#### Preserving the music that is too country for Jazz and too jazz for Country

# His name is synonymous with western swing.

The sound of air brakes exhaling from a big black and white bus emblazoned with the words "Bob Wills and His Texas Playboys" announced my father's homecoming. It was the early '60s and my parents, older brother, two younger sisters, and I lived in a two-story red brick home in what was then a Tulsa, Oklahoma, suburb. Our house faced west in the direction of the towns and cities that knew Bob Wills so well. These were the touring years, and fans continued to crowd dance halls eager to see the man and his band, to hear the music, and to dance to favorites like "San Antonio Rose," "Faded Love," "Stay All Night," "Big Beaver," and "Take Me Back to Tulsa."

If somehow you're unfamiliar with Bob Wills or have yet to tap a toe to Western swing, it's safe to say you're within inches of someone who has. Today, living west of the Mississippi virtually assures a lifestyle influenced by him. More than a hundred years after his birth and now 35 since his death, Bob Wills and his music remain deep within the heart of America's West. From a family of fiddlers and cotton pickers, he became a Western legend, minstrel, preacher, and hero across four decades.

The oldest of four brothers and six sisters, he grew up in a small frame house "down between the rivers" of Hall County near Turkey, Texas. By today's standards, his family would be dirt-poor, but for the times, their standard of living was fairly typical. Rural America had yet to head for the city and agriculture was still the occupational standard. My grandfather, who I knew as "Daddy Papa" and the world knew as "Uncle John" Wills, was a champion fiddler and struggling cotton farmer who relied on his eldest son to play the fiddle for ranch dances and to pick cotton. The best the young Jim Rob "Bob" Wills took from those parched Texas cotton fields was a love for the blues and jazz sung and played by neighbors and migrant workers, and the best he got from his father were the teachings of a master fiddler and the sense of being central to the survival of others. No surprise that the charismatic firstborn would be gifted and burdened with talent, ambition, and a genius for creative evolution.

Bob Wills rose to stardom in the mid-1930s and enjoyed the ride well into the '60s. Committed to lightening the woes of people wearied by the Depression, he

High School in 1954. After graduating, he enlisted in the Navy and achieved the rank of Second Class Petty Officer. He was stationed in Long Beach, California and on occasion, I had the opportunity to play in back-up bands for artists such as Bobby Bare and Roger Miller. In 1959, Biff completed his military duty. In 1960, he moved to Fresno, California and started his nightclub band career.

In 1962, Biff met and married a local girl, Bette McIntosh. They moved to the Los Angeles area in 1964 and Biff went to work in the house band at the Palomino Club, North Hollywood, California. The Palomino Club was recognized for several years as the Nightclub of the Year by the Academy of Country Music.

Biff also did a lot of recording studio playing and was exposed to several prominent people in the music business. He was a drum instructor during this time and played in a house band for Disnevland on Sundays.

In 1969, he left the nightclub scene and started his career with Merle Haggard and the Strangers. Biff had the honor of being the drummer on four of Merle's Gold Albums and one of Willie Nelson's. The Strangers also had the honor of winning and being nominated for several prestigious awards, one being nominated for nine vears as the Touring Band of the Year by the Academy of Country Music. He played drums on approximately 50 of Merle's albums. Biff felt fortunate to be able to play drums on the album, "A Tribute To The Best Damn Fiddle Player In The World." a tribute to Bob Wills.

Biff considered it an honor to play with some of the legendary Texas Playboys such as Tiny Moore, Johnny Gimble, Eldon Shamblin, Johnny Lee Wills. Joe Holley, and Alex Brashear, and to be a part of Country Music History. Biff enjoyed his God-given talent of playing the drums until the end. He was inducted into several Hall of Fames, including the Western Swing Society of Sacramento in 2001 and the NWWSMS Hall of Fame in 2013. He will be missed greatly by us all.

**Keith Holter** 

June 26, 1931—February 21, 2020

Longtime, local musician and lifelong, Longview-Kelso resident, Keith Galen Holter passed away at home surrounded by loved ones on Friday February 21, 2020, at the age of 88.

Born June 26, 1931, to Walter Galen and Ida Vivian (Ferguson) Holter, in Longview, WA. Keith attended RA Long High School and was a member of the US Army Reserve. Keith retired from Weverhauser in 1993. He was a longtime member of the IWA 536 and the Musician's Union.

Keith was most well-known for his guitar mastery. Many locals referred to him as " Mr. Guitar." Keith started his professional music career at age 14. He played at most of the Northwest Music venues, including the Glide Hall in Kelso, Plaguato Ball Room in Chehalis. Tiny Dumont's. Division Street Corral, Watkins Park and Wagon Wheel Park in the Portland area, as well as many night clubs and private clubs in the Northwest. Keith also taught guitar for many years. He began teaching in the 1950's at Korten's Music then opened his own store "Holter's Strum and Drum" in the early 1960's. Keith continued to teach until the late 1970's.

After retiring from Weverhauser, Keith continued to play music, pursuing his favorite genre, "Western Swing' along with his son, drummer Dave Holter. Together Keith and Dave traveled the country playing Western Swing with the Longview Longhorns. Keith was inducted into the Western Swing Music Society Hall of Fame chapters in Seattle, Sacramento, Oklahoma, Alaska and Canada. Keith continued to play his guitar until the day before his passing.

## CAIN'S BALLROOM STICKS WITH TRADITION THROUGH RENOVATIONS, FLOOR REPLACEMENT

TULSA, Okla. (KTUL) -- . . . For almost a century, the historic music venue has looked about the same, and that's the owners' plan, just with a few updates.

Cain's Ballroom was built in 1924 as a car repair shop. "In 1935, the original wood floor went in and that wood floor remained here until 2007 when we replaced it the first time, this now being the second time," said Chad Rodgers, co-owner and manager. . .

... Aside from the extra glisten, music fans stepping onto the 'new' floor at Cain's Ballroom won't notice much of a difference. The maple and walnut accents have the same color and shape, and it even has that extra little give that helped make Cain's so unique, and that's just what Chad Rodgers wanted. "When we bought Cain's in 2002, we didn't want to change anything to lose the mystique," Rodgers said. "That's been our goal all along."

Like the old floor, a lighter maple wood covers most of the floor, with dark walnut circling the outside and forming a series of rectangles in the center, directly under the red neon star hanging from the ceiling. Though one addition is a thin strip of walnut in the center of the concentric rectangles, "a Rodgers addition to the floor," Rodgers said.

Over the years, thousands of people have played on the Cain's Ballroom stage while countless others have danced on the floor. Rodgers says his family wants to keep the building as original as possible, but wear and tear have required some updates, like the flooring. "It became a safety issue," said Rodgers. "Our customers are on the forefront of our mind and we want them to come and enjoy and come back."




In January, 2017, the second floor replacement began. The only thing that looks different is how clean it is, but the same design of the last 80-plus years remains. "It is still wood, it is still maple. Generally, overall you see in the floor the lighter color, walnut accents round the perimeter and in the middle," said Rodgers.

During the occasional updates, Rodgers has found lost memories of yesteryear, like bottles and 10-cent dance tickets that likely date back to the 1930s. "This time around we dug about three or four feet deep from the surrounding concrete, dug and took things out. Refilled and it was a long process," said Rodgers.

One feature unseen to the dancers and music lovers will be the new concrete slab under the floor, which Rodgers said will provide more support and hopefully extend the life of the floor. However, it still is lifted off the concrete and supported throughout, giving it that characteristic bounce and give that fans have come to love, Rodgers said.

People often talk about the springs under the floor at Cain's Ballroom, but Rodgers is sorry to say . . . "There were never springs under this floor, that was just an alleged myth," he said. Rodgers says the perceived bounce was from how the floor was built. "The piers were built far enough apart that the wood underneath flexed enough where it gave it the bounce, making it feel like it was on springs," said Rodgers. The bounce is still there with the new floor.

For anyone who danced on the original floor from the '30s, Rodgers is selling pens made from the original wood at Bob Wills' birthday celebration in March. "This is the music this place started with, Bob Wills and western swing," said Rodgers. "It is cool, it brings in a wide range of age demographics and it is a good time. It is good to hear that music back in this building."

understood the effect of hard times and the formula for easing its hold. As people moved from the country to the city and dance halls replaced the ranch dance, Bob Wills made sure Western swing traveled, too, bringing with it the sound of a happier, roaring decade. He became the genre's favorite son, while his Texas Playboys surrounded him with a musical family of sheer enjoyment.

Onstage, he was the consummate performer. His unconventional "holler" and animated presence thrilled audiences up, down, and around Route 66 from Texas to the California coast, in dance halls, on the radio, and in western movies. His music lifted spirits that clearly needed lifting. It brought people to their feet and, more important for his time, proved for a humble picker from the cotton fields of Texas that sitting on top of the world was indeed possible.

Undoubtedly arising from his early experience of family, my father was acutely aware of the importance of others. His commitment to pleasing and elevating everyone — band members, family, audiences — inspired unwavering devotion and a kind of personal ownership from all who knew him. He admired great musicians and could spot and attract them instantly. His band, The Texas Playboys, was synonymous with the name Bob Wills, and thanks to my father's onstage commentary, band members were known individually almost as well as he was. He was a natural leader who encouraged self-expression within strict and oddly diversified codes of behavior and performance. And by the numbers of Texas Playboys who proudly served over the years and ultimately relished in the telling of "Bob stories," following his rules was, in the end, a rite of passage.

Well-known Texas Playboy piano pounder Al Stricklin recounted his travels with my father in My Years with Bob Wills, describing him as "The man who started it all; the man who could get 110 percent effort out of his musicians like a good football coach; the man who was feared and loved by his men; the man who could sell his product like nobody else, as testified to by the thousands of people who turned out to listen ... ." Al's son, Dr. David Stricklin, reminds me that much of my father's story revolves around "anti-rules," of ignoring boundaries — as illustrated by his swing-dance version of the "William Tell Overture" — and "of fracturing such musical niceties as observing time signatures."

He was his own kind of outlaw. "Bob broke meter and made it work, even though it drove the 'serious' musicians crazy," Stricklin says. "Daddy referred to how Bob took music out of the straitjacket. ... The thing was, if you were willing to accept the discipline of being in Bob's band, you had to adopt the work ethic that enabled them to survive the grueling schedule, the ways Bob drove them during performances, and the absolute requirement that people who paid to see them were going to get their money's worth. Within those rules and that work ethic, there was a lot of room for self-expression. Daddy always said that

when Bob pointed his bow at you — and you never knew when that was going to happen — you couldn't just play exactly what you'd played the last time the band did the song. You had to think, Bob wants me to play all I know, and, if possible, play something I didn't know I knew. That was lightyears from the attitudes of so many bandleaders in those days, even the ones we regard as highly inventive. It's one of Bob's great contributions and, I think, one of the keys to understanding his great humanity."

My father's talent for presentation, for skirting the edge of what fans could embrace and yet dream to emulate, began with his arrival on the musical scene at the start of the '30s. It was in Fort Worth, Texas, that he formed the Wills Fiddle Band; Milton Brown soon joined as vocalist and the group became the original Light Crust Doughboys. In sweaters and dress slacks, the band looked more like college boys than young men fresh from the farm.

In 1933, when Bob Wills left Fort Worth to broadcast on a radio station in Waco, the band became known as The Playboys. My father was 28; the band was young and they continued to dress like college students. From Waco, they headed for Oklahoma and their destiny to broadcast on KVOO. From 1934 through 1938, Bob Wills appeared in a tailored double-breasted suit and polished custom-made boots, and the Texas Playboys dressed in business suits, white shirts, and neckties. They were on their way to becoming the largest and most famous Western band in the history of America, and their increasingly familiar image announced the dawning of "Western chic."

In 1939, my father and Mr. O.W. Mayo started the annual Bob Wills Stampede (Rodeo) in Tulsa and it was then that the Texas Playboys began to dress Western: cowboy dress shirts and Western pants, bolo or standard ties or Western scarves, vests or Western-cut sports coats, and cowboy boots with pants tucked in or out. Nowhere were there sequins, appliqués, floppy lapels, or loud colors. As the bandleader, Bob Wills became known for his trademark cowboy hat, boots, and Roi-Tan cigar. He usually wore a light-colored Stetson with a medium crease and slightly folded edges. A hat pushed too far back or pulled down to hide a man's eyes was not acceptable.

"Those rodeos were what is called a happening today," says Al Stricklin, who recalled one parade where people started waving and shouting, not at the Oklahoma governor but at Bob Wills. "[Wills] had on a well-tailored Western suit and was riding Punkin, that




great stallion, saddled with that beautiful silver-lined saddle that Tulsa restaurateur George the Hamburger King had given him. It was a beautiful sight."

A rare change to my father's dress code occurred during the making of a western movie in which the Hollywood director insisted he wear a 10-gallon white hat and tuxedo to conduct the band in a dance scene. Everyone on the set who knew him immediately recognized the anger and discomfort captured in that cut.

By 1942, my mother, Betty Lou Anderson, had fallen in love with and married Bob Wills. She was young and petite with curly black hair, big brown eyes, and an attitude of total possibility. At 37, he had matured into a dark-eyed heart-melting celebrity with a list of failed marriages. The connection between the two would carry them through ever-changing times, 32 years of marriage, and four children. Early on, I saw my parents' relationship as a working partnership as much as a great romance. From the outside, it may have appeared he was king, but from the inside I knew she was also queen. My mother excelled at business, and, as it turned out, she brought her own element of style to the Bob Wills image.

When we lived in Las Vegas in the late '50s, I remember helping her shop for dresses for a young singer hired for the Golden Nugget shows, and through the years I often heard her discussing with my father what the band would wear. I especially remember the period when she actually made his Western shirts. It was a time when pearl snaps were a must and to secure them to a shirt meant standing in the kitchen at the ironing board and pounding them over and over with a meat mallet.

While a great era in American history passed with my father's death on May 13, 1975, those who knew him — and many

who knew those who knew him — were not prepared to see his legacy die. His memory is honored in numerous halls of fame, museums, and tributes, including the Country Music Hall of Fame, the National Cowboy Hall of Fame, and the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. At the 2007 Grammy celebration, my niece and I were privileged to accept the Lifetime Achievement Award bestowed on my father by the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences for his contributions to American music. Ray Benson's stage production of A Ride with Bob is entertaining audiences across the country. And the annual Bob Wills Day in Turkey, Texas, is approaching its 40th year.

"Bob was a stylish Western rogue," says Benson, Asleep at the Wheel frontman. "As outrageous as his onstage dancing, hollering, and strutting were, he led the band in a presentation that was downright orchestral ... and always electrifying."

To hear the music called Western swing is to feel a connection to America's West. To know the man who was its instrument is to admire one of America's great agents of change. Not only did his music bring America to its feet, but his view of and pride in being Western evoked a now-classic style. His talent for synthesizing sound — whether in the vein of blues, jazz, ragtime, Hispanic, country, gospel, or big band — into the music known as Western swing translated to his equally contagious and innate sense for designing the image known as Bob Wills. Whether it applied to the band or signage or the bus; whether it was expressed by his performance or attire, or for that matter, his horse and tack, if it had to do with Bob Wills, it had to do with class.

Since meeting at the National Old-Time Fiddlers Contest in Weiser, Idaho as young teenagers, Joey and Sherry's influence on the fiddle world is very evident. Both have won multiple state, national and world fiddle championships and as teachers, several of their students have gone on to win major national fiddle championships of their own. In addition, the McKenzie's are very proud of their students who have advanced into successful music careers, as well as the many others who have became life-long music lovers who play strictly for the fun of it!



#### Joey McKenzie

#### Accolades

Joey McKenzie is a natural musical wonder. He is such a gifted musician, arranger and musical visionary. I truly admire him. One of the things we both share in common is rhythm. I always keep an eye out for rhythm specialists. When I first heard Joey play I proclaimed him the best, rock solid. He takes care of business at the microphone in a mighty way.

# Marty Stuart ~ Grand Ole Opry star and host of "The Marty Stuart Show" on RFD-TV.

Joey McKenzie: Master of the guitar! As you watch him play, you know he has been blessed with power and perfect control over the instrument. In my opinion, he is the greatest guitar player this side of Heaven. He is an Icon, and my hero.

# Leon Rhodes ~ Legendary Nashville session guitarist and member of Ernest Tubb's Texas Troubadours.

The first time I heard Joey McKenzie, his playing impressed me. His sound, chord progressions and ability to keep such good time - even when playing alone, was amazing. That guitarist is Joey McKenzie. His L-12 is the best sounding I've ever heard. You've got to hear him to believe it!

# Bob Bain ~ Guitarist for 22 years on "The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson" and L.A. session icon.

Joey's first musical experience began at age of 11, tuning the instruments his father had around their house - a guitar, mandolin, tenor guitar, and a tenor banjo. Around the age of 12, he started learning a few chords and licks on each of the instruments and has been playing them ever since. When he was 17, he became interested in playing the fiddle after becoming friends with Texas fiddle legend Benny Thomasson. "I went to fiddle contests just playing rhythm guitar, but I wasn't really inspired to play the fiddle. When I got the opportunity to back Benny up in a few contests and hear the way he played, all I could think about was trying to learn to play the fiddle!" It wasn't long before Joey began competing and has since won well over 100 fiddle contests and awards on other stringed instruments. Some of these include three-time World Champion Fiddler, World Series of Fiddling Champion and five-time Texas State Guitar Champion. As a touring musician, Joey has performed in 45 U.S. states as well as Canada, Europe, Russia and South America. Joey's performance highlights include The Grand Ole Opry, The Kennedy Center, NYC's Lincoln Center, Nashville's Ryman Auditorium, NPR's "A Prairie Home Companion" and RFD TV's "The Marty Stuart Show". In addition, Joey has shared the stage with musical greats Merle Haggard, Ricky Skaggs, Ray Price, Asleep at the Wheel, Larry Gatlin and the Gatlin Brothers, Connie Smith, and even a ukulele-slinging billionaire by the name of Warren Buffett! He has always been fascinated with the great behind the scenes rhythm guitar work of players such as Eldon Shamblin, Homer Haynes, Eddie Lang, Karl Farr, Freddie Green and Oscar Moore. In addition to touring with <u>The Western</u> <u>Flyers</u>, Joey enjoys restoring, repairing and collecting vintage stringed instruments and says he is still trying to get them in tune!

#### Sherry McKenzie

When eleven years old, Sherry experienced fiddle music for the first time. "I saw a fiddle player on TV," she recalls, "and thought it looked really, really fun. My parents got me an instrument, and I started playing in the sixth grade orchestra in my hometown of Idaho Falls, Idaho and I just fell in love with the music. The sound of it made me feel good." Sherry has essentially learned to play Texas-style completely by ear. "My parents would get me a



record, like Benny Thomasson or Kenny Baker, and I would try to put those licks in the old-time songs I was playing. I entered the state fiddle contest just for fun (I placed next to last!) but that year I fell in love with the Texas-style versions of the tunes I heard. I met Mike Parsons and Roberta Pearce at the contest and began taking lessons from them, learning this exciting style of fiddling, and the next year I got first place in the Junior Junior Division." After this first win, Sherry headed of to the national contest in Weiser, a few miles down the road. "I remember sitting in the gym at Weiser watching the open division and hearing the great Texas-style players for the very first time. Herman Johnson made a big impression on me--the way he stood, the way he played, even how he walked out on stage to compete, and I just thought he was so amazing." That year Sherry met Herman along with Benny Thomasson and Dick Barrett. These three fiddlers would deeply influence her playing over the next few years. "I had never met a Texas-style fiddler in person," she recalls.

"I just had this Benny Thomasson record. I remember playing outside on the sidewalk at Weiser-- I'm squeakin' around on this fiddle, and I heard fiddling over my shoulder and looked over and it was Benny Thomasson. I had been playing Clarinet Polka, and he was playing the harmony. I got really nervous and I thought, 'this is that man that I have the record of!' And he was just so nice. I met Dick Barrett that same year - my dad approached him and asked if he would have some time to watch me play and talk with me, which he did. Dick took me aside and showed me a different way to hold my bow, and I asked him some questions. He showed me Black & White Rag, and helped me all afternoon to get the bowing right. I greatly admired these three fiddlers and wanted to play just like they played." After these encounters, Sherry recalls, "I would spend hundreds of hours with a record, slowing it down and listening over and over. And I spent hours watching great fiddle players, trying to figure out how they bowed certain songs." Sherry has completed Suzuki Violin Unit 1 at Texas Christian University and has incorporated the pedagogical ideas of the method into her teaching. "I believe there are more similarities than differences with the Suzuki method and a systematic approach to learning traditional fiddling." Sherry enjoys working with Suzuki students in an Enrichment role to supplement their existing studies and with intermediate level students of all ages. She is a sought after instructor at workshops and institutes across the country.







# Winners and Recap of the 2020 Ameripolitan Awards

The 2020 Ameripolitan Awards were celebrated this weekend in Memphis, TN, with numerous showcases and performances happening all across the city, from the famous clubs on Beale Street, to Dale Watson's newly-opened historic music venue, Hernando's Hideaway, to the stately Guesthouse at Graceland where the awards show proper was help Monday night, February 24th. See all the winners below.

Meant to recognize American music with a strong roots influence that often gets lost in the realm of popular music, as Nick 13 of Tiger Army said when presenting an award during the show, "*The music that the mainstream has forgotten, that's the music we remember.*"

Earlier in the week, Tanya Tucker helped provide one of the coolest moments of the event as she showed up to Hernando's unexpectedly Thursday night to sing a couple of songs at the pre-party. Other events helped lead up to the awards, including Junior Brown performing Friday night, a fashion show and musical showcase at the Circuit Playhouse in midtown Memphis Saturday night with Farmer & Adele, Johnny Falstaff, and Charley Crockett all performing, the "Godfathers" of Ameripolitan—The Reverend Horton Heat, Big Sandy and His Fly-Rite Boys, and Wayne "The Train" Hancock—all performing Sunday night at Hernando's, and a tribute to the Bakersfield Sound during the day on Monday.

It all led to Monday night when the respective artists in the Rockabilly, Western Swing, and Honky Tonk categories showed up dressed to the 9's, and an awards show broke out. Announced by Dallas Wayne and hosted by Big Sandy and Doris Mayday, it saw performances by Big Cedar Fever, Whitney Rose, Two Tons of Steel, Tami Savoy, Summer Dean, James "Slim" Hand opened the show (like he's done all 7 years) performing "Baby, Baby Don't Tell Me That," along with other performances.

As Western Swing Male winner Dave Stuckey said, the Ameripolitan Awards are like artists that are from an island of misfit toys that don't fit in Americana. Honky Tonk Male winner Charley Crockett told the storywhile accepting his award about hearing a street performer in New Orleans, Louisiana playing "My Bucket's Got a Hole In It" by Hank Williams, and knowing that's what he wanted to do with the rest of his life.

This was the first year there was not an "Outlaw" category. Instead, those acts were considered in the Honky Tonk category. Special awards included drummer J.M. Van Eaton who was one of the original Sun Studios players who performed on tracks from Johnny Cash, Jerry Lee Lewis, and others. He was awarded the Founder of the Sound award, while Duane Eddy was honored with The Master Award.


