22nd Annual Western Swing Festival and Hall of Fame A Week-End Filled with Unexpected Delights By Lou Bischoff












Here are just a few of the fine musicians that traveled so far and gave so much of their time and talent to make the festival a success.

Bill Gilbert 1935-2012

Joe Bill Gilbert, 77, passed away Tuesday, Aug. 21, 2012, surrounded by family at his home in Millsap, Texas.

He lived for his family and his music and played the fiddle for 71 years. He also played a number of other instruments

but was quoted as saying, "I am a fiddler," despite other accomplishments and capabilities. It was a fundamental part of his life but he said he played for the fun and enjoyment of it. Bill never tried to make a living playing music. He was a rancher and taught science in a local high school. He chose not to play clubs while teaching so he played banquets, benefits, fiddling contests, conventions, rodeo dances and the like.

In 1973, he co-founded the Texas Old Time Fiddlers Association, served as their first president, and helped pass down old time fiddle breakdown music to the next generation. In 1998, he co-founded the Western Swing Society of the Southwest along with being inducted into a number of music halls of fame, accomplishing and winning numerous awards, including the 1976 "Red Steeley Favorite Fiddler Award," and the "Eck Robertson Memorial Award." In 1990, Bill participated as a Master Fiddler for the Texas Folklife Resources Master/ Apprentice Program and performed at the Texas Folklife Festival in San Antonio. He was honored to be included in their 1994 Master Folk Artist calendar and the 'Pass It On' exhibit which toured museums throughout Texas. Bill was inducted into the Western Swing Society of Sacramento, CA in 1997 and the NWWSMS Pioneers of Western Swing in August of 1999.

Survivors include his beautiful wife of 56 years, Norma Gilbert of Millsap; sons, 12 grandchildren and seven greatgrandchildren.

He will be loved and missed forever.



Robert Henry "Balin' Wire Bob" Strack 1922-2012

Robert Henry
"Balin' Wire

disease and pneumonia. He is once again with LaMerne, love of his life and wife of 57 years.

Born in Osceola, SD, on

October 7, 1922, youngest of two boys, he lived his "formative years" in Milwaukee, WI and Sidney, MT. After serving in the Pacific Islands during WWII and being awarded two <u>Purple Hearts</u>, he returned to the sweetheart he had met in the church youth group. After marrying in Missoula, MT, they raised two children, moving from here to there, always seeking a better job, "for the kids".

During this time "Balin' Wire Bob" was a country/-western music performer and radio disk jockey who had a coast-to -coast radio program and rightly earned the "Mr. D.J. USA" award in 1956. In 2011 he was inducted into the NWWSMS Hall of Fame in recognition of the work he did both performing and spinning records, advancing his favorite Western Swing music.

Bob had a long list of endeavors to fill his life: beet farmer, cattle rancher, musician, song writer, radio disk jockey, actor, university graduate, teacher, fisherman, husband, father, grandfather. He and "Mernie" retired to Vancouver, WA, where he focused on giving care and support to his one true love through her long battle with health issues.

In lieu of flowers memorial contributions may be made to Alzheimer's research.



Ray Shawley 1937-2012

Ray Shawley born was Seattle, Washington, July 13, 1937, graduated high school in 1955 and lived most of his life in the Northwest. He died peacefully on August 5, 2012, Ronceverte,

West Virginia.

Ray was very involved in the

music scene over the years being apart of the Northwest Western Swing Music Society since its start. He held many offices in the society over the years as well as publishing their monthly newsletter (which was his pride and joy). He is a member of the Hall of Fames in the NWWSMS, the Western Swing Music Society of the Southwest, and the Western Swing Music Society of Sacramento. He played with many bands in many clubs throughout the Pacific Northwest.

Soon after graduating from high school, he became a journeyman printer and worked several local newspapers. He changed careers in 1964 and became a lumber manager for Ernst Hardware.

In 1985, his wife's career took them to Round Rock, Texas, where he again changed careers and began working for the IRS. Returning to the Northwest in 1990, Ray continued to work for the IRS until his retirement in 2003. Ray loved all sports and was a great fan of the Seattle Mariners, the Seattle Seahawks as well as the old Sonics teams.

Ray and his wife of 50 years, Beryl, moved to White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, in 2012 to be close to their daughter Carol while Ray fought a valiant fight with Pancreatic Cancer.

Lloyd stirred the love birds to dancing to *Burning Memories*. Cindy de Leon favored us with *Heart to Heart Talk* and *How Foolish Can I Be*. Then Lloyd and Cindy harmonized on *I'll Be Here*, the song Lloyd recently wrote – a touching song with much meaning. 



Album: Words You Can Understand

Artist: Country Night Live **Label**: CNL Records

The Country Night Live group is back with another CD and this one is a dandy and a must for all Texas dance hall music fans.

The group guitar player is Chuck Cusimano, who is heard on vocal on five of the album's 12 tunes and some harmony vocal. Chuck is also a world renowned songwriter. The band steel guitarist, also heard on five vocals, is former Ray Price steel wizard, Buddie Hrabal. Billy Martin is the bassist and also does three lead vocals and some harmony vocal. The other group member is the drummer, Danny Adams.

Joining the group for this CD is the talented Texas pianist and rhythm guitarist, Chip Bricker and first call fiddle player from Charlie Pride's Pridesmen, Reggie Rueffer.

The album opens with Chuck's first in the album, one that he wrote for the late Joe Paul Nichols, the former hit, *Eleven Eighteen Nadine Lane*. Buddie follows that on lead vocal with Chuck's composition, *Shuffle Back to Me*. Billy's first entry, *Amazing Love* is in the Texas dance hall mood as is Chuck's composition and vocal *Beginning of the End*.

Also in the Texas dance hall mood,

Buddie wrote and sings two of his own There Can't Be an Us Without You and The More it Burns. In the same mood, Buddie sings You Can Always Bring Her Back to Me.

Billy sings Eddie Raven's *Too Much Candy for a Dime*, also in the Texas dance hall mood.

Chuck's other two vocals and compositions are both excellent, *Houston's Just Another Name for Blue* and *Been a Long Time Coming*. Billy borrows the Grady Martin and Alex Zanetis composition *Snap Your Fingers* and really gives it a blues feel.

Buddie and Chuck close the album with a fantastic version of Bob Wills and Lee Ross' My Shoes Keep Walking Back to You.

Shorty Joe Ouartuccio and Hayes' band filled the next




