Thank you all for giving me another crack at guiding our NWWSMS through the next year. I want to take this opportunity to welcome our new board member. Sharon Smith, to the staff. She has a lot of experience with our organization and we look forward to hearing her ideas and suggestions. I also want to welcome Sharon Capps as our newly elected Treasurer and the rest of the officers and board who have agreed to serve for another year. Without these dedicated folks there would be no NWWSMS.

A big thanks goes out to the featured Showcase Band, **Lloyd Hooper and the Cascade Ramblers**, for the great job they did at the November dance. Thank you, also, Lloyd for hosting the very moving Veterans Day Ceremony.

One of the biggest financial challenges facing us in 2015 and beyond is the cost of our newsletter. Hard copy mail-outs pose the greatest challenge. We do have a large number of older members, many of whom are homebound and either do not have access to a computer or the skills to use one. I know for a fact that many of these folks look forward to receiving their newsletter in the mail so I was thinking it would be nice if we could set up an "Adopt a Member Club" whereby some members receiving their news letter via e-mail would agree to print a copy and send it to one or two of these computer-free members. I think it would be a great act of kindness and bring our Society much closer together.

Right now we are mailing out approximately 200 newsletters per month. On an individual basis, for 11 months that is a cost of \$1.50 each, \$16.50 per year per member just for printing plus postage.

OK. He graduated from Woodward High School in 1954, then attended college at Phillips University in Enid, OK, and Wichita University in Wichita, KS. In 1960, Gary started his banking career at Del City State Bank and later worked in banks in El Dorado, Moore and Noble, Oklahoma.

Gary's passion for music began at a very young age, when his parents gave him a xylophone and a drum. He loved it when his parents would take him to dances, and he would sit and listen to the music. He learned to play the piano and clarinet often playing by ear. When his grandparents bought him a standard Sears guitar, he reworked it with his father, making it into his first steel guitar. In high school, he joined the school band playing the clarinet and he played the steel guitar with his two younger sisters and playing in local talent shows as The Bloxsom Trio. After high school he joined with Hurshul Clothier and the Oklahoma Travelers, traveling throughout Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, New Mexico and Kansas, earning a reputation as one of the leading dance bands in the Southwest. In 1955 they were heard daily on radio station KSIW in Woodward, OK and also appeared on KGEO television in Enid, OK. While playing in Nashville, Garv met the musicians he liked such as Johnny Cash. Chet Atkins and Jim Reeves. He also toured with Merle Lindsav and Leftv Frizzell. While playing with Merle Lindsay, he began to play the saxophone, one of his career goals, and became an accomplished saxophonist. Thru the years he would come off the road, but would always return to his beloved music that brought him memories and friendships that he said "money can't buy." In 2001 he was inducted into the Seattle Western Swing Hall of Fame and in 2003 was inducted into the Western Swing Music Society of the Southwest Hall of Fame.

When asked to write his biography, he wrote "The Mindset of a Male Musician". He wrote, "Musicians live in a totally different world than most people – they eat, sleep, dream and breathe music. They are completely consumed by music". Gary left behind a legacy to his children – his love and music and natural talent. Sharing the Journey

THE NWWSMS HALL OF FAME AWARD OR ALL YOU NEED TO KNOW TO SELECT AND SUBMIT A NOMINEE

2015 NWWSMS HALL OF FAME AWARD CATEGORIES

Hall of Fame Inductee Designations:

PIONEERS OF WESTERN SWING: Those musicians who have played and/or promoted western swing music for at least 20 years of their performance careers <u>prior to the death of</u> Bob Wills in 1975.

HONOREES OF WESTERN SWING: This category includes musicians and promoters.

MUSICIANS: Those who have played western swing music for at least 20 years of their performance careers.

PROMOTERS: Those who have helped preserve western swing music for extended periods of time by promoting events through volunteer activities, organizing events, publishing, broadcasting, or developing social media. In the beginning, the **NWWSMS** was patterned after the **Western Swing Society** (currently based out of Sacramento, CA). At this time, the **Western Swing Society** (CA) has only one awards category for inductees into its Hall of Fame, Western Swing Honorees.



Similar to the NWWSMS, the **Western Swing Society** (CA) states that its major project is the annual Western Swing Hall of Fame, honoring individuals deemed important in the preservation of Western Swing music, through any of the following:

* performance careers during which the honoree performed western swing music for many years before large audiences

* media activities such as broadcasts and publications about western swing music, its roots and its performers

* extended volunteer service in the administration of non-profit societies supporting western swing music

This year, the Board decided to establish a new committee, formed with the intention of clarifying and possibly expanding the current awards categories. The Awards Committee, with Board approval, has not only brought back the category of 'Pioneer of Western Swing,' it has also expanded the category of 'Promoter' to include authors of published works about the music, its history and those that played it. 'Promoter' also includes a place of honor for the faithful fans who, over the years, have supported western swing music through their attendance and participation at the festivals and dances.

There is still more work to be done; however, check out the boxed information above for the basics you need to know to submit a candidate for consideration as an inductee into the NWWSMS Hall of Fame for 2015! If you still have questions, please don't hesitate to contact me or one of the other members of the Board and we'll do our best to address your concerns. Here are some additional changes for 2015:

The new cut-off date is MARCH 15th. Also, we are limiting the number of inductees to a maximum of 12 per year. If your candidate does qualify but we receive your cover letter and bio after the first 12 have been received, your materials will be returned with a letter asking that you resubmit your candidate the following year. To help ensure that all candidates are logged in on a timely basis, mail or e-mail your cover letter and candidate's bio to the President Jerry Seitz, to be date-stamped.

I would like to begin by once again thanking you for your generous 2014 contribution to The Big Texas Swing

School. Your thoughtful gift has enabled us to provide a student with a Western Swing education and experience like no other.

2014 has proven to be our best camp yet. I referred to it at our grand concert as "Our baby has begun to walk". This was a remarkable year for the BTSS in that for the first time, our returning students have been able to gather the tools and concept, both mentally and physically to experience and perform the heart and soul of our music, Improvisation.

Not only were we able to play (as a group) some of the greatest songs of Western Swing, our kids are now improvising. This is our greatest achievement to date. This being our fifth year, we have turned the corner on the professional aspects necessary for these students to be true contributors to our music.

Your scholarship enabled Eric Vazquez to attend our school. Eric plays Tenor Saxophone, Piano and is an outstanding vocalist. He is from Krum, Texas and attends the Dallas School for the Performing Arts, at Booker T. Washington.

Eric makes several personal appearances at Opry's and Western Swing Shows each and every month. He is a very talented young man and loves Western Swing. He immediately hit the ground running as both an instrumentalist and vocalist.

On Wednesday nights we divide into small groups and have a contest. Our students must create a three to five minute presentation. Working together, they must organize, decide what they will play, rehearse, arrange and polish their presentation all with in one hour. Eric's group won the contest. His vocal rendition of "All Of Me followed by a Boots Randolph interpretation of 'Yakety Sax', literally brought the house down.

It is an incredible experience to see these young people gather and begin to absorb this unique art form known as Western Swing. Your financial contribution enables us to continue the legacy of those before us.

I can assure you that the future of western swing is in good hands with our young people. Thank you so much for the opportunity to serve.



Highlights from the November Showcase By Lou Bischoff

To open the show, Lloyd Hooper asked for a moment of silence in honor of long-standing NWWSMS member Rus Davis, who recently passed away.

The Cascade Ramblers is led by Lloyd Hooper on bass/vocals, with Peter Brown on drums, Thom Gustafson on steel/guitar/vocals, and Steve Ketchum on lead guitar/vocals. Paul Anastasio accepted Lloyd's invitation to add his talent on fiddle. Steve Ketchum is the newest member of the Cascade Ramblers. His energetic vocals (for example in singing Billy Joe Shaver's "Way Down Texas

Way") and guitar work do compliment the group's considerable talent.

As Lloyd crooned Old Love Letters and Burning Memories, I couldn't help thinking how good it was to hear him sing here again. We love his annual showcase performances. Both he and wife Fern have had some serious health issues, so we felt honored to have them with us again. Lloyd continued with a song he loves to sing, There's Still A Lot of Love in San Antone, cowritten by our 2006 Hall of Famer, Lou Rochelle, with Darrell McCall.

Be sure to make plans to attend the December showcase when the Board Band and friends will do their best to make sure everyone leaves with a big dose of holiday cheer, western swing style!


