"It was in the Springtime that you said good-bye" -(from <u>Faded Love</u> LC Agnew's favorite song.)

Pioneer of Western Swing, L.C. Agnew, 87, passed away on April 6, 2017, at his home in Abilene, TX. LC was inducted into the NWWSMS Hall of follows

Fame in 2006. A part of his story follows.

L.C. Agnew was born in 1929 on a farm near Cisco, TX. His mother bought him a guitar when he was about 11 years old and that started his musical career. He quickly learned the chords and six months later, accompanying his dad on the fiddle, began playing for country dances usually in a vacant farm house.

L.C. came from a long line of musicians. His father, grandfather, and great-grandfather all played the fiddle. On his mother's side, her brothers, Dalton and Macon Adams, both played music professionally and formed a band in the late 20s named, "The Dixie Playboys." It seemed natural that L.C. had an eagerness to become a musician. He took up the fiddle, then learned to play keyboard and trumpet.

Cherishing the Memories

L.C. Agnew

While a teenager, L.C. teamed up with his uncle, Benny Johnson, who was the same age and played the guitar. They started playing in church and at social gatherings. Their favorite songs were those of Bob Wills and his Texas Playboys.

Years later, L.C. migrated to Shreveport, where he played with some of the Louisiana Hayride stars. Later, he moved to Abilene, where he formed **The Dixie Playboys**, adopting the name from his family's former band. They played on radio and television in Abilene and for steady engagements all over West Texas.

L.C. married Dorothy Lott-Carpenter on November 24th, 1965, and in 1967 he opened the Carpenters Hall, now known as Midnight Rodeo.

Several years later, in 1974, L.C. opened the Ponderosa Ballroom, known all over the country for its Western Swing music. For 10 years, Agnew's band, L.C. Agnew and the Dixie Playboys, was the house band. By the 1980s, the Ponderosa had the gained notice as being one of the best honky-tonks in Texas. At the Ponderosa, well-known country music stars and those perhaps with their first hit regularly performed.

Over the years, L.C. played with many artists such as Johnny Horton, George Jones, Governor Jimmie Davis and Slim Whitman. Due to complications, L.C. sold the Ponderosa in 1994 and retired, but continued to play keyboard at select events around town, including opening a dance hall on F.M. 600 which he named Danceland. He continued to play every chance he had, as long as he was able.

Renowned jazz and western swing keyboard artist, Charlie Mudford, 83, left this earth on April 13, 2017, to make music with Jesus in heaven. Charlie was born August 30, 1933, into a musical His father family. Eddie, played fiddle and his mother.

Goldie, played guitar, piano, and sang. In his teens, Charlie played with local bands, learning to play different styles of music. He played the French Horn in high school but playing piano was always his first and foremost love.

Charlie began his professional music career at the age of eighteen, playing with bands at the local nightclubs. By the age of 20, he was touring with the Tex Dean Show based in Florida. He appeared with Tex on the Louisiana Hayride with Faron Young, Slim Whitman, the Wilburn Brothers and Johnny Horton. When drafted into the Army and sent to Germany, Charlie didn't miss a beat with his music. He hosted a weekly radio show and played at the USO, Enlisted Mens' Clubs and Officers' Clubs.

Out of the Army and back in the USA once again, he moved to Houston, Texas where he worked with Jim Reeves, Floyd Tillman, Little Red Hays and many others. Moving to Roswell, New Mexico, he played with Ray Reed, Tommy Duncan and Tag Lambert. One more move found him in Fort Worth, Texas, where he backed many great musicians including Tommy Allsup, Merle David, and Cesar Massey to name a few. During the years that followed, Charlie backed more great musicians.

In 2001 while traveling in California, Charlie was invited to sit in and play with new friends and musicians. It wasn't long before he was inducted into the California Western Swing Society. In 2002, the Seattle, Washington Western Swing inducted Charlie into their society. Oklahoma and Texas formed the Western Swing Society of the Southwest and inducted him in their society in 2004. Charlie's whole life has revolved around music and he has promoted music in many ways. During all these years, Charlie enjoyed flying his own airplane and dancing.

"Without Texas' historic dance halls, there wouldn't be Texas music," - so says <u>Asleep at the Wheel</u> frontman Ray Benson.

Benson and his eight-piece Texas swing band have performed in dance halls all across the state of Texas. And this past March, they showed their support for these historic venues, raising funds and awareness for nonprofit Texas Dance Hall Preservation through their five-day Texas Dance Hall Tour. The tour, which ran from March 20-26, 2017, included stops at five different dance halls, with performances by Asleep at the Wheel, Lee Ann Womack, Dale Watson, Hot Club of Cowtown, the Quebe Sisters, Dale & Ray, High Plains Jamboree, and Heybale!.

We spoke with Benson and Sam Seifert, the event director for the Texas Dance Hall Tour, about their week on the road.

What inspired Asleep at the Wheel to organize the Texas Dance Hall Tour?

RB: Well, we wanted to create what we felt was a truly special and unique Texas experience, inviting folks from all over the country to participate in a full week of Texas music, food, activities, and, of course, the dances in our amazing historic dance halls. Also, we wanted to raise funds and awareness for the Texas Dance Hall Preservation, so that we can make sure our dance halls are taken care of and are here for many years to come.

Have you worked with Texas Dance Hall Preservation before, or was this your first big collaboration?

SS: We have worked together before in the past for some of their fundraiser dances, but this was definitely a bigger event and collaboration than in the past. We felt the tour was a success and got a lot of great feedback and are looking to do it again this October.

How many cities and dance halls were a part of the tour? RB: Every day

on the tour we went to a new town and dance hall. We played at five different dance halls on the tour

Blanco at Twin Sisters, then went to Fischer and played Fischer Hall. We of course went to the famous town of Luckenbach and played their wonderful hall. Then we moved the tour east and played in Schulenburg at Sengelmann Hall, and finally ended our tour in La Grange at Fair Pavilion Hall.

I saw your schedule—the tour looked packed with activities. What did the week look like? What were the different events and activities you hosted?

SS: We felt that only offering dances in the evening wouldn't be enough, so every day during the afternoon we offered activities like dance lessons, distillery tastings and tours, and tours of other dance halls in the surrounding areas. We visited Junk Gypsy and their amazing antiques store, and of course we had to make sure everyone was well fed with Texas BBQ and other Texas food staples.





Highlights from the April 9th Showcase

What is it that make Texas dance halls such special venues to perform in? Why do you like playing at these halls so much?

RB: In our opinion, this is the birthplace of Texas music. From Bob Wills to Willie Nelson to George Strait, this is where we cut our teeth, playing for four hours entertaining and keepin' people on the dance floor and having a good time. Also, the architecture and rustic beauty is also what makes them so special. Not one dance hall is the same, and they each offer something wonderful and unique to themselves.

Was this the first time many people on this tour had encountered dance halls before? Were you able to expose a lot of new people to these historic venues, or maybe introduce longtime fans of dance halls to new halls or new elements of their history?

SS: I know we had a lot of people who had been to a dance hall or two before, but I also know we took them to dance halls they had never been to, or even heard of before. We wanted to showcase all the halls, from the ones everyone knows to the smaller, lesser-known halls.

The daytime tours that Texas Dance Hall Preservation did really gave our guests a deep insight into the culture and history of each hall, and I know everyone really enjoyed getting to hear about the history.

Overall, how did the tour go? Were you pleased with the turnout?

SS: We were thrilled to have so many people from so many different states—that really surprised us. [There were people] from California, Wisconsin, Washington, Florida, etc. It was just really great to see the interest from [all over] in our Texas culture and music.

Probably the biggest surprise was being filmed at Twin Sisters [in Blanco] for NBC's coverage of the golf tournament in Austin, The Dell Match Play. They wanted to show a teaser of what it would be like to be at a dance in Texas, so they came down and filmed us and showed off the hall and the dancers.

(Editor's Note: Texas has two great festivals in the month of June-West Texas Western Swing Festival Snyder and The Legends of Western Swing Music Festival in Wichita Falls . . . just a week apart adds up to a lot of dancin' and great music. Both were born from the same couple, driven by the same passion: preserving America's western swing music while promoting those who carry on this tradition. For her contributions, Gloria Miers was inducted into the NWWSMS Hall of Fame in 2007. Below is the Readers Digest version of the history behind The Legends of Western Swing Music Festival., celebrating 30 years.!)

Music producers, Gloria and Dewey Miers, have been instrumental in keeping the boots tappin' and feet dancin' to the tunes of Western Swing music for the past 25 years. The Legends of Western Swing Music Festival began in 1987 in Canton, Texas, with Gloria and Dewey on board in 1990. After a quick stop in Snyder, the festival moved and settled in Wichita Falls, Texas, in 1997. Since lawn chairs first circled the "stage wagon" 25 years ago, The Legends of





Western Swing Music Festival has hosted the finest western swing bands in the country. Legendary musicians that played with Bob Wills himself, as well as new bands with a love for it and desire to keep the music alive, have graced the stage and kept the fans happy and dancin'. With a desire to save a music form that seemed to be in trouble, Gloria and Dewey worked with passion to keep it alive – thanks to the best fans in the world and shows such as The Legends of Western Swing Music Festival, the great State of Texas now boasts Western Swing as the official state's music.

After Dewey passed away in 2000, Gloria became the sole producer of the show and Gloria Miers Productions was formed. Affectionately known as the "Grande Dame" of Western Swing, Gloria has grown the Festival to crowds in excess of 4,000 fans. She prides herself in bringing to her stage only the best musicians Western Swing has to offer and hosts fans from around the country, as well as England, Japan, Canada and Australia.

Gloria lives a blessed life in Plano, Texas, when her horse isn't hitched to the wagon and on its way to promote her show...the trails all lead to Wichita Falls, the third weekend of every June. *(For more info, click here.)*
