THE BATON PASSES FROM LEON RAUSCH TO JASON ROBERTS: A New Leader for the Bob Wills' Texas Playboys Band Is Announced

An important milestone in Western Swing music occurred Saturday evening (August 11, 2018) at the Texas Country Music Hall of Fame show. Bob Wills Heritage Foundation Executive director, who is Bob's daughter, Carolyn, came on to make an important announcement. She said that

the Estate of Bob Wills, Leon Rausch, Brett Bingham and Jason Roberts have selected members for the Bob Wills Texas Playboys band, which will continue the Wills tradition. This is the band The Wills Family, Leon Rausch and Tommy Allsup put together and named more than a decade ago, and has performed to great success.

of the NWWSMS Hall of Fame (2012), Harvey Nelson, passed away September. memorial dance/ potluck hosted by his band will be held for Sunday, him on October 14, from 1:30 4:30, at the Rochester Swede Hall

A gifted musician

and honored member

(18543 Albany St SW, Rochester, WA 98579).

Harvey was born in Lenore, NC, on January 3, 1936. The family moved later to Roseburg, OR, and Harvey was playing for dances in the local grange halls and barns by the time he was fourteen.

He loved being with all the people and music was the best way to do that! Then rock and roll came along and Harvey was captured by the new sound, just like so many people in our great nation. When he was 20, and playing some good rhythm and lead guitar, Harvey told his friends he was sick of playing that old cowboy music. But he didn't consider Bob Wills a cowboy.

In 1968, around age 32, Harvey started playing bass guitar also. Then he opened a guitar shop in Centralia, WA, called, of course, "Harvey's Guitars." He gave guitar lessons and had the shop for 3 or 4 years.

Harvey played lead guitar and bass all through northern California with Bill Pray, up the coast of Oregon, and in many, many places in Washington. He played lead guitar for Tex Williams, from around 1975-1979. He thoroughly enjoyed those years and still talks about the good times with Tex.

Then, a new opportunity opened up quite unexpectedly. Harvey was in a band scheduled to play when Red Simpson came into town. Red wasn't able to make it, so the booking agent got Bonnie Guitar instead. With Harvey playing lead and Bonnie loving his sound, the band backed up Bonnie in various towns, including Bremerton, Centralia and Raymond.

In 1989, Harvey suffered a stroke. He had to learn to play guitar all over again. The silver lining in the cloud was that he learned just how much he really did love Bob Wills' music.

Harvey resided in Tenino, WA, and, over the years, played with many local bands including Sharyn Lee and the Sundowners.

He will be missed by a large community of fans and friends

This is a continuation of the Bob Wills' Texas Playboys Band and will be known as Bob Wills' Texas Playboys with Jason Roberts. The changes to the band, passing the baton from one generation of great players to the next, was so moving, Brett, Carolyn, Leon, were all in tears. Yes, the time is right. Brett came on to tell Leon's bio.

(Editor's note: The following might have been part of what Brett shared)

"...Leon Rausch, born October 2, 1927, in Billings, Missouri, became famous as "the voice" of Bob Wills and his Texas Playboys. He served as the lead vocalist for that group between 1958 and the early 60s, after which he created his own band, The New Texas Playboys when Bob Wills died. ..."

"... A desire to open his mouth and belt out songs came to Rausch early. (Leon was) the only child of musical couple Fred and Ida Jane. A few years later, the family trio performed around their hometown of Billings, Missouri, with little Leon at the mic."

"I was eat up with it," Rausch said. "I thought I

was going to be Gene Autry."

Rausch never reached Autry's level of fame and fortune, but he forged a long career, successful marriage, and a happy life that he looks back on with way more pride than regret."

Tommie Ritter Smith brought out Leon's award, and, as President, formally inducted him into the Texas Country Music Hall of Fame. To complete the announcement, the band played The Texas Playboy Theme song and Leon sang. It gave me goosebumps. Leon received a standing ovation, the first one of the night. We will have the full story in The Western Swing Monthly.

Elsewhere it was reported that "Jason Roberts Band became the New Texas Playboys" and that is incorrect. A momentous occasion as this in music history, it must be reported accurately.

And there you have it. With the blessing of Leon Rausch and the Bob Wills Heritage Foundation. Good move, and the time is right.



Bobby Flores was indeed honored to be among the many nominees again at the 4th Annual Josie Music Awards, also known as the JMA's, held September 8, 2018, at the Celebrity Theater - Dollywood in Pigeon

Forge, TN. Bobby had four nominations this year, "Music Producer of the Year," "Musician of the Year" and "Traditional/Classic Country Male Artist of the Year." He was awarded "Traditional/Classic Country Male Artist Entertainer of the Year." In 2016 Bobby was awarded "Traditional/Classic Country Male Artist of the Year" at the Josie Music Awards, held at the Schermerhorn Symphony Center, Nashville, TN. In 2017 Bobby was honored at the Josie Music Awards to be inducted into the "Independent Country Music Hall of Fame" at the Nissan Stadium in

Nashville, TN.

The Josie Music Awards is the largest Independent Music Awards Show. Founder and owner, Josie Passantino, is also the General Manager at Josie's Country Blast Radio which is heard world-wide and was awarded Favorite Internet Radio Station of the Year in 2016 & 2017. Josie has been hosting her own radio show since she was 14 years old. On the Dance Hall Tour: Heading for Fredericksburg

Last year after the Bob Wills Days event, (thanks to Paula Jungmann) Paul Anastasio and I were privileged to get a personal tour of some old German and Czech dance halls between Austin and Houston with Texas Dance Hall historian Stephen Michael Dean. Stephen's book HISTORIC DANCE HALLS OF EAST CENTRAL TEXAS is available on Amazon. I was looking forward to seeing Stephen again after this year's Bob Wills Days but learned he had passed away in his sleep the night before we left Turkey. He will be sorely missed by all who knew him.

Just before we left home I saw a posting on FaceBook for a dance hall tour leaving from Austin on May 19th, ending with a dance in one of the old dance halls. We signed up since we already planned to go to the Hill Country of Texas after Bob Wills Day.

Leaving southbound from Turkey, we spent a couple of days bucking headwinds to reach Springtown, just outside Fort Worth. Of course we had to see the running of the longhorn cattle at the Fort Worth Stock Yards! In Stephenville we dined at the Hard Eight, probably the best barbecue in all Texas. Barb said she has never had better. Just down the road is the famed Dublin Bottling. During the tour of the plant they tell the long, involved history of Dublin Dr. Pepper. We stayed for four days at 'Camel Stop,' an RV park half way between Dublin and Stephenville. Folks there said we had to visit Veldhuizen Cheese Shoppe down the road a piece about 2 miles back off the highway. They make the most wonderful cheeses and smoked meats. I'll order some more of their goodies online now that we're home.

We made Fredericksburg our base camp for the next week. From there we toured the National Museum of the Pacific War and the Chester Nimitz Museum; if you go, give yourself at least two full days to take in all the exhibits, four days would be better. We went to the Lyndon B. Johnson Ranch but couldn't tour his Texas White House because it was too hot to leave our dog in the car for that long. I did go back one day to fish the Pedernales River. We took a drive down to San Antonio to see the Alamo and walk along the River Walk which is fascinating. Then we checked out Luckenbach to see if Willy was there. Sadly we missed him by a few years. We peeked into antique, 2nd hand, and just junk stores too. Proving it's a small world, in a local quilt shop Barb met three employees who grew up or had lived within 15 miles of where we live now!

As time closed in on the 19th we packed up and headed for Austin, but not before sampling a couple good barbecue places, Cranky Frank's and Backwoods BBQ.

It was an easy drive to Austin. Saturday we dressed in our finest and headed for the Dance Hall Road Trip.

Back in February of 2014, filmmaker Erik McCowan

linked up with dance hall historian Stephen Dean to document several century old dance halls and discuss the possibility of a d o c u m e n t a r y film. This past April, "Dance Hall Days" premiered at the Thin Line Film Fest in Denton and at the Hill Country Film Festival



in Fredericksburg, where it screened to a sold out overflow audience and took home that event's first place prize of "Best Texas Film." The award was presented to Erik the same evening Stephen said goodbye to this earthly world. The documentary will go on tour later this year with further opportunities for wider viewing.

The Dance Hall Road Trip grew from similar trips hosted by Stephen Dean and his passion for these old Texas dance halls. This tour as well as the documentary was dedicated to his vision and to these once forgotten structures and the people and communities that support them.

THE HALLS

Hruska's at Park

This ha11 sat unused for decades and was merely a storage building along the way to the lake as fishermen drove by. In 2016, the hall was completely renovated. Its first event was a wedding venue for the owners' daughter. Now it is a completely restored historic 120 vear old wooden Czechdance hall. The hall was documented in the "Dance film Hall Days" as the moving crew was there to lift

and relocate the entire structure.

Round Top Rifle Hall

This was our dinner stop on the tour, an annual fund raiser for the hall. Along side the hall, they had their open pit BBQ going full force and we enjoyed some very fine chicken and sausages. An auction of many beautifully hand crafted items followed the dinner.

The Round Top Schutzen Verein (shooting society) was formed in 1873 by the town's German heritage inhabitants. It's purpose was stated as "the support and encouragement of innocent out-door sports, such as bicycle riding, target














Bobby Flores has recorded another wonderful CD. This time the theme is 11 beautiful inspirational sounds with Bobby heard doing vocals, guitar and of course on fiddle. In addition, he even plays steel guitar on two of the cuts, Charles Goodman's Who Am I and a thrilling instrumental version of the

classic gem America the Beautiful. The other album steel guitarists are the late Randy Reinhard on seven of the cuts and Tommy Detamore who plays steel on one cut.

The album opens with Dottie Rambo's Just Build My Mansion. Other cuts from Dottie's pen are Remind Me Dear Lord and Sheltered in the Arms of God. Also included is the gospel classic Amazing Grace with The Wiggins on background vocal. They also back Bobby on the classic sacred gem How Great Thou Art. Another gem is Albert Brumley's I'll Fly Away. Mary Jane Flores joins Bobby for a duet on What a Day That Will Be and Laura Weber White joins him on In the Garden. The remaining cut is the beautiful ballad *Empty Hands*.





donation. We also added a new feature this year, the "Cowboy Church at The Gathering" on Saturday morning. and trap shooting, open air athletics, games, dancing, and others of a like character". The property was purchased in 1881. Construction of the dance hall, bandstand, outdoor kitchen and bar was completed in 1912 when the site was named Schutzen Park (Sharpshooter's Park). The oldest 4th of July parade west of the Mississippi happens here; it's been held every year since 1851!

Bellville Turn Verein

In 1885 the Bellville Turnverein Gut Heil (gymnastics club for good health) was formed by German immigrants encouraging gymnastics (turnen) and athletics, a club (verein) for good health (gut heil) to meet the need for a place for community-wide social activities including physical exercise, dances, celebrations and meetings. The club purchased the property in 1895 and in August, 1897, hired German immigrant carpenter Joachim Hintz of Millheim to build a social hall. The 12-sided hall, which seated up to 400 for dances, was completed in October of 1897 at a cost of \$2,500.



Bellville Turnverein Hall

Coshatte Hall

The present Coshatte Hall, built in 1928, was used primarily for dancing with an elevated area for orchestras. In 1950, the name was changed to Coshatte Agricultural Society Hall. The 6-sided round structure is east of Bellville. The turnverein movement was brought to the United States by Forty-Eighters, political refugees from Germany who were ardent practitioners of the gymnastic system begun in 1811 by Friedrich Ludwig Jahn. In 1883, the original Coshatte Hall was a simple dance platform supervised by the Coshatte Turnverein.

Fayetteville SPJST No. 1 Hall

Here we were treated to their annual dance with a traditional German oompah band playing lively music. Gotta love that polka!

This is the very first Slovanska Podporujici Jednota Statu Texas (Slavonic Benevolent Order of the State of Texas) hall in Texas. The hall was dedicated on October 2, 1910. It has had few changes over the years and still retains its open-air construction and it's used for many occasions. It is the pride of Fayetteville and has become a much-visited destination of late.

Love "real" country music? Get involved with the Western Swing Society!

N AUGUST 12
I had the distinct honor of being inducted into the Hall of Fame for the NorthWest Western Swing Music Society (NWWSMS). My 47 years of playing steel and 24 years of teaching steel guitar finally made me slightly famous, if not quite rich!

Attending the festival for three days in the small town of Enumclaw in my new home state of Washington, was a real eye opener. The society

members are mostly older, similar to what you'll find at any "fur and feather" clubs (Eagles, Elks, etc.), almost all of them from the generation raised on Western swing or classic country. Many were dancers and music enthusiasts, not players, who love this genre of music and dance activity. Everybody was super friendly, especially President Jeanne Yearian, such a warm, caring woman.

What struck me the most was how little known the NWWSMS seems to be, and what a hidden treasure it is. Have you ever heard of them? I had previously attended and played at just one festival for the Sacramento chapter eight years ago.

If you're presently grousing about how country music these days just doesn't seem like true country to you, and the live bands in your area sound like rock bands, I'd encourage you to get involved with the nearest of any of the 3 chapters of the Western Swing Society.

In addition to my Washington chapter, there's another chapter in Sacramento, CA (Sacramento Western Swing Society: SWSS), and a third in Oklahoma/Texas,

the Western Swing Music Society of the Southwest (WSMSS).

You might even consider starting a chapter of the Western Swing Society in your own hometown. You players in the Los Angeles region and Phoenix, take note!

As far as I can tell, each chapter is loosely related to the others, but each has its own Hall of Fame. I believe they all try to get young people interested in playing Western swing through scholarships and instruction.

The Washington festival was a solid 3 days of live performances by more than a dozen bands, plus instrumental instruction and


