappy Hal Horton and played local school dances through the 1940's.

In 1950, Groom opened the Bounty Ballroom, a walk-up joint in downtown Dallas, and in the mid 1950's went to work alongside Jack Ruby at the Silver Spur, which later became the Longhorn Ballroom. After a disagreement with Jack Ruby, Dewey left to go open up a place on Main Street with his big band. During this time Jack Ruby had left 216

Corinth and opened up the Carousel Club. In the meantime the Bob Wills Ranch House, then the Silver Spur, had sat vacant for a while. The land owner, O.L. Nelms, asked Dewey

in 1958 to come back and open up his own place. So that is how the infamous Longhorn Ballroom came into being.

The Longhorn Ballroom in its heyday seated 2000 people which made it one of the largest dancehalls in the country for that era. Everyone played there from George Strait, Conway Twitty, Merle Haggard, Willie Nelson (who was a regular), Loretta Lynn countless others. Dewey was revered and respected bv

traveling musicians and entertainers because he never cheated anyone and the stars knew he was a man of his word. Most country acts of the day knew that they had made the big time when they could get booked at Dewey Groom's Longhorn Ballroom in Dallas, Texas!

Dewey also established Longhorn Records and recorded many local artists. For years he did segments on the locally produced 'COWBOY WEAVER SHOW.' There are several of his musicians who went on to work with major stars and to win acceptance into many Western Swing Societies. Dewey Groom was inducted into the Texas Western Swing Hall of Fame in the 1990's.

He operated the Longhorn from 1958-1986 when he retired and sold the business.

Dewey and his family retired to some family land in Henderson County, TX where he lived near all his family until his death on March 31, 1997.

His motto was that, 'he loved people and they loved him back'.



MERLE HAGGARD, Unreleased + HOT WESTERN SWING -STEREO

Here are six early Capitol Recordings. They were not released for various reasons like minor mistakes, someone off mike, or hits a bad note, but this is special stuff, including some great

Dixieland. The unreleased tracks are from the Box Set, <u>The UnTamed Hawk.</u>

Merle in his prime with top musicians and an augmented band. Well recorded and true Stereo, too. It's a quickie, but the music is so great. I want to share it with the group. Check out the great bass sound at 9:22. Bet you'll feel like dancing'.

Lovesick Blues
I Ain't Got Nobody
Right or Wrong
You Don't Love Me, But I'll Always Care
Don't Let the Deal Go Down (fiddle instrumental)
Big Bad Bill is Sweet William Now

'Right or Wrong' is hot, hot, hot. I added 'Big Bad Bill' for the Dixieland and the fun lyrics. Listen to the bass line on 'You Don't Love Me, etc,' Amazing.

Fun Tech Tips: Anyone can upload a mono wave file to Moises.AI and get back up to five tracks for remixing into stereo. Totally free. You can even choose to remix it right there. Great way to remove a vocal from a song so you can sing it yourself. They use the files to train the program via Artificial Intelligence. It keeps getting better. MIT also has a program.

That's what I did with 'Bring It On Down' after Charles de -noised it. Then I punched up that drum. That's the only Bob Wills song that starts that way. Bam!

Don't forget I will be happy to share anything in my library with the NWWSMS. My favorite thing is when I get a comment about how great the music is. One Guy said, "I'm 70 years old. Where has this great music been all my life."

HISTORIC ACCORDION FINDS A NEW HOME

All musicians have heroes that they look up to; performers who help define a genre or codify a style; performers who occupy an important place in music history. Fred Martin was one of those monumental performers, although few today know his name or his place in music history. Despite his relative obscurity today, he was one of the leading players of his era and helped to define the sound of Western music, both as an instrumentalist and a singer. I have come to know much more about Mr. Martin and his career because I own one of his accordions.

Fred Martin was born in Cass County, Texas in 1916. Not much is known about his early musical training, but his professional career eventually brought him to radio station WFAA in Dallas where he was hired as a staff musician in the mid 1930s. While at the station, Martin was called on to fill some unexpected blank airtime, which he did by telling some jokes and playing accordion. Soon staff guitarist Jerry Scoggins, who would go on to later fame as the singer of the theme song for "The Beverly Hillbillies," joined Martin, singing duets together and playing guitar. The act started to get popular and they soon added Burt Dodson, bass player from the Light Crust Doughboys to round out their trio. In



addition to playing bass, Dodson was also a very fine tenor singer. The combination of the three musicians quickly became popular on the Dallas radio station. They were nicknamed the "Cass County Kids" by a station announcer because of Martin's home in Cass County, Texas.

While their careers were certainly going well as staff musicians WFAA, fortune eventually found the trio when Gene Autry discovered them during his military service World War II. The trio,

which Gene renamed "Cass County Boys," became regular guests on Autry's Melody Ranch radio show. After the war, when Autry moved to California permanently, he brought the trio with him as his backup band. By that time, the Cass County Boys were becoming popular in their own right. They appeared with Autry in his western movies and television shows, as well as doing movies with other actors like Tex Ritter and Charles Starrett. They also did recordings of their own for Decca and Columbia records. Eventually the trio would be inducted into the Western Music Hall of Fame in 1996.

Fred Martin's accordion of choice in the 1930s was an Excelsior Model 00 (Double Aught) with handmade reeds produced in New York City by the Panicotti Brothers. At the time, piano accordions were still a fairly new instrument, having only been introduced to America in 1909. By the 1930s, Excelsior was making some of the best accordions in the world. Excelsior accordions were the choice of all the great accordionists of that era, including the great Charles Magnante, who was a staff musician at NBC radio in New York. The Excelsiors were known at the time for having a clear, bright tone that sounded good on radio and in recordings. They were also known for their rocker switches on the front grill which were used for changing combinations of reeds.

Although Fred would own many accordions throughout his career, he kept his Excelsior 00 until he passed away in 2010. After his passing, his daughter inherited the instrument and took it to Dave Caballero who runs an accordion repair and sales shop in Los Angeles. Sensing the historical nature of the instrument, Caballero asked Martin's daughter why she was looking to sell the instrument and not donate it to the Autry Museum. Apparently there had been some disagreement between Martin and Autry and he didn't want anything from his estate going to Autry's museum. Caballero agreed to take the instrument in on consignment for Martin.

Shortly after acquiring the instrument, Caballero found a willing buyer in Jack Cook, an amateur accordionist and Air Force retiree from Las Vegas. Cook eagerly bought the historic accordion and took it back to his home in Las Vegas where it resided for several years. During that time, Jack purchased another similar Excelsior of the same era and mixed and matched parts between the two instruments to create what he felt were two better instruments. Half of Martin's accordion stayed in Las Vegas and the other half wound up in Kelowna, BC, where Cook's wife had a summer home. By leaving an accordion in Canada it would make it easier to travel to the

summer home and not have to take an accordion with him.

In 2017 I was performing in Las Vegas at the Southwest Polka Party. I had known Jack for several years from his travels to various accordion festivals around the country. I had the opportunity to visit him at his home and see his home studio and collection of fine accordions, including what was left of Fred Martin's Excelsior. After our visit, Jack gave me the accordion which contained half of Fred's original instrument, with the promise that eventually I would get the other instrument that contained the remainder of the parts.

At the time, I assumed it would be many years in the future before I would ever get the other half of Fred Martin's accordion. Tragically, Jack passed away just a few months after I last visited in 2017. His widow knew of his promise to me and assured me that she would eventually retrieve the other accordion from Kelowna. In summer 2019, I received that other accordion and brought it home with me. Although the two instruments were nearly identical, there were a few differences with the chrome trim and lettering on them. Sorting out which instrument was which would take some work.

In November of last year I took both accordions down to Chuck Berger in Gresham, Oregon. Chuck is an accordion repairman who specializes in restoring vintage instruments. Chuck was able to go through each instrument individually and sort out which parts had come from Fred Martin's accordion and which had come from the other one. After a few months of painstaking work, I had Fred Martin's accordion back in its original form with all the correct trim and markings. The other Excelsior is also a complete instrument, but not in quite as nice a shape as Martin's.

Now I find myself in the enviable position of owning a piece of music history. This is the accordion that was played on all the Gene Autry recordings after 1946, including "Here Comes Santa Claus" and the re-recording of "Silver-Haired Daddy Of Mine." To see and hear the accordion in action, go to YouTube and look up the song "Great Grand-Dad" from Autry's 1947 movie "Twilight On The Rio Grande." The instrument still needs more restoration to get into playable condition and I am hoping that, in the coming years, I will be able to return it to good playing condition and start playing it out on jobs. A piece of musical history like Fred Martin's accordion deserves to keep playing the music that made its place in history.


