everyone to have a super week-end.





MINUTES FROM THE BOARD AUGUST 6, 2013



President, Lloyd Hooper, called the meeting to order at 7:15 pm.

Guests: Fred Yearian, Ed Bischoff, Jimmy and Lue Neel.

Treasurer: Ramon Selby provided the financial report, which was approved as presented.

Bills: Approved to pay as presented. Checks issued for bills previously approved at the July Board Meeting

Showcases: Host bands for Showcases at the Lynnwood Eagles: September, Kristi Nebel and the Cowgirls' Dream; October, Lloyd Hooper and the Cascade Ramblers; November, Southern Comfort; December is yet to be determined.

Old Business: Costs for advertising in the monthly NWWSMS Newsletter were determined by the Board to be as follows: 1/4 page: members \$20 and non-members \$25; 1/2 page: members \$30 and non-members \$40; full page: members \$60 and non-members \$75.

Hall of Fame: It is important that Officers and Board members make attendees welcome all during the Hall of Fame venue. Greet those attending throughout the day; be sure to ask if anyone needs assistance in any way. People need to feel very welcomed by the NWWSMS members.

Children will be directed to the appropriate seating areas; a flier will be handed to the adults with the children showing the location of that area. It is very important that the rules regarding this be adhered to; this information is per the Washington State Liquor Board and could affect the Auburn Eagles' liquor license if not followed.

The NWWSMS Admissions Desk will open at 10:00 am each day. There needs to be a paper trail for the money coming in, regardless of what the source is; i.e., daily admission, hats, T shirts, etc. A written receipt will be completed. Treasurer Ramon Selby will provide a written document to be followed by those maintaining the Admissions Desk and the Concessions Desk. Wrist bands will be issued as each admission is paid; these wrist bands are numbered and that number will be written on the receipt. These bands will be required for all those in the hall after 10 am on all days.

Breakfast will be available for purchase at the Auburn Eagles on Saturday and Sunday, between 8:00 and 10:00 am.

Jim Sanderson has volunteered to transport outof-town guests to and from SeaTac Airport.

Jeanne and Fred Yearian have donated four

bales of straw that will sport signs to be located at various streets around the area leading to the Auburn Eagles. This will provide more direction to those looking for the Hall of Fame venue.

Sharyn Lee and Sharon Smith will decorate the ballroom. Dave DuChane will run the jam room. New T shirts will be provided to the NWWSMS.

Security team, with the wording "SECURITY" being very visible.

No alcohol will be allowed on the bandstand; band leaders will be so informed.

Leroy King has assembled a binder with copies of photos of past Honorees retrieved from his computer/printer system. The original binder has been misplaced, and we are grateful to Leroy King for his efforts. This binder will be available for viewing-only at the Hall of Fame.

The NWWSMS Board members will assemble in front of the stage at the Auburn Eagles at 10:30 for a presentation.

The Board offered Jeanne Yearian a heart-felt, enthusiastic round of applause for her devotion to this Hall of Fame. She has put forth a major effort and we are surely appreciative.

For The Good Of The Order: Matthew McCravey (our 2012 Scholarship recipient) is improving healthwise and hopes to attend the Hall of Fame. Updates for those on the "Sharing The Journey" list were provided by Lou Bischoff.

Motion passed to adjourn at 9:40 pm.

Me Again The life and times of B. F. "Froggy" Worden Memories of Cindy Walker

Here is part of Cindy's obituary from The New York Times:

Cindy Walker, a country songwriter whose pure, plainspoken lyrics of romance, heartbreak and picturesque prairies were recorded by major artists like Bing Crosby, Elvis Presley and Willie Nelson, making Top-40 country or pop charts more than 400 times, died on March 23, 2006, in Mexia, Texas.



She was 87 but did not broadcast her birthday any more than the brief marriage she sometimes confirmed and sometimes did not. Her niece, Carol Adams, reported her death, The Associated Press said.

In October 1997, during the annual Red Steagall event, I decided to visit friends Jim and AJ at Ernest Tubb Record Shop in the Fort Worth Stockyard district. Fate took a hand at this point. They asked me to take photos at Cindy Walker's CD signing. I knew a lot about Cindy, had checked the raft of songs she had published, never dreaming I would get to meet this icon of music. The day arrived - a Saturday - and I was ready with three cameras. When I arrived I found Cindy seated at a table at the rear of the shop. She was already busy signing autographs

and her CD (which was selling like hot cakes.) Dean McKinney Moore was to her left and Smokey Montgomery from the Lightcrust Doughboys to her right. A pickup band was jamming in the background and the Cowtown Buckaroos headed by Devon Dawson were near the table. I moved around and finally got a few pictures of the band, Cindy, and her guests at the table. I must stop here and say what a great group of people I was allowed to photograph.

Cindy called for a break and explained to the crowd that I was there at her request to take photos. The crowd moved back and I took several photos of the band, the Buckaroos, Cindy and her guests at the table.

We finally found a quiet spot in front of the store where I photographed AJ, Cindy and Jim (see below). I had the

film processed at a One Hour store. Jim and AJ asked for several enlargements and I duplicated the order for Cindy. I mailed them to her and a few days later

received a phone call from the lady herself. She said the photos were wonderful but I had not included a bill. I told her, I didn't charge people like her for photos, only rich people. She fumed a little bit and said, "I am rich! Send me a bill." Time passed and I received a note along with a generous check. I have a copy of that check. Without knowing it, Cindy set the price for my 8x10 color enlargements. If anyone questions the charge, I tell them, "Cindy Walker set the price."

Another Cindy story: My old picking buddy, Clyde Smith from Gatesville, Texas, called and asked if I knew Cindy

Walker had died. I told him, "I don't think so, I just got off the phone with her five minutes ago. "Why" I asked? He said, "I was listening to the radio at Hamilton and the disc jockey said he was going to play a song written by the *late* Cindy Walker." I told him I would call and make sure which I did. I relayed his story to Cindy and she boiled over. She said, "What is the call sign for that station?" I said, "Better than that Cindy I can give you the disc jockey's name and the phone number of the station."

Later, Clyde called again. He said, "You should have heard what Cindy did. She made the disc jockey take back what he had said and then made him put her on the air so she could tell everyone she was alive and well in Mexia, Texas!" I knew the disc jockey, who was also the owner of the station. I called and "sandpapered" him pretty good about his faux pas. (How you *like that French word?*) He vowed he would pay more attention. What he had meant to say was a song by the "great Cindy Walker" but it came out wrong.

Any time I called Cindy we would chat for a few minutes, then she would excuse herself and say, "Let me call you back." The phone wouldn't grow cold until it would ring with Cindy asking, "Where were we?" She didn't want me to spend my nickel for a phone call. I just wish I had recorded those calls. They meant so much to me and I miss her a lot. (Continued on Page 5)

"Called the greatest female Country composer in history, Cindy wrote her first song when she was twelve. She is the only songwriter to have made the Top Ten Hits in five successive decades. Cindy wrote more than 500 classic songs and was

inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame. A recording artist in her own right, Cindy wrote songs for Bob Wills, appeared in Gene Autry movies and hosted her own radio show in California."

In 1998, I received a letter from the Cowgirl Hall of Fame. Inside were two tickets to the induction ceremony to be held at a swanky hotel downtown. I had checked the price of these tickets and didn't feel I could afford them (*\$180.00*). I called the museum to tell them they had made a mistake - that I had not ordered them. The little lady said, "Oh no Mr.Worden! Those are from Cindy Walker. You are her guests." I sure couldn't refuse such a wonderful offer from Cindy, but felt a little embarrassed - she had already been so generous. But Nonie (*my wife*) and I saddled up and drove to the hotel. The Valet Parking attendant asked if we were there for the Cowgirl Hall of Fame and when I told him, "Yes," he gave us a complimentary claim check. Gets better with age.

Inside the huge hall we were greeted by a member of the staff who looked at our tickets and pointed to a seating chart. I thought we might be in the "nosebleed section" but not so. We were at table Number 20, with Cindy and six or seven other guests. I had to move my chair to allow Dale Evans to sit down at the table next to ours. She remembered me and Memphis Mackey from the Walk of Fame in the Stockyards when Memphis sang "Happy Trails" to her. I had to loosen my hat band after that.

It finally came

Cindy's time to star. It began with Leon Rausch and O'Brien Rich doing the song she had written for the "Fort event, Worth." After she h e r made acceptance speech, it was time for photos and this is when she told the lady from the Star-Telegram that she had brought her own photographer, ME! It was a great day, lots of good photos.

Another favorite, *Bonaparte's Retreat*, was done so well by Mike with Paul on fiddle. **Jangles** is a well-polished band that make me so proud!

Country Fever was up next, with 2013 Inductee Chet Hasting leading the band in *Wildwood Flower*. Jeanne Yearian was on fiddle. Ken Fullerton and Bob Gaede were on rhythm guitars with Dave Vines on bass and Pete Bonari on drums. Ken Fullerton was up next, singing *Old Fashioned Love*, done so well. Bob Gaede wowed us with *New Green Light*! Dave Vines sang a favorite, *For the Good Times*. Chet filled the floor with *The Waltz You Saved for Me* – the dancers love those waltzes. Ken



also sang *The Kind of Love I Can't Forget* – beautiful! Chet gave us a real treat with *Under the Double Eagle* on his lead guitar. That was something to be proud of! Slowing the tempo down a bit, Dave sang *Drinking Champagne*, closing the set.
