# Portrait of an American Hero

A Slice of Americana Ready for the Big Screen

(Are you the dancer who was overheard commenting, "Bob Who???" at the March Showcase? This article, then, is for you! Please read on.)

We celebrated the birthday of Bob Wills at the NW Western Swing Music Society's March Showcase. Turkey, Texas, is getting ready to host their 41<sup>st</sup> annual Bob Wills Day celebration, scheduled for the weekend of April 28<sup>th</sup> this year. (*Stop by if you are in the area!*) Many may be familiar with the music associated with Western Swing, but how much do most know about Bob Wills, the man?

Last month, I had the opportunity to interview Dwight Adair, a director, writer and producer of entertainment projects which include documentaries, reality television and feature films. Based out of Austin, Texas, he is currently looking for investors to help finance an independent feature film project based on the life, music and times of Bob Wills—the innovative band

leader of the Texas Playboys who created the American music genre, Western Swing. The motion picture is called, <u>Deep Within My Heart</u>.

Dwight and his partners have owned the exclusive worldwide rights to the Bob Wills life story, in perpetuity, for some time, both from the Wills estate and the publishers of the definitive biography on Bob Wills, San Antonio Rose, written by Dr. Charles Townsend. To give you an idea of how long this idea has been in the making, Dwight and his wife first talked to Betty Wills about making a movie about her late husband, Bob. When she gave them her approval, the movie was scheduled for production. As fate would have it, just as they were preparing to go into the studio, Deep Within My Heart was bumped and their time slot given to Loretta Lynn's Coal Miner's Daughter. The Adairs waited patiently. Then, in 2010, several close business associates approached Dwight saying, "It's time to try again."

## **Cherishing The Memories**



Marty Dahlgren 1928-2012

Marty Dahlgren passed away on 3/24/12 in his sleep at age 84. He was surrounded by his family at the time.

Marty played fiddle with the Dreyer Brothers band for several years. Marty has always enjoyed playing Western Swing music and was a founding charter member of Pioneers of Western Swing and inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1991.

In the 50's he played with Jack Roberts and the Evergreen Drifters in South King County and in the 60's he played on a weekly TV show out of Seattle known as Evergreen Jubilee. During that time he was part of a back up band for big names such as Jimmy Dickens, Faron Young, Hank Thompson, and George Jones.

In 1967 his son joined the Boy Scouts of America and Marty left music to devote all his extra time as a Scout Master. Even after getting back into music, he still devoted much of his time to Scouts, working with his grandchildren.

Marty was a devoted husband, fiddle player extraordinaire, mountain climber, mechanic, mushroom hunter and fisherman. He was loved by many and will be greatly missed.

Dick Barrett 1918-2012

Lloyd Rollins "Dick" Barrett of Livingston, 93, departed this earth on Feb. 23, 2012. He was born on Aug. 6, 1918, in Maysville, OK. An icon in the traditional music community, he will be remembered for his enormous sense of joie de vivre.

He survived the Great Depression and Dust Bowl of the Southwest. On the heels of the '30s, he was sent to the Pacific Theater of World War II in the service of the U.S. Army Combat Engineers. There he became a decorated veteran. These searing experiences left him a man who greatly appreciated the privilege of life itself, and of being an American. He was determined to fill every day of his life with humor, love, laughter and music.

Following his discharge from the military, he worked as the band leader and fiddler for Rex Allen, Tex Ritter and T. Texas Tyler for many years. He amassed a collection of hundreds of awards over the next five decades, winning every large fiddle competition in the U.S. He was inducted into the Pioneers of Western Swing Hall of Fame in Seattle (1994), the Legends of Western Swing Hall of Fame in Sacramento, Calif., the National Fiddlers Hall of Fame in Weiser, Idaho and the Jazz Fiddler Hall of Fame of Oklahoma.

He is survived by his loyal wife of 30 years, Lisa Rhoades Barrett; two children; six grandchildren; two nephews; and an incredible community of friends.



Arlan "Red" Clinton Barnes 1928-2012

Arlan "Red" Clinton Barnes, age 84, passed away on February 17, 2012, in Little Rock, Arkansas. He was born in Perry, Arkansas in 1928. He was a retired rigger from the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory in California. He was inducted into the Sacramento Western Swing Society Hall of Fame on October 5, 1997.

During his musical career, he played fiddle with Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys, Patsy Cline, Mel Tillis, Willie Nelson, Jim Reeves, Buck Owens, Glenn Campbell, Bill Anderson, Ray Price and others. Arlan also played upright bass and fiddle with Eddie Fields in the Bill Thacker Band in the early 60s.

He will be greatly missed by his many friends, children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.





Victor Galen King 1925-2012

Victor Galen King, Wenatchee, WA, passed away on Thursday, March 8, 2012. He was born on May 26, 1925, in Augusta, KS, where he was raised in a Christian home. Vic joined the U.S. Navy at the beginning of World War II. While visiting family, he met Marcelene Huffman and they were married in Wenatchee, WA on August 26, 1950. Upon his discharge from service in Vallejo, CA in 1953, Vic and Marcelene moved to Wenatchee. Vic found employment at Alcoa and later worked for the U.S. Postal Service until his retirement in 1984.

He was a lifelong member of the Fraternal Order of Eagles. Vic was known to family and friends as a man of few words, who loved his family. He was a music lover. especially big band, country, gospel and western swing. Vic was a charter member of the Seattle WSMS.

Vic spent the last seven years battling Alzheimer's Disease. The pain of letting him go is only made easier by knowing that God took him home quickly, painlessly and while he still knew we loved him.

Vic is survived by his wife, Marcelene; his children and their spouses; his grandchildren, one brother; four sisters and many friends.



Patrick Russell Goodbla 1948-2012

Patrick Russell Goodbla, 63, passed away peacefully, surrounded by loved ones, March 2, 2012, at the Hospice Care Center in Longview, Wa.

Patrick was born May 30, 1948, in Kelso. He was the eldest of three siblings born to Lenore and Clinton Goodbla. Patrick graduated from Mark Morris High School in 1966.

Patrick is survived by his mother, Lenore Goodbla; his companion and true love, Cheryl Lewis of Clackamas, Ore.; three children; two grandchildren; three siblings; several nieces and nephews; and countless friends and loved ones.

One of Patrick's greatest passions in life was music. He loved performing and sharing his gift with the world, particularly with the western swing band, Longhorn. When Patrick was on the stage, his enthusiasm was infectious and his love for the music palpable. It is often said that if you handed him any instrument and showed him how to play a scale, he would be able to play that instrument in no time at all, and that couldn't have been more true. His craft was mastered beautifully and even when he was no longer able to play or sing, the way he talked about and listened to music had everyone around him tapping their feet and living it with him.

Patrick was a 2006 inductee into the Seattle Western Swing Music Society.

And Dwight is not the only one who holds that opinion. Dwight asked the question, "How would you define what makes an American Hero?" He then went on to explain how he would answer that question . . . and presents his case - that Bob Wills qualifies to share that title - through this biographical screenplay. In Dwight's words:

"A New York Times obituary said he (Bob Wills) was "a super-giant before there were super-giants, an Elvis Presley of the 1930's and '40's." "Until Hank Williams came

along, it was just Bob Wills," says Willie Nelson. "He was it." As Waylon Jennings immortalized him in his hit song, "Bob Wills is still the King!"

Bob Wills was a colorful band leader-composer-fiddler from Texas who performed throughout the Southwest for years, capturing the hearts of fans nationwide. Wills brought country music to the city and created *Western Swing*, a dynamic hybrid of old style blues, New Orleans jazz, and western fiddle music performed by a twenty member band infused with Chicago jazz.

For more than fifty years, Wills and his band—The Texas



Playboys—kept the nation dancing and recorded over 1000 tunes, including the classics "San Antonio Rose", "Faded Love", "Steel Guitar Rag", "Take Me Back to Tulsa", "Maiden's Prayer", "Stay All Night", and countless others. In fact, for a while in the early forties, his records sold better than those of any other recording artist.

But Bob Wills was more than a legendary performer. He was a man from the sharecropper's fields who understood middle America's

hardship, sweat and pain. He was one of the common people, a favorite son who had somehow fought his way to the top. In the Depression, he was their hope when they had none; their happiness when it seemed all else had been lost. And when he played and danced and jive-talked in the dance halls of the Southwest, his music kept a desperate but determined populace on its feet. He kept their dreams alive. He was one of *them*.

<u>Deep Within My Heart</u> takes place just when Bob's career is beginning, just when the conflict between Bob the successful band leader and Bob the man is in its infancy—a conflict that later almost cost him not only his happiness and dreams, but his life as well.

At the height of his success, money and fast times turn Bob away from his true self and beguiles him into becoming greedy, power hungry, hardhearted. It seems as if the common people have lost their last hero.

But then Betty, the only woman Bob ever really loved and respected, re-enters his life. With her love and mature understanding he finds himself, renews his commitment to the common people and restores his faith in a dream—a life long dream of compassion, loyalty and music.


#### <<<ALL CLEAR>>>>

This, then, is a story from the common people of America. It's as pure as a folk song, as deep as the blues, as vibrant as jazz—just like Bob Wills and his music. Striking reverence for the man and sheer love for his music lives on in the hearts of middle Americans from New York to California, even today. Western Swing is still their music. Bob Wills is still their King. And this is their motion picture: Deep Within My Heart."

We will keep you updated on Dwight's progress. The narrative feature film will be shot in Oklahoma and Texas with principal photography projected to begin as soon as financing partners are found. This is a wonderful new CD by Scotland's premier Western Swing band. In the spotlight on vocals and guitar is Stretch and he is surrounded by some very hot musicians. Tom MacNiven plays trumpet and flugelhorn and Seonaid Aitken does fiddle and vocals.

The rhythm section has Roy Percy playing double bass and Cammy Sinclair on drums. Thomas Marsden is the guest steel guitarist on Stretch's own composition, The Things that Break Your Heart. Brian Kellock plays piano on a fantastic version of the Red Foley composition
