There's a new Western Swing Band in Seattle! Come and see for yourself as they host the November 13 Showcase at the Lynnwood Eagles. Pete Martin and Elena DeLisle (two of the NWWSMS' workshop instructors), are joined by Adam Bratman on steel guitar/vocals and Taylor Kent, upright bass/vocals. By way of introduction,

the following biographical information has been taken from their

Elena DeLisle-Perry is a guitarist and music teacher who lives in Seattle with her husband and two children. Elena spent her formative years in Sonoma County, CA, studying jazz in school and playing in Bluegrass bands such as the **Skiffle Symphony** and **The Tanglefoot Quartet**. She holds a B.A in Jazz guitar.

Elena has worked extensively with fiddler Paul Anastasio on his project to save and bring back to life the incredible music from Tierra Caliente, Mexico. She plays Calentano music in the group **Paul Anastasio & Fire of Tierra Caliente**. In addition to performing several times a year, they periodically leads jams and teach workshops.

In addition to the **Go Outside and Playboys**, Elena also plays in **Toulooloo**, a traditional Cajun dance band. She teaches private lessons and preschool and elementary level music classes. Elena also owns and directs Shoreline Music Together, a family music program.

President's Report: The meeting with the Board of the WSS and new President of the WSMSS (John Jones) in Sacramento was well received. Jeanne hopes this will be the first in a continuing, productive dialogue between the Societies.

Budgets for 2017 should be in by our November Board meeting.

Vice President Dave Wheeler will conduct the annual business meeting shortly after the Host Band finishes its set today.

Treasurer: Treasurer Sharon Capps presented the financial report.

A proposal was made to make the following a NWWSMS Policy to be followed for expense reimbursement:

In order to maintain tax-exempt IRS compliance (applicable to grants that may be received as well), three conditions must be met: (1) The purpose for the expense must be related to NWWSMS business; (2) There must be substantiation of the expense, i.e., original itemized receipts must be submitted showing date, time, place, amount, people involved and purpose for the expense [if no original itemized receipt is available, a missing receipt form must be filled out completely and turned in]; and (3) Any advance of funds in excess of the substantiated amount must be returned to the NWWSMS within 30 days.

Motion made, voted on and approved to accept this policy.

Bills: Approved to pay.

Committee Reports:

Membership Update: Dave Wheeler reported he has created a link to an updated membership roster for members only via Dropbox. Contact Dave if you have difficulty accessing the information.

Showcase: Sharon Smith and Lou Bischoff are pleased to welcome a new western swing band formed through the workshop program, the **Go Outside and Playboys** band, featuring Pete Martin and Elena DeLisle, two of our workshop instructors.

Scholarship/Workshop Committee Report:

Jerry Seitz reported that he will be meeting with the 2017 Workshop Instructors to establish a schedule for the coming year. He has presented a 5-year plan for expansion of this program for the Board's consideration.

The trailer is secure and is presently at the Yearian's. A full inventory will be done within the next month. Ed and Lou Bischoff were the first to be contacted by the Club. Ed did a partial inventory on the contents. He found missing: part of a drum set, 2 mic stands and 2 monitors. Please contact one of the Board members if anyone has equipment that NWWSMS might possibly use.

The meeting's minutes were read and approved by the Board members present. Motion passed to adjourn at 12:05 pm.

Howard Edwards

Howard Charles Edwards, age 83, passed away on Sunday, October 23, 2016 in Meadow Vista, California. He was born on September 22, 1933, in Virginia City, Nevada, to William and Ella Edwards. His father worked in the silver mines. Howard was first introduced to music by his mother, who played honky-tonk piano while he accompanied her on the guitar and mandolin. They spent many hours playing together.

Howard's first jobs were playing guitar in 16-piece string bands. In 1957 he started playing western swing and country in a club in Alameda, California. After that, he joined a trio playing bass at the Garden Inn nightclub in Hayward, CA. He played at the Garden Inn for 23 years. In 1958 he was hired to play at Forester's Hall in Redwood City on Saturday nights. When the hall closed he was hired by a popular personality in the Bay Area, Cottonseed Clark, to play in his band at Naperdack Hall in San Jose. During this time, he met and played with many country and western stars who were popular at that time.

In 1960 Howard opened Guitar Village, a music store in Freemont, CA. He taught, made and sold guitars. During this time he also provided a booking service to help the local nightclubs in the area book country and western swing musicians. He produced and played for over 400 swing dance contests at the club, promoting western swing music. During this time, a live radio show originated from the club.

In addition to music, Howard enjoyed the outdoors, restoring vintage cars as well as musical instruments. He was a private pilot and member of the Civil Air Patrol, California Sheriffs Association and a licensed realtor.

Howard was inducted into the Western Swing Society of Sacramento and the Western Swing Society of the Southwest. In 2011, he was inducted into the Northwest Western Swing Music Society Hall of Fame.

Howard is survived by his loving wife of 54 years, Frances; his children: Michael, Tim and his wife Stacey, Leona, Cheryle, seven grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. Howard touched many lives and will be truly missed by all who were honored to know him and who loved him.

Adam Bratman

Adam Bratman hails from New York originally, but has called Seattle his home for the last 25 years. Cutting his teeth playing in punk rock bands, Adam was the guitarist for 90's Sub Pop band **Sick and Wrong** before being drawn to Country Music and the steel guitar.

Adam has played and traveled with artists Knut Bell, The Hank Williams Revue, Latigo Lace and

backed classic Rockabilly artists Robert Gordon, Paul Burlison, Joe Clay, Ray Campi and Candye Kane. Most recently Adam has been playing with live karaoke band **Karaokegrass**, where audience members get up and sing karaoke hits with a live Bluegrass band. Adam is known for playing the rare Bigsby steel guitar, coveted by the original swing steel players of the 40's and 50's.



Taylor Kent

Taylor Kent is an active performer and educator in the Northwest. Hailing Portland, from OR. Taylor has resided in the Pacific Northwest his entire life. In the greater Seattle area, he can be found performing in a variety of musical settings. including orchestral, and traditional jazz and folk music.

As a freelancing musician, Taylor regularly performs with numerous swing, dixieland, and

bluegrass ensembles around the greater Seattle area, including **Uptown Lowdown Jazz Band**, **Dave Holo's Hot Four**, and **Falty and the Defects**. Additionally, Taylor has participated in national and international tours and continues to travel on a regular basis, performing at venues all over the country.

He currently holds a position with the Spokane Symphony, a post he has held since 2010. In 2012, he served as a guest faculty artist at The Seasons Festival in Yakima, WA. Taylor attended the University of Washington where he studied under Barry Lieberman.

Pete Martin has been called a "national class mandolin and fiddle player" by the <u>Portland Oregonian</u> and "an impressive multi instrumentalist" by <u>SPBGMA Bluegrass Music News</u>. Playing fiddle, mandolin, guitar and tenor guitar he has performed and recorded with many Northwest artists.



Pete is a former National Adult Fiddle Champion and has placed in the top 5 at the National Mandolin Contest. He writes a regular instructional column for Mandolin Magazine and has authored 14 instructional books on mandolin and fiddle playing.

Pete is a full time private lesson teacher in Issaquah and Seattle and gives lessons via Skype all over the world. In addition to the **Go Outside and Playboys**, Pete currently plays

Bluegrass with <u>The Neighborhood Boys</u>, High and Lonesome and Jazz with the Pete Martin Trio.



Then, President Jeanne Yearian turned people's attention to the article in the September newsletter on the Warrior Cry Music Project. This national 501 (c)(3) provides music therapy for wounded members of the armed services (including JBLM), encouraging them regain their health by instruments, providing



music lessons and the opportunity to form bands (some groups have even been recorded). The NWWSMS will be collecting money for this program during the November and December showcases. You can find more information on page 3 of this newsletter!

In short order the stage was reset and the first Jam Band of the afternoon took their places. Dave DuChane offered to take charge of the jam (he is such a treasure). If Milton Brown and Bob Wills were here today they'd create and add to their repertoire tunes that would bring the dancers to the dance floor. I imagine they'd do whatever it took to keep their bands working and the venues open. So what is it we would do today to bring in the patrons to keep the western swing culture alive?

Of course, things are much different today. There's so much entertainment available that there's not time for all we'd like to do. We are teaching and providing many options to our children, encouraging them to try different things. Most have the funds to allow them to grow in many directions. Having options is a great thing for children as they get a taste of many things in order to find out what it is that they are good at and, at the same time, enjoy.

In days gone by transportation was a huge problem. It took a lot of time and money to get out and about. Not everyone had a vehicle or the funds to go far and wide for entertainment or visiting. Not everyone had motorized transportation and if they did it was used to get and keep employment. Today everyone has access to transportation not only for entertainment but work, commuting long distances.

Not so long ago, young people weren't allowed to go far from home to be with friends. They had to find their entertainment close to home and were taken and picked up by their parents. Today, with their own cars and trucks and more access because of urban growth, that restriction is lifted.

There are some exceptions to this. In small towns outside of the urban areas there are a few places available for the younger generations to come and dance, meet with friends and family and learn as we did from each other.

Music, somehow, appears to have a generational ownership component other types of entertainment don't seem to enjoy. Couldn't the tried and true be used to not only attract new people but also keep the genre and it's unique musical style here for new generations to enjoy?

We will always have Bob and his cohorts' tunes as they are loved and recognized by so many. There's not a dance playing whatever style of country music, where a Bob Wills tune isn't pulled out of the tune list. Each and every time the floor will fill with us older dancers - it's like the pied piper blowing his horn. What we need is the next generation to join us on the dance floor to keep the music and it's culture alive.

Yes, I think Bob and Milton would keep reworking western swing to keep the crowds coming.

was very impressed with the professional way the event was conducted. Adding the use of the renovated Texan Theater

and Greenville Auditorium, left no doubt that this festival was to be taken seriously - and people were obviously having serious fun!

I am new to fiddle contests and festivals, so didn't really know what to expect. I had naively thought this was an effort of Western Swing organizations across the country. It seems like it was a local effort that was extremely well sponsored by local companies. Oh, yes, I found it interesting that there is so much support of the Suzuki string method in the

Greenville area. They have programs in the schools. The Suzuki groups appeared onstage and outdoors. They do some Western swing songs along with *Twinkle Twinkle Little Star*, of course. It is a community effort to prepare another generation of fiddlers to keep Western Swing alive.








