NWWSMS' WESTERN SWING MUSIC CAMP AUGUST 7-11, 2019

Taking place along side this year's Western Swing Music Festival and Hall of Fame Celebration will be the NWWSMS' Western Swing Music Camp, under the capable direction of Suze Spencer and Tim Dawdy. We are so excited about growing this program, incorporating it into the festival week-end. With such a spacious venue, it seems like the perfect location to grow and inspire a new generation of western swing musicians. What a stellar line-up of instructors we have this year! Here is just a short introduction to the talented music coaches waiting to welcome the students for 2019:





Suze Spencer was born into one of America's most renowned Western music families. Raised in the fold of working ranch hands, musicians, artists and entrepreneurs, she began learning guitar by watching her grandfather and Karl Farr, the original guitarist with Sons of The Pioneers. Later, Lloyd Perryman, Roy Lanham and Freddie Green were influential to her style. Suze teaches master classes in the Classic Western and Western Swing styles in SW Washington, at festivals and music camps across the USA.

Tim Dawdy is a Northwest Dobro/Steel Guitar favorite. He has trained in both Dobro and Steel Guitar with the nation's best including the late Maestro Stacy Phillips. He teaches basic and intermediate Dobro at Artichoke Music in Portland and his modern music studio in Ridgefield Washington. Most styles of music are taught, including Western

Swing, Bluegrass and Jazz Standards. His teaching philosophy is simple: Teach the student a solid foundation of basic Dobro/Steel skills that will allow them to rapidly progress. His goal is to get you comfortable playing music with others in JAMs, where the real fun begins. (Check out Tim's article on page 10)

New Business:





Hyram Posey loves the southwestern lifestyle, and admired the local bands that came to town to play dance music every Saturday night in his hometown of Alamogordo, NM. A friend introduced him to one of the best fiddle players in the state, and from that relationship Hyram became a champion fiddler. Hyram became a recording artist at the tender age of 16. Working for a railroad company,

Hyram spent weekends in Nashville, traveling back and forth to keep both ends of the candle burning. As soon he retired, Hyram moved to Dickson, TN, and now spends all his free time composing music for sessions, movie tracks, and producing other artists to help them get recorded.



Toby Hanson's association with his most well-known instrument, the accordion, began early in his life. Born into a musical family in Puyallup, WA, his accordion playing really became serious in college when he began studying with noted local accordion educator Gary Dahl. Gary's teaching gave Toby the foundations he would need for his professional career as a

musician, including the skills that would make him a valuable band member. Besides his work in Western Swing, Toby is also the leader of the Smilin' Scandinavians polka band.



A native of Plainview, TX, **Daron Brown**, was born into a long line of pickers and fiddle players. Daron started playing guitar with his family at age nine for city jamborees and barn dances. He played for square dances behind square dance caller Sid Perkins. As a multi-instrumentalist, Daron started playing bass for Jimmy Blakely until he graduated from high school. After graduating from

South Plains College, Daron played guitar in a band that featured fiddle champion Hyram Posey! Did someone say, 'Reunion Time!'??? Proficient on guitar, bass and vocals, he is a master musician with a contagious smile.



The musical career of **Judy Hayes** began as a student at Hawaii's Oahu Conservatory of Music, with her parents' support and inspiration from her uncle. At the age of 13, she progressed from student to teacher. She taught Hawaiian guitar, ukulele, rhythm guitar, bass guitar and accordion for seven years. During this time, she also gained much playing experience at fairs, convention centers, various organizations,

clubs and on the radio. In 1983, Judy joined the Western Swing Society of Seattle and was newsletter editor for two years, a board member for two years and an alternate for three years. Judy has performed with many of the top names in the business.





Highlights from the April Showcase



The thought, "All is right in my world," swept over me as Southern Comfort kicked off their first song of the afternoon at the April Showcase. Despite the band's absence from the stage - with Dave DuChane wintering in Minnesota and Gene Burbank's continuing health challenges - this band re-groups every Spring without skipping a beat, performing and amazing their growing number of fans - me included.

As is the case with so many of our seasoned Northwest musicians, the members of **Southern Comfort** add their talent to other bands in the area as well. Here is just an example. Shelley is also with **The Old Strokers**, who will be hosting the May Showcase. Dave DuChane is part of a Hawaiian Trio which entertains around Puget Sound. During the winter months, he and his brother keep busy playing local clubs. Robert Van den Akker has made himself available to help out several of our western swing groups in need of a drummer for a day or a week-end. And, when health isn't an issue, Gene (who, along with Phil Mitchell founded **The Old Strokers**) still plays for their weekly jam on Monday nights at the Club 170.

The two hours passed so quickly. Before I knew it, **Southern Comfort** was leaving the stage and we were setting up for the afternoon jam. When folks saw the quality of the jammers along with the back-up band, the hall stayed full of smiling, happy people waiting for the music to begin again. As Shelley would tell you, "It's hard to express how satisfying it is for the musicians to see you all out there dancing and enjoying yourselves. Without dancers (and listeners), playing music for the showcases each month would fall flat." Thank you for supporting live music.

They were public until we had deliberately practiced it for about six months.

reaps the same amount of benefit. There are basically three types don't even realize what you are doing is wrong. of practice: Naïve, Purposeful and Deliberate.

(1) Naive - not even really practice. For example: Jamming with a friend, or noodling on the couch. People get better up to a point but then they stop improving. Doing more does not necessarily result in improvement. There is a jam that I regularly attended about ten years ago, a well-run affair with nice people. When I returned to visit the jam a few months ago, it was delightful to see that about 30% of the participants that I knew from the past were still attending the jam. They also played at the same approximate skill level as when I left ten years earlier.

We've all seen people who go to the gym and don't progress; guitarists who play exactly the same after ten years as they did in their second year; doctors, teachers, or programmers who only seem worse with the passage of time. This is the effect of what we are calling "naive practice." These naive practice evolutions are not a bad thing; just don't expect great musical progress from our efforts.

(2) Purposeful (Targeted Practice) - One step above the naive category. This is having a goal for the training session. Early in my lap-style resonator guitar training, I wanted to learn the tune "Cherokee Shuffle." I selected the Stacy Phillips Dobro instructional DVD because the song was taught in great detail. I purposefully practiced Cherokee Shuffle for over six months.

That summer, I attended a bluegrass instructional camp where Stacy Phillips was the Dobro instructor. At the first class, each student was asked to play something. I played Cherokee Shuffle, note for note from the Stacy Phillips DVD and tablature. Stacy cringed and showed disapproval when I finished. "Who taught you to play it that way?" he asked. "You did," I replied. "No, I didn't," replied Stacy. I had practiced purposefully. But there was no opportunity for correction or feedback. My practice was done in a vacuum. My mistakes were never corrected. In fact, my technique errors were reinforced. Acclaimed bluegrass musician Keith Little reminds us: "The brain learns your mistakes the same way it learns the right stuff. Practice correctly."

(3) Deliberate - The gold standard for learning. Similar to purposeful except it includes:

Instructor In deliberate practice a teacher or coach is available for feedback and correction. There are no "tricks" to getting better; you follow a structured program. This is where a teacher/coach can really help. The teacher can guide students to what is appropriate to practice at any given time in the musical journey. This doesn't mean that you must train with a coach 100% percent of the time. But you should regularly seek objective correction of your technique from a qualified person.

> **Goal** The aspect of your playing you want to improve. What is your short-term goal? Set a S.M.A.R.T. goal. Let's imagine that you have difficulty with the key of F. Here is an example of setting S.M.A.R.T. goals:

> > **Specific** – Learn to play a solo in the key of F. **Measurable** – Master the F and B-flat scales and arpeggios in two positions.

Attainable – Yes, this is reasonable at my skill level.

Related – Every time someone calls a song in the key of F, I get uncomfortable. My solos in F are terrible.

<u>T</u>imely – I give myself six months.

Growth happens outside your comfort zone. Address the things that are holding you back. Practice the techniques that are challenging.

Outside of Comfort **Zone** Work on the hard stuff! The human tendency is to practice what we do well. Instead, focus on a technique that you find difficult. The National Fire Academv Executive Fire Officer Program (what folks in my field call "charm school for fire chiefs") is a demanding four year program. Here is their message to people who make high-stakes decisions every day. "Get comfortable with being uncomfortable!" Growth happens outside comfort zone.

Address the things that are holding you back. Practice the techniques that are challenging. Recently I was at a resonator guitar conference in Nashville where I discussed the issue of performance anxiety with a top steel guitar player, who reminded me that he still has anxiety before he goes on stage. This player makes a living working outside of his comfort zone. Force yourself to practice outside your comfort zone!

What does this mean to the musician?

- 1) Take some lessons this year. (Get coaching)
- 2) Consider going outside of your normal musical discipline. If you're comfortable with bluegrass, take a jazz class or a swing class. (Get outside your comfort zone)
- 3) Ask for honest feedback, and listen.
- 4) Practice the lesson with an emphasis on good technique.
- 5) Return for correction. (Accept and correct)

Jeff Newman (Steel Guitar Hall of Fame) said, "There is only one thing that separates the great players from the not-so-great, and then the non-players. They never gave up. They never found it easier to learn than you can. They never learned anything more quickly than you can. They never had an angel of God visit them in the middle of the night giving them special instructions on how to play dazzling and marvelous jazz."

In your mind you must have a clear picture of what a perfect technique looks and feels like at every point in the motion. What separates really good performers from average performers is that they've developed better and more complete mental representations. This is best done through deliberate practice.

Talent is made, not born. Specifically, it's made through years of deliberate practice.


