You might decide that 2017 is the year you're going to do it and sign up for a workshop with one of the outstanding instructors ready to take you to the next level on your journey through western swing, as a musician or vocalist. President's Report: Voting for the NWWSMS Band of the Year for 2016 begins today, at \$5.00 per ballot. The Warrior Cry Music Project Fundraiser concludes today. Once the fundraiser has ended, Jeanne Yearian will contact Robert Henne about next steps to presenting Joint Base Lewis-McCord with the donation to their project and finding a location for veterans to take advantage of the program off base.

Treasurer: Dave Wheeler presented the financial report.

Bills: Approved to pay.

Committee Reports:

Newsletter/Website/Facebook: Jeanne Yearian reported that the NWWSMS Scholarship information and application have been added to the website's EVENT page.

Membership Update: Dave Wheeler reported there are 217 current members.

Showcase: Sharon Smith reports that the January 2017 Showcase band will be known as a Grand Jam, with local band leaders hosting from 45 minutes—1 hour each. The are welcome to bring their favorite musicians and jammers to the stage. In case of inclement weather, those band leaders close to the Lynnwood Eagles should be prepared to fill in for those not able to attend. Fred Yearian will be providing the sound system.

The host band for February will be Sharon Lee and the Sundowners. The host band for March will be Butch Gibson and Pardners. For May the host band will be Kristi Nebel and Cowgirl's Dream.

Scholarship/Workshop Committee Report: Jerry Seitz gave an update on scheduling progress.

Festival Location Search for 2017: Yearian expressed thanks to Toby Hanson for providing several leads in our search for a new venue. Jeanne Yearian distributed the summary of the first site visit to the Enumclaw Expo Center along with their initial proposal. A second visit by Jeanne Yearian, Sharon Smith, Jerry Seitz and Butch Gibson will be scheduled in the near future.

Sunshine: In Lou Bischoff's absence, Jeanne Yearian provided an update on "Sharing the Journey."

New Business:

Sound system proposal: At this time the Society does not have a complete sound system. should we need one. J.C. McCormick has offered to trade the Society a complete sound system (Peavey 680 amp & speakers) in exchange for the two Peavey amps (Nashville 400 and Session 400). If the amps have not been damaged from their prolonged storage in the trailer, they could be worth \$300-\$400 each. Discussion followed.

Online payment option: Jeanne Yearian made a proposal to consider an on-line option to ioin/ renew memberships using PayPal, which also has the capability of accepting major credit cards. Nonprofits receive a discounted fee/transaction. The Society's website does have a secure socket designated for this purpose. The PayPal feature could also be added to the Society's Facebook site. Jeanne Yearian and Dave Wheeler will investigate.

Postcard mailing proposal: A proposal was made to consider mailing a quarterly postcard to current members with a list of upcoming events beginning in January. Ideally these could be personalized with a short note and the signature of the member sending it out. With enough volunteers, each person would only be sending out 15-25. Postcard sample will be brought in January.

The meeting's minutes were read and approved by the Board members present. Motion passed to adjourn at 12:15 pm.

At our western swing jams, novice musicians are mixed with experienced players on stage and perform songs together. The 'jam band leader' will ensure there is an experienced drummer, bass player, rhythm guitar and at least one lead instrument on stage during their set. The leader of the jam band will run the stage and 'direct traffic' (see page 6 of this newsletter for more on directing traffic).

Here are some jam etiquette guidelines I compiled from various sources. Some pertain to the way the NWWSMS conducts jam sessions but most would be valuable no matter whose jam you are joining.

Before You Go

- Learning a bit about Western Swing music with a few basic licks helps a great deal.
- Bring your own instrument, tuner, amp, cords, etc. You may be able to plug into someone's amp, but that might not be the case. Drums are usually provided.
- Leave the big amp home—Moderate stage volumes are expected. (More on stage volume to follow)
- Keep it simple—Don't bring a complex rig/pedal board that takes a long time to set up.

At the Jam

- **Sign the List** When you arrive, find the sign-up list and get your name on it. The Host will call players for each set. You will not be called up to play unless you sign up.
- Talk to the Host It's a great idea to have a word with whoever is hosting the jam to let him/her know your level of experience and if you would like to play with anyone in particular.
- Tune up before you get on stage -Tuning on stage will only irritate the other players who are waiting their turn.

On the Stage

- **Be efficient** Set up time should be kept to a minimum. When your set is finished, get off stage as quickly as possible. Other jammers are waiting their turn.
- Never place your drink on top of an amp, especially if it's not yours.
- Watch the jam band leader as well as the singer for direction Either the singer or the jam band leader makes sure that everyone on stage has a chance to solo. If you don't want to solo, let them know.
- If you are the Singer -Try to call out songs that fall into the core western swing repertoire songs that your fellow jammers will be comfortable with and that don't require a lot of description. Beware the 'jam-busters' that no one has a clue how to play unless the jam is being dedicated to obscure tunes.
- **Listen** Fit your instrument into the song and listen to what other players are doing. Trade fills with others. Only solo when asked.
- **Don't step on people** In other words, don't play over the vocals or over someone else's solo. If you are playing rhythm/comping, keep it tasteful. The time to solo is during your own solo break.

The Story Behind:

THE SAN ANGELO COWBOY GATHERING

One question that I have been repeatedly asked over the last 4 ½ years is how the San Angelo Cowboy Gathering (SACG) came

into creation. As many times as I've answered that question, I never get tired of telling my story. It unknowingly started with a Community Relations position I held for another San Angelo nonprofit organization in 2005. I was responsible to raise friends and funds for the organization.

The nonprofit had decided to have a signature fundraising event that they could produce annually, the event would be called "The Belt Buckle Ball." The event would be a silent/ live auctions, a steak dinner and a dance. I would be the one to produce it and, hopefully, make it successful. Now I had no problem getting auction items or a caterer, but hiring someone for a dance, now that was not anything I had done before!!! So I ask a friend of mine that had done a few things

like that, and she suggested Red Steagall and they had his contact information to boot. I made the call and for the next 4 years Red was our featured artist along with his very talented band. Not only were we working together annually, we became fast friends. So it was that he invited and hosted me and my family to his "Red Steagal1 Cowbov Gathering" in Ft. Worth, Texas, and still does to this day each year.

As I began to attend Red's event in the Stockyards, I would be amazed at the attendance, the set up, the artists and

most of all the music. I would come back home each October and think to myself, "Why couldn't or why didn't San Angelo have something like this?". Not only that, I also thought if ever I had an opportunity to put something like that on, it would have to be at Ft. Concho in San Angelo, what a perfect setting for a cowboy gathering. A couple of years went by and I left the non profit where I was employed, and they did not hire Red back and they later quit having the Belt Buckle Ball to my dismay, but the thoughts of a cowboy gathering had not left my mind.

Only six months later, I finally got my chance at my dream. I was hired to put on another fundraiser for another nonprofit in San Angelo, so I decided to pitch my idea of a Cowboy Gathering/Western Swing festival to them.

- **Keep it tasteful** When soloing, show off your chops, but play within your means. If you are a novice/intermediate player stay within your comfort zone. Look to the singer or jam band leader for cues to continue or pass the solo on.
- Don't Play Loudly Most of us have some degree of hearing loss, so, for example, if the drummer/bass player sets the volume too high, everyone turns up their amps so they can hear themselves and the vicious cycle of rising stage volume begins. It doesn't take much to drown out the vocalist. Also, the lead players should turn down their instrument volume after their lead ride or solo.

After Your Set

- Thank the Band Remember to thank the musicians who just shared the stage with you.
- **Thank the Venue** Remember to thank the venue for holding the jam and supporting live music *(buying something to eat or drink is also much appreciated).*
- **Mutual Respect** Most of the etiquette at jam sessions comes down to having a certain amount of respect for the abilities, but more importantly, for the feelings of the other people involved in the session.

Ready to give it a try? After playing 10-20 jam sessions you will have learned more about music, about communication, stagecraft and about yourself than you could have learned by playing solo or practicing for a whole year at home! So come on out and let's kick off the New Year with music! JY

Directing Traffic *Tips for Jammers*

It's easy to get lost on stage but, if you do, it's comforting to know that there's usually someone there directing traffic. This is especially helpful in situations where verbal instructions are not practical - for example, when stage volume may have crept above the level where you can hear

unamplified voices.

At one of our jam sessions, I watched as Paul Anastasio did his best to keep the jam band moving through the correct chord changes.

During a song, if Paul holds up his first finger, he's telling the musicians to go to the 1 (or root) chord. If he holds up all fingers, he's

directing them to the 5 chord. So, we must all develop the ability to follow

this direction regardless of the key we are playing in.

The number system can go into more depth than this. For instance, if there's confusion about what key we're going to play in, Paul could hold up 1 finger. In this instance, Paul is telling us that the song is in the key of G (the key of G has 1 sharp - the key of D has 2 sharps etc.. See


chart to the right).

A bass player who knows the chord progression can also lead a band through the correct changes by choosing bass notes that lead the band to the next chord. In truth all instruments have the ability to lead when there is confusion. It's important that we listen closely and watch for anyone who can throw out directions using hand signs.

We're hopefully not up there to show off our licks. We're there to play TOGETHER a HAVE FUN.

Didn't catch the key of the next song?

Someone could give you the information using their hands. Here is what they would be saying. They would be noting the number of sharps or flats in the song. (The position of the hand would be either straight up for sharps or the key of C- no sharps or flats - OR pointing down towards the ground to indicate the number of flats.)



Remember the primary goal of the jam: Coming together to have fun playing, singing, listening and dancing to Western Swing music!



They were very interested and within a few weeks they were on board with the idea. I sent an email to Red's office and told him and Debbie Bowman, Red's assistant, what I was thinking about doing and I booked Red for the event. The next call I made was to Jody Nix. I had never met or talked to Jody before but we became friends from that first phone call. He was booked next and on it went, one by one. I rented some of the buildings at Ft. Concho and so it began.

I had 3 stages that very first SACG and I found out real fast that this was not a good idea for this facility, nor for me to run. However, we had about 400 people at that first one day event and the organization I was working for made some much needed money. Most importantly though, I had Red Steagall and the band headlining for me that night. Red even asked Jody Nix to join him on stage for a tune or two. After the event that evening, I went to tell Red goodbye and thank him for a fine performance, but I also finally had my time to ask him what he really thought about the entire event and if he thought I could do this from year to year. Red hugged me close and said "Terri you can DO this. In fact, you can do anything you set your mind to. I believe without a doubt you can do this." After being up with no sleep for 24 hours straight, those words were music to my ears. From that day forward I never looked back. I figured if Red Steagall thought I could pull this festival off, then it must be so, because Red would always shoot straight with me.

The next year brought more changes and every year since, such as becoming a 501c3 non profit, and giving a portion of our event proceeds to another deserving non profit each year. These have all been good changes as shown by our attendance the last 3 years, which has been a sell out long before the doors open. I've always known I have Red in my corner for advice and support. Because of that first phone call to Jody Nix, he has become my most trusted friend for advice and my right hand when I need it. So how can a gal go wrong with those two legends behind her?

2016 brought the SACG three amazing awards, the Festival of the Year by the Ameripolitan Music Awards, the Venue of the

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
