Notice to Members: Vote on By-Law Revision to be Held at the September 11, 2016 Showcase

A short meeting of the NWWSMS voting members will be held at the Lynnwood Eagles during the September Showcase. A vote will be taken to approve a revision of the By-Laws to further clarify who is a voting member of the NWWSMS. The change will consist of adding the word "voting" in two places, shown below by the bolded, underscored text:

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP AND DUES

Section 1. Active, voting membership shall be granted to any person having submitted an application and annual dues. . . .

ARTICLE IV TRUSTEES AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. These shall be the PRESIDENT, VICE PRESIDENT, SECRETARY, TREASURER and FIVE TRUSTEES.

Section 2. These Officers and Trustees shall be elected by the **VOTING** MEMBERSHIP at the *ELECTION MEETING* to be held in November of each year with installation to be in January. . . .

President Jeanne Yearian President's Report: reported regarding the possible sale of the Auburn Eagles' building and property. Club Manager Marv Little said the Club could have to move next year or sometime within the next three years - or there is always the chance the sale will not go through. Jeanne will find out more at the Eagles' members meeting on August 10. Since Fred and Jeanne Yearian are members of the Aerie, one of them will attend. Jeanne asked the Board to be thinking about a percentage split of the earnings from the raffle and silent auction between the General Account and Educational/Scholarship funds. Additional expenses in the future could be significant if we have to find a new location for the Hall of Fame festival.

Treasurer: Treasurer Sharon Capps presented the financial report.

Bills: Approved to pay.

Committee Reports:

Scholarship/Workshop Committee Report: Jerry Seitz reported on the activity of this Committee.

Newsletter/Website/Facebook Report: Jeanne Yearian reported that the Festival/Hall of Fame information has been posted on all.

Hall of Fame Committee: Jeanne Yearian reports that Jeanne and Fred Yearian will begin setting up for the festival on Monday. The campground should be full this year! We have many musicians coming from the Southwest. Jeanne requested help greeting people as she will be helping with sound and video. Due to the ad in Jazz Alley, we are not sure who will be walking through the door during the festival. Press Passes will be available (just in case). There were additional expenses this year as we had to have band signs printed and mounted on foam core. For the dance contest winners, we have certificates for best in category (2-step, waltz and polka) and medals for the top three finalists. Everyone has been so helpful in bringing this event together. We have a great group of volunteers again this year, and even the musicians are doing everything possible to make this a great festival.

Membership Update: Dave Wheeler reported there are currently 214 paid-up members with 4 new members to date in 2016.

Unfinished Business:

Gambling Commission Update: Jeanne Yearian reported that the NWWSMS Raffle License has been received. The Gambling Commission contacted her regarding the application submitted for the raffle license. They would not grant the license unless the wording in the By-Laws was clarified regarding the requirements to be a voting member. A slight modification to the by-laws was made and it was approved by the Commission. Jeanne said that to change the wording would take a vote by the membership. The spokesperson for the Gambling Commission said they would grant the license as long as the amended by-laws were sent to the Commission as soon as passed. A vote will be held after the August Hall of Fame. They agreed to those terms. The changes do clarify who is a voting member do not change the intent or interpretation of the by-laws. The Washington State Gambling Commission is waiting for the amended by-laws to finalize the license. The vote will be held at the September showcase.

501(c)(3) Application: Dave Wheeler reported that the application has been submitted.

The meeting's minutes were read and approved by the Board members present. Motion passed to adjourn at 2:25 pm.

Pat Jacobs

Pat Jacobs was born in 1937 in Ashland, Kanas and died on August 28, 2016.

He spent his first 18 years roping calves, playing guitars and learning to be a cowboy. School wasn't important. He spent two years at Panhandle State University at Goodwell, OK, then left to go on the road. He traveled

with many groups including Johnny Lee Wills and other swing bands of the $\ensuremath{\mathsf{era}}$.

Pat spent 35 years ranching in Kansas, Colorado, Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle. He married Ganell "Nellie" Jacobs in 1959 and raised three children.

Pat was not a talker but, rather, a doer. He was an accomplished trainer, musician and story teller as proven by his three books. He produced the "Oklahoma Swing Project," a CD which featured some of the greatest names in western swing including Gene Crownover, Bennie Garcia, Glen Reese, Jimmy Benjamin, Curly Lewis, Hurshul Clothier and Ashley Alexander.

Pat led the "Over the Hill Gang" a western swing band. He was inducted into the NWWSMS Hall of Fame in 2009.

(Editor's Note: The following is from Joyce Miller, Secretary of the CSWM, posted August 29, 2016)

It's with sadness and a heavy heart I must say we lost Pat Jacobs early this morning. He slipped away and is now in a peaceful place able to play his bass, tell his stories and ride the horses he loved as freely as if he were a young man in his prime again. He was and will always be our "Hero." Gary and I loved him very much and our hearts and prayers are with Nellie and their loving family in this time of sorrow. Pat, we're going to miss you so much, but be assured your legacy will live on. To read more about Pat, you can go to his Facebook page, 'Pat Jacobs'.

Thankfully, he was an author and wrote three books with tales of his life and times as a musician and a horseman. He was 79 years old as of July 22, 2016. He and Nellie were married 57 years and shared some remarkable experiences. Our thoughts are with Nellie and their family as they get through the next several days and take Pat on his final ride to Ashland, Kansas, to rest there forever. Pray for Nellie as she recovers from this devastating loss of her beloved husband and soulmate and recoups from breaking her hip. She is in rehab at Crowley Nursing Home and Rehab in Crowley Texas on Hwy 1187 where she was able to have Pat with her during his last days. They walked through this life hand in hand and he passed surrounded by his loving wife, Nellie, by his side with his loving family.

(Our thanks to Larry's son, Kelly, for the following) Larry Scott was born September 27th, 1938. He was called home to glory shortly after midnight July 10, 2016 in Kaufman County, TX . His

life has a story book quality. It started as a young boy growing up in Southwestern, MO. He was the only child of Omer and Dorothy Scott. They were a hard working farm family near Stark City, MO. As farm families did in that era, they began working at sun up in the fields, stopped for lunch, then continued work until nearly dusk. Well, for young Larry those lunch time breaks soon gave birth to the inspiration in which he would spend a lifetime pursuing. His love of radio began around that ol' dinner table when he and his Dad came in from the fields. As was custom, they listened to the Aq reports and then to live broadcasts from Pappy O'Daniel's Light Crust Dough Boys, Bob Wills and The Texas Playboys just to mention a few. Larry started his first radio job at KBTN in 1954 at the age of 16, a small but widely listened to station in Neosho, MO. It did not take long for the seed to fully take root. It was there his legendary career, spanning 60 years was born.

Larry's first love was Southern Gospel. Soon after stepping on the air waves he began promoting Gospel music shows and met perhaps the greatest Gospel Song writer ever, Albert E Brumley. The bond between Albert was instant and they became life-long friends. Soon after his graduation he went to Springfield, MO and auditioned for the Ozark Jubilee. Falling short of the job he decided he needed to have a trade to rely on in case this radio thing did not pan out. Soon after graduation, he got a call from Al Brumley, Jr. and Al told him if he ever wanted to be Anybody in the entertainment business he had to head to the West Coast. Larry packed his bags and to California he went. After all, that was where dreams can come true. He landed in Bakersfield, began working at KUZZ country radio and was an instant hit.

On July 20, 1974, he married Gail Watson and on May 16,1975, she gave birth to their only child, Kelly. In December of 1975 Larry and the family moved to Wichita, KS to KFDI with his friend Mike Oatman and Great Empire Broadcasting.

After his family, Larry had three loves: gospel, country and Western Swing. Bob Wills passed away May 13, 1975, 3 days prior to the birth of his son. The band was without their leader but still loved. Larry and Mike had common roots in western swing and they took the reins to preserve and promote that one of a kind sound. They booked them at the Cotillion Ball Room in Wichita. There the revitalization of the Texas Playboys began.

Highlights from the NWWSMS' 2016 Western Swing Music Festival & Hall of Fame Celebration

Are you wondering, "What is Jeanne doing filling in for Lou?" It's not often that Lou Bischoff has not written a review of NWWSMS events but Lou needed some welldeserved rest after the festival. She looks forward to seeing everyone soon! I apologize in advance for not being able to capture all of the memorable moments that took place. For many of us this annual event is our western swing 'family reunion.' But, we'll give it a try . . .

This year's 26th festival celebrated the legacy of steel man Chuck Hayes who, as many of you know, passed away unexpectedly in December 2015. Chuck, who served as the President of the Western Swing Society of the Southwest for many years, had committed himself to supporting western swing

societies across the nation. Year after year, for well over a decade, he and his companion, Barbara Karr, would faithfully roll into the camping area behind the Auburn Eagles around mid-August, set up camp and 'report for duty,' willing to help out wherever needed. And Chuck always brought wonderful gifts to the event: a selection of exceptional western swing musicians from the Southwest to feature in his band, Special Edition. After the NWWSMS Festival Chuck and Barb headed south to the Alexander's annual western swing picnic in Oregon, and on to the Western Swing Society's Hall of Fame Celebration in Sacramento. Then, it was back to Oklahoma for the WSMSS event in Waggoner and on they would go, visiting the many friends they made along the way.

This year, in honor of Chuck's contributions, John Jones (HOF 2013/TX) invited musicians from the Southwest and West Coast to join him in celebrating Chuck's life at the NWWSMS Festival. They performed as the Chuck Hayes Special Edition Tribute Band, both opening and closing the festival. Sitting in for Chuck on the steel guitar for the weekend was the Northwest's

Jones began by leading the Thursday night Jam Session, welcoming our out-of-town guests to the bandstand to perform. For the first set, John sat down behind the drums, giving his position on bass first to 2016 Inductee Larry Anderson (OK) who later passed it to 2006 Inductee Chuck Woods (CA). Joining them on twin fiddles were Gary (2016 HOF) and Hollie Williams (TX). This talented husband/wife team performed regularly with Chuck Hayes in the Southwest. Honoring his memory, they made the trip to the Northwest for our event. Lead guitar/vocalist Cliff Brizendine (2013 HOF/CA) took his familiar place on stage behind Jimmy Webb on the steel guitar, just as he had when playing with Chuck.

Completing the band, Bill Enveart (2006 POWS/CA) sat down at the keyboard. 2016 Inductee (TX) Paul Henry Baker took his place on rhythm guitar/vocals and Alfie Johns (CA), one of Paul Henry's former band members, joined the group on sax. 2016 Inductees Doug and Betty Carter joined 2016 Inductee Paula Jungmann and her husband, Butch, on the dance floor. 

HIGHLIGHTS FROM FRIDAY, AUGUST 12[™]

The 26th Annual Western Swing Music Festival & Hall of Fame Celebration opened with a welcome from MC Dave Wheeler. Shelley McNaughton, filling in for Butch Gibson, brought the crowd to their feet as she sang America, the Beautiful during the Posting of the Colors by Ed and Lou Bischoff. 



Band members are Grace Quebe (fiddle/vocals), Sophia Quebe (fiddle/vocals), Hulda Quebe (fiddle/ vocals), Simon Stipp (guitar) and Daniel Parr (bass). ARTIST INFO

When the Quebe Sisters from Texas take a stage, and the triple-threat fiddle champions start playing and singing in multi-part close harmony, audiences are usually transfixed, then blown away. It's partly because the trio's vocal and instrumental performances are authentic all-Americana, all the time, respectful of the artists that inspired them the most. And whether the Quebes (rhymes with "maybe") are decked out in denims and boots or fashionably dressed to the nines in makeup, skirts and heels, the fresh-faced, clean-cut sisters, all in their 20s, look as good as they sound.

Not surprisingly, the Quebe Sisters win standing ovations at just about every show. It's been that way since 2000, when they started fiddling together as pre-teens. The sisters' past is as colorful and eventful as their future is bright. Growing up in Burleson, a southern suburb of Fort Worth, Hulda, Sophia and Grace were ages 7, 10 and 12 in 1998 when they attended their first local fiddle competition in nearby Denton, and decided fiddling was what they wanted to do. The girls earned solo and group accolades early on, winning state and national championships in their respective age groups in 1999, 2000, 2001 and 2002. The Quebes' evolution from the whiz-kid Western swing fiddlers they were back then to the smokin'-hot young adult Americana band they are today is a remarkable story, by any measure. Along with headlining their own shows to ever-growing audiences, they've shared stages with American music legends like Willie Nelson, George Strait, Merle Haggard, Ricky Skaggs & Kentucky Thunder, Ray Price, Connie Smith, Marty Stuart, Larry Gatlin and the Gatlin Brothers, Ray Benson, Asleep at the Wheel, Riders in the Sky and many others.

Today, after more than a decade of travelling the U.S. and the world, and recording three acclaimed albums, Grace, Sophia and Hulda Quebe are pros in a variety of genres, and count many famous musicians among their biggest boosters. The Quebes' unbridled passion for American music, along with their talent, skills and a lot of hard work, has taken them far beyond their wildest early aspirations. "One thing is for sure, you don't see a group like the Quebe Sisters come along every day," famed Opry announcer Eddie Stubbs told listeners on his own show on Nashville's WSM. "Give them your undivided attention, and if you're not already, you too, will become a fan."
